

## PROCEDURE FOR GRADUAL LIQUIDATION OF CENTER OUTLINED

### Dr. A. L. Harris Explains Poston School Situation

In a message to Poston parents entitled, "Where Will My Children Attend School In September, 1945?", Dr. Arthur L. Harris, superintendent of schools, has set forth facts of the school situation.

Regular classes will end June 4, and under no circumstances will nursery schools or a possible summer session stay open after Aug. 31.

After that date, (1) there will be no money for teachers' salaries or school supplies, and appointed teachers are expected to leave in June or July; (2) all school records will be sent to Washington and it will be necessary to write there for copies (cont. on Unit I page)

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenzo Etow, 216-5-B, and has a brother, James, in Denver, Colo., who is waiting to be called for active military service.

She is the seventh Poston girl to enlist in the WAC.

### Mills Says No More Reinductions Will Be Permitted Into Center

Except in a few special cases, no more reinductions or visits into the center will be permitted. Project Director Duncan Mills has announced.

In all the special cases, except soldiers on furlough, advance approval must be obtained from the appropriate field or center relocation officer.

The exceptions are listed below:

1. Visits necessary to further relocation plans of family members living in Poston.

2. Students at the end of a school term, if they did not relocate on a permanent basis.

3. Emergency visits because of serious illness or death of family members in the center.

4. Persons who have been accepted for army service and are awaiting induction, or those (cont. on Unit I page)

### WASHINGTON MUST OKAY MESS QUOTA DECISION

A serious omission was made in the story last week concerning lowered mess quotas to be met April 1.

The recommendation by the Manpower Commission that the quotas be met by not replacing terminating workers has been approved by Director Mills, but his approval is subject to approval by WRA Washington. The approval has been requested, but has not yet been received.

According to directives from Washington, a plan for the step-by-step liquidation of relocation centers will be followed here.

All agricultural activities will be reduced and nothing will be planted which cannot be harvested before July 1. There will be no more purchases of swine, but it is believed that there is enough to last until July. No new chicks will be purchased; flocks will be consumed as they go out of laying.

All construction will be completed this quarter. This includes two school buildings and the garage annex. Two laterals now being worked on will be completed.

Maintenance will be curtailed with no new equipment to be purchased over an absolute minimum.

### POSTON WILL SEND FOUR DELEGATES TO CONFERENCE

Poston will send four delegates to the all-center conference which will probably be held at Salt Lake City, Utah, the Community Council has announced.

Two of the delegates will be selected from Unit I and one each from Units II and III.

A wire from Masaru Narahara, chairman of the Topaz Community Council, recommended that the conference begin tentatively on the week starting Feb. 5, but the Poston Council is requesting that the date be postponed in order to have time to prepare an agenda for the conference.

BIDDLE SAYS 5,000 AT TULE LAKE CENTER ASK FOR REPATRIATION

Five thousand residents of Tule Lake center have applied for repatriation to Japan, Attorney General Francis Biddle has disclosed.

Among this number, he said, were 70 to 80 vicious internees, whose disloyalties had definitely been established."

BUDDHISTS ASK POSSESSION OF HONGWANJI TEMPLE

A battle looms in Los Angeles Municipal Court over the possession of the Homba Hongwanji Temple.

The Temple has filed suit against the Providence Baptist Association for "unlawful detention" of their properties. The action states that the property was leased to the Baptist Association for one year on Jan. 5, 1944, and that upon expiration of the lease, the Baptists refused to move out. It also asserts that, in violation of the terms of the lease, the tenants subleased and rented space to individuals for living quarters.

The court is asked to evict the present tenants and to assess damages at \$50 a day for each day's occupancy of the premises since the lease expired. The Baptists are a Negro group.

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\*-Wife living separate and apart under permanent or temporary court order or written agreement is limited to amount provided therein, up to \$50.

\*\*.-In no case will the monthly payment to a former wife divorced exceed \$42. If alimony is more than \$42, payment may be in the amount of \$42; if alimony is less than \$42 a month, payment is in the exact amount of alimony. Under the law as amended, payments to a soldier's wife and his former wife divorced are no longer divided proportionately. The wife receives \$50% the former wife, up to \$42.

SOLDIER'S DEPENDENCY BENEFITS

NO. IV AMOUNTS PAID

DEDUCTION FROM SOLDIER'S PAY: \$22 a month is deducted from the soldier's pay, if the family allowance is for class A, B-1 or B dependents only; \$27, if it is for more than one class of dependents. This is deducted for all regular monthly payments of a family allowance. (No sum is deducted for the initial allowance.) The initial allowance is paid only if the soldier applies within 15 days after he enters active duty on pay status. (The entire sum is paid by the government and made by the disbursing officers in the field, not by ODB.)

In case alimony payable to a former wife divorced is less than \$22 a month, a monthly deduction of less than \$22 (the exact amount of the alimony) will be made from the soldier's pay, provided the soldier has no other dependents who receive family allowance.

SOLDIER'S DEPENDENTS BENEFITS: Class A Dependents--The amounts are fixed by law for each eligible dependent, as follows: Wife (no child)--\$50\*; wife and one child--\$80; wife and two children--\$100; for each additional child--an additional \$20; former wife divorced\*\*--up to \$40; former wife divorced and one child\*\*--up to \$72; former wife divorced and two children\*\*--up to \$92; for each additional child--an additional \$20; child but no wife--\$42; for each additional child--an additional \$20.

Class B-1 Dependents--one parent--\$50; two parents--\$68; one parent and one brother or sister--\$68; two parents and one brother or sister--\$79; one brother or sister but no parent--\$42; for each additional brother or sister--an additional \$11.

Class B Dependents--One class B dependent or more than one--\$37. This amount is a flat rate, no matter how many dependents there are, and is payable only if there is no family allowance payable to any class B-1 dependents.

to enable children to enter outside schools. The Arizona State High School Visitor inspected secondary schools in I and II this month and results indicate that satisfactorily completed credits will be accredited by the state for transfer to any high school. Dr. Harris further notes that the school program here is adequate to make transfer during the school year possible without loss of time or credit. Relocated students usually report that they are ahead of students in other schools. "...Parents must sacrifice the false sense of security they have developed...both for their own welfare and for the welfare of their children," the message concludes.

(A former Postonite continues with his impressions of the Milwaukee, Wis., area.)

"The countryside is really beautiful in the summertime. It is not at all dry and dusty like in Arizona or California, but is nice and green and refreshing. There seems to be very little fruit farming except for cherries and apples. Of course, the main country occupation is grain farming and cattle and dairy, but one sees quite a lot of vegetable growing. The soil seems to be rich and generally on the heavy side.

"The weather does not seem to be as good as one would like to see it. The summer months of June, July and August are really hot in a sultry sort of way, and to one who is unaccustomed to this weather, it is very uncomfortable and is difficult to stay in houses. Even after taking a shower one does not feel refreshed and clean because the perspiration insists upon clinging to the body. So what we do is to go out to the lake shores or to the parks to lounge around until late in the evening. While winter this year has been reported to be one of the severest in the past half century, if this is a fair example of a Milwaukee winter, it frankly is miserable. It isn't so bad until about the first of December. Then it really gets bad. The temperature itself doesn't get alarmingly low--about -15 at the most, but the combination of sub zero temperature plus high humidity and a brisk breeze off of the lakes really cuts through you like ice

Housing problem is, of course, still a big headache. But with a little perseverance and looking around, they are not impossible to find. One good thing is that there is very little if any discrimination shown in any district. If one is interested in investing in a house and lot, there are many homes to be purchased anywhere from \$2500 and up, and at 20% down with monthly payments for the balance.

any rate, the housing situation as a whole doesn't appear to be getting any worse.

Work opportunities here, as most anywhere else, are plentiful. Again, there appears to be very little prejudice shown toward any race in regards to employment, and there are Niseis as well as Isseis employed in many different kinds of shops, and doing all kinds of work. For instance, in the shop where the writer is employed, there are about 15 Niseis, two Isseis, three Negros, 2 Italian, two Polish people working side by side, along with others. Unskilled laborers generally start at about 70¢ per hour and usually get raised to 80¢ per hour within a few months. Skilled laborers are paid anywhere from \$1.00 per hour and up.
