MOST WEST COAST RETURNEES REPORT FAVORABLE RECEPTION

MESS CONSOLIDATION OF BLOCKS 5 AND 12 POSTPONED TO FEB. 14

Consolidation of Block 5 and 12 mess halls at Block 5, which was scheduled for February 1, has been postponed until February14

A mass meeting of the two blocks will be held on Wed. eve, Feb. 7, to determine the worker quotas and to discuss the various difficulties which may arise with the combination of the groups.

In this connection, a misunderstanding has been reported, to the effect that mess hall workers are now frozen.

EAST-SOUTH RESTRICTIONS WILL BE RESCINDED

WRA has received word from the War Department that the eastern and southern restrictions now included in the individual notices to excludes will shortly be rescinded.

Excludees who are mt at present in the eastern or southern coastal areas are advised to defer any plans for settling there until further notice is received from the Western Defense Command. CONTRABAND WILL BE RETURNED TO CITIZENS

Revocation of the mass exclusion orders also revoked Rublic Proclamation No. 13. which made certain articles, including cameras and short-wave radio, contraband in the possession of any person of Japanese ancestry in the Western Defense Command.

The regulations of the Justice Department on contraband, however, remain effective upon all aliens of enemy nationality.

The WRA will, upon request, aid citizens in all centers in recovering possession of cameras. Cameras are still contraband in the possession of Japanese aliens.

Most Poston returnees to the Coast have sent back reports imicating that the favorable reception they have received from their former neighbors and leading citizens in their areas has outweighed the unpleasant imidents and that they have decided to remain on the Coast.

One example is John Yamamoto from Unit III, first returnee to Orosi, Calif, who writes: "All sorts of rumors were flying around... and we started to worry. However, the first place we stopped in upon entering California was the Checking Station. The inspector came out and questioned us... Uncomfortably we (cont. on Unit I page)

Mr. and Mrs. Masugoro Watanabe, 222-8-D, and Mrs. Tai Morimune, 213-10-A, have learned that their sons, Pfc. Tom Watanabe and Pfc. Shigetsugi Morimune, were slightly wounded in action in France, Jan. 16 and 18. With a delayed report on Sgt. Alfred Sadamune, son of Kakuichi Sadamune, ex-37-1-A, they raise the canter casualty total to 75.

Pfc. Watanabe, 22, inducted last March, is from Lindsay, Calif.,

and a 1941 graduate of Delano High. A bromer, T/Sgt. Harvey, is now in the South Pacific.

Already holder of the Purple Heart for wounds received last October in France, Pfc. Morimune, 23; from Watsonwile, Calif., went overseas last August. His brother Harry was recently called for daty from Poston.

ON SOLDIERS DEPENDENCY BENEFITS

THE MAILING OF CHECKS: The regular monthly checks will be mailed by the Office of Dependency Benefits, 213 Washington St., Newark 2, N.J. Unless otherwise requested by the applicant, the full sum due all dependents each month will be mailed in one check For example, the monthly payment for a wife and two children will be mailed to the wife if she is named as payee in the application. However, payments payee in the application. However, payments may be made to more than one dependent, if they are designated by the applicant as payees or are determined by the ODB to be proper payees. For example, the payment for a father and mother-in-law who are dependent upon the soldier for their chief support (class Bal) may be divided equally and mailed in two chebks——one to each dependent. Only one payee may be named for dependent. Only one payee may be named for class B dependents, unless they are living in separate households. In such a case monthly payment of \$37 will be divided equally among the dependents and a separate check mailed to one designated payee in each household.

Although there were some adverse encounters with people, "who are making the place unli-vable," Yamamoto advises those who plan to return to do so immediately, "the sooner you renew your acquaintances and get started the better."

In an Associated Press story, Jan. 28, WRA said that Japanese returning to the Coast had encountered "little from trouble", aside the "Auhurn incident;" and that it expects the real test of sentament to come with the spring.

Planting time and the "lure of the land" will recall many of the evacuated farmers, and the real attitude of that time, the story said.

This is an achievement of your buyers whom you should greatly appreciate, for it means more efficiency, hence more refunds for you.. 5. Q. What must a member do to receive his

full share of refunds? A. Cooperate by buying everything possible at home, by turning in all cash register stubs to your Co-op offices each quarter, and by keeping the offices clearly in-

formed of your mailing address.
6. Q. What happens if stubs are not turned A. in? You cannot possibly receive refunds on those purchases. Instead, the net gain on such unrecorded patronage is true profitand is sub-ject to Federal and state income tax. Unless special exemptions are made, the Enterprises must pay \$12,000 in taxes on such profits on unrecorded patronage in 1943 and 1944.

7. Q. When will refunds on recorded patronage be paid again? A. In February, all Certificates of Indeptedness, amounting to nearly \$60,000, will be paid in scrip. This scrip, \$60,000, which can be used for any purchase from the Enterprises, represents patronage refunds earned prior to June 30, 1943. Other refunds have been paid down to April 1, 1944.

8. Q. How may I become a co-op member? A.

By paying one dollarat the Enterprises offices in Camp I, II or III, or by allowing the mem-bership to accrue from refunds on cash register receipts.



> PANTHERS RIDE MUSTANGS 48-26


