MOST WEST COAST RETURNEES REPORT FAVORABLE RECEPTION

MESS CONSOLIDATION OF BLOCKS 5 AND 12 POSTPONED TO FEB. 14

Consolidation of Block 5 and 12 mess halls at Block 5, which was scheduled for February 1, has been postponed until February 14.

A mass meeting of the two blocks will be held on Wed. eve, Feb. 7, to determine the worker quotas and to discuss the various difficulties which may arise with the combination of the groups.

In this connection, a misunderstanding has been reported, to the effect that mess hall workers are now frozen.

This is definitely not so, says Dr. John W. Powell, MC chairman. In fact, Director Mills has stated that if quotas are not met by April 1 under the recent MC ruling, still subject to Washington approval, terminations will begin.

EAST-SOUTH RESTRICTIONS WILL BE RESCINDED

WRA has received word from the War Department that the eastern and southern restrictions now included in the individual notices to excludees will shortly be rescinded.

Excludees who are not at present in the eastern or southern coastal areas are advised to defer any plans for settling there until further notice is received from the Western Defense Command. After they have been individually notified of the revocation of restrictions, they will be

CONTRABAND WILL BE RETURNED TO CITIZENS

Revocation of the mess exclusion orders also revoked Public Proclamation No. 13, which made certain articles, including cameras and short-wave radio, contraband in the possession of any person of Japanese ancestry in the Western Defense Command.

The regulations of the Justice Department on contraband, however, remain effective upon all aliens of enemy nationality.

The WRA will, upon request, aid citizens in all centers in recovering possession of cameras. Cameras are still contraband in the possession of Japanese aliens.

Shortwave radios will continue to be prohibited in the centers as a matter of WRA regulation. WRA, however, will continue to ship such radio sets on the certification of the project director that the shortwave mechanism will be removed.

THREE MORE REPORTED WOUNDED ON FRENCH FRONT

Mr. and Mrs. Masugoro Watanabe, 222-8-D, and Mrs. Tai Morimune, 213-10-A, have learned that their sons, Pfc. Tom Watanabe and Pfc. Shigetugi Morimune, were slightly wounded in action in France, Jan. 16 and 18. With a delayed report on Sgt. Alfred Sadamune, son of Kakuichi Sadamune, ex-37-1-A, they raise the current casualty total to 75. Pfc. Watanabe, 22, inducted last March, is from Lindsay, Calif.,

WRA Expects Real Test of Sentiment to Come in Spring

Most Poston returnees to the Coast have sent back reports indicating that the favorable reception they have received from their former neighbors and leading citizens in their areas has outweighed the unpleasant incidents and that they have decided to remain on the Coast.

One example is John Yamamoto from Unit III, first returnee to Oroqui, Calif., who writes: "All sorts of rumors were flying around... and we started to worry. However, the first place we stopped in upon entering California was the Checking Station. The inspector came out and questioned us... Uncomfortably we

PUT THIS IN YOUR PIPE AND SMOKE IT

Lost or destroyed tobacco ration cards will be adjusted only after the cancellation of two ration periods, according to Fred Akashi, general manager of Community Enterprises.

During these periods cigarettes will be available only through adjustment coupons, which will be good for one package of cigarettes. These are available at the Community Enterprises office.

An error was contained in a story on cigarette rationing in the last issue of the Chronicle. It should have been stated that letters "C" and "D" would be punched for the purchase of one pound of pipe tobacco, letter "C" only for four packages of cigarettes.

ON SOLDIERS' DEPENDENCY BENEFITS

No. V MAILING OF CHECKS

THE MAILING OF CHECKS: The regular monthly checks will be mailed by the Office of Dependency Benefits, 213 Washington St., Newark 2, N.J. Unless otherwise requested by the applicant, the full sum due all dependents each month will be mailed in one check. For example, the monthly payment for a wife and two children will be mailed to the wife if she is named as payee in the application. However, payments may be made to more than one dependent, if they are designated by the applicant as payees or are determined by the ODB to be proper payees. For example, the payment for a father and mother-in-law who are dependent upon the soldier for their chief support (class B-1) may be divided equally and mailed in two checks—one to each dependent. Only one payee may be named for Class B dependents, unless they are living in separate households. In such a case monthly payment of \$37 will be divided equally among the dependents and a separate check mailed to one designated payee in each household.

Only 40 individuals have actually left the centers for relocation to the West Coast, from Dec. 17 through Jan. 9, according to daily reports which the WRA has received from all centers.

This does not include those who went to the coast for exploratory trips on short term. During the same period, a total of 267 individuals left for relocation outside the evacuated areas.

RETURNEES TO COAST RECEIVED FAVORABLY

(cont. from front page) explained our intentions and to our surprise he congratulated us and said the Government was finally convinced of our loyalty and nothing could be more fortunate. He wished us luck and told us to work hard on the farm for the sake of the country."

"...I went down to visit the Grosi school principal... He said his son was in the Pacific but so was his Japanese friend, and that he will not permit anyone to mistreat the Japanese children... In his Civic studies, he has taught... that the Japanese students will someday return, and it was their duty to show fair treatment in a democratic way.."

Although there were some adverse encounters with people, "who are making the place unlivable," Yamamoto advises those who plan to return to do so immediately, "the sooner you renew your acquaintances and get started the better."

In an Associated Press story, Jan. 28, WRA said that Japanese returning to the Coast had encountered "little trouble", aside from the "Auburn incident," and that it expects the real test of sentiment to come with the spring.

Planting time and the "lure of the land" will recall many of the evacuated farmers, and the real attitude of Coast states will probably be determined at that time, the story said.

RUNCORN ANSWERS QUESTIONS ON CO-OP LIQUIDATION

1. Q. Who will get the remaining assets of the Enterprises when final liquidation occurs? A. After all goods and equipment are sold, and all taxes and other obligations are paid, the remaining assets will be distributed to all members on the basis of all of the cash register stubs turned in by such members in good standing at the time of liquidation.

2. Q. Is the one dollar membership fee returnable? A. Yes.

3. Q. Will there be liquidation losses, and if so, how will they be covered? A. Yes, some goods and equipment will probably have to be sold below cost, but there is a reserve of nearly \$20,000 which has been saved for the purpose.

4. Q. Is the inventory gradually being reduced? A. Yes, the inventory has been reduced from \$150,000 to \$100,000 in the past months. This is an achievement of your buyers whom you should greatly appreciate, for it means more efficiency, hence more refunds for you.

5. Q. What must a member do to receive his full share of refunds? A. Cooperate by buying everything possible at home, by turning in all cash register stubs to your Co-op offices each quarter, and by keeping the offices clearly informed of your mailing address.

6. Q. What happens if stubs are not turned in? A. You cannot possibly receive refunds on those purchases. Instead, the net gain on such unrecorded patronage is true profit and is subject to Federal and state income tax. Unless special exemptions are made, the Enterprises must pay \$12,000 in taxes on such profits on unrecorded patronage in 1943 and 1944.

7. Q. When will refunds on recorded patronage be paid again? A. In February, all Certificates of Indebtedness, amounting to nearly \$60,000, will be paid in scrip. This scrip, which can be used for any purchase from the Enterprises, represents patronage refunds earned prior to June 30, 1943. Other refunds have been paid down to April 1, 1944.

8. Q. How may I become a co-op member? A. By paying one dollar at the Enterprises offices in Camp I, II or III, or by allowing the membership to accrue from refunds on cash register receipts.

9. Q. Should I withdraw my \$1 membership before liquidation? A. No, only members in good standing can receive remaining assets.

10. Q. How can I be a better cooperator? A. The first step is to get correct information. The second step is for you to act with others--cooperate. Some folks "coo" and some folks "operate", but it takes both together to be a good cooperator.

Any single persons with earning of more than \$1,000 a year from sources such as rent, interest and dividends amounting to \$100 or more must file Tax Declaration on or before March 15.
