FOUR HELD ON FELONY COUNTS IN DOI CASE

Four men, two AWOL from the Army and two civilians are being held in Auburn, Calif., charged with felony counts of arson and attempted dynamiting of the farm of Sumio Doi, according to a teletype from WRA San Francisco.

They are Pvt. Elmer R. Johnson, 20, picked up by military police, his brother, Alvin E., 18, both of Redding, James E. Watson, 38, Auburn bartender, and his brother, Charles, 38. Four young women companions are considered material witnesses—(cont. on Unit I page)

JACL Reports on Wells Shooting Investigation

Joe Masaoka, JACL representative, has made an impartial investigation on the recent shooting of three Japanese at a Wells, Nev., cafe.

As ascertained by Masaoka, J.M. Monroe, 41, Union Pacific freight brakeman, shot Harry Gomi, Kyutaro Fujinami, both Issei, and Ken Kikumoto, Hawaiian Nisei, in the kitchen of the Wells Hotel-Cafe, Sat., Jan. 20 at 6:00 p.m.

Deputy Sheriff Murphy of Wells said that Saturday afternoon, Monroe sought to have his check cashed and upon being told that the boss was out, went to the kitchen where he was refused the loan of \$20 by Gomi. Several hours later, he returned, and going to the kitchen, fired and wounded the three men without warning.

PFC. HIRATA WRITES OF ITALIAN FRONT ADVENTURE

Pfc. Louis Hirata from Block 35, who promised reports of his experiences overseas, writes of an Italian adventure from southern France:

-o-o-o-o-o-o-o-

"In Italy, early one morning in July, our company was moving up to new positions. It was just before daybreak and everything was still dark. Another boy and myself were scouts about three hundred yards in front of the rest. Our officer ordered us to move up to the top of the next ridge which we believed had been cleared of enemy troops.

"Everything was very quiet and we weren't expecting any trouble. When we were about to reach the top, someone spoke to us in English, asking us what company we were. Believing it to be one of our officers, I said, "E Company." The next second, the other scout and myself were being fired at.

"Yes, it was a German soldier who had spoken to us in perfect English. It was really a miracle that both of us scouts escaped being shot. The enemy was only about thirty feet away!! The same boy who went through that with me, helped me here in France when I was wounded. He has become a close buddy of mine. His name is Pfc. John T. Suzuki and he hails from Honolulu."

Hitoshi reports that he was visited by several strangers (all farmers) at different times who told him returning was a big mistake. Later one farmer stayed to talk and "he assured me that there wasn't much to worry about and to just sit tight." Some days later, "he told me that if I should have any trouble marketing my produce he would do the marketing for me."

The people who were supposed to make trouble for them--the returning veterans, the Filipinos, the Mexicans, etc.,--"have treated us like any other citizens."

"Our intentions are to stay here as long as the Army permits..."

INTER-RACIAL CLINIC TO OCCUPY BUDDHIST TEMPLE

Los Angeles--The Japanese Buddhist Temple at First and Central avenues, Los Angeles, center of a threatened law suit between its present tenants and its owners, will become an inter-racial building according to terms of a new lease drawn up Jan. 23, the Pacific Citizen reported recently.

The entire building was turned over to the First Street Clinic, which heretofore occupied only a small portion, with the provision that Americans of Japanese ancestry be given subleases on the same general terms and conditions as other tenants up to 50 per cent of the total space.

A number of Negro American families now occupying offices in the building as residences will not be disturbed, it was indicated.
