EVACUEE HOSTEL WILL OPEN IN LOS ANGELES ON OR ABOUT MARCH 1

Officially opening in Los Angeles on or about March 1, will be a hostel for returnees, located at 506 Evergreen Ave., in the former Japanese Presbyterian Church, according to Rev. Soheli Kowta of the Unit I Christian Church.

Jointly sponsored by the Presbyterian Church in the United States and the American Friends Service Committee, the hostel will have as co-directors, Rev. Kowta and Miss Esther Rhoads. The latter is formerly of Tokyo, Japan, and worked for a short time in Unit II Family Welfare. S. Amano of Blk. 36 will be manager.

About 100 evacuees can be accommodated in the hostel at one time, but because of wartime difficulties in getting necessary equipment, only a small number will be accepted at first, Rev. Kowta said. Board and room will be available for about \$1 a day.

It will be remembered that this church was used as a shelter for evacuees from Terminal Island just before total evacuation.

This will be the second returnee hostel. The other is at 305 Kensington Place, Pasadena, and has been operating under the Friends of the American Way.

San Diego Sentiment Okay Say Returnees

Returning to Poston, happy over the warm welcome from former friends in San Diego, which he visited with four other Unit III residents, Rev. Kenji Kikuchi reports not one single incident of discrimination or display of ill-will during the 10-day trip.

Speaking before two church groups, riding street cars, shopping, and visiting the entire city, he received every consideration, he said.

The only fault he found was the extreme congestion. About 400,000 are now living where 90,000 is normal. He advises residents to make certain of housing before returning.

Another Unit III resident, Fred Katsumata, who visited the city, reports a similar reception. Owing his own home there, he intends to return soon with his wife, child and parents.

Meetings with the relocation, welfare, and evacuee property section staffs are also scheduled.

Mr. Myer is currently attending the all-center conference which began yesterday in Salt Lake City.

FORMER RESIDENTS LOSE LAND TO CALIFORNIA

Superior Judge Joe L. Shell of San Diego has signed final judgment escheating to the State of California 118 acres of land valued at \$50,000 and allegedly owned by Masato and Sumi Tanida, Japanese aliens, the Pacific Citizen reports.

District Attorney Whelan, who brought the suit, charged that the Tanidas had held the land through subterfuge by deeding it to five of their American-born children, in violation of the anti-alien land law.

The Tanidas, formerly of Blk. 22, were recently transferred to Crystal City (Tex.) internment center with their seven children. They did not contest the suit.

SAINTS WIN 6th STRAIGHT

Living up to pre-season predictions, the tall Saint quintet moved down all opposition in the first round to remain undisputed champs in the National league. Last night they racked up their sixth straight league victory over the Block 44 five on court 38, 40-16, in their first second round tilt. Sparked by diminutive, but dangerous Yosh Nishimura, the Saints boast victories over Block 44 (42-13), Cougars (40-9), Beavers (52-13), Shamrocks (29-22), and Cardinals.

The American league kings of the initial round have come up to the top most unusually. Although the Blackhawks are credited with five wins and no setbacks, three of their triumphs were gifts on silver platters through the courtesy of the Broncos, Delano Bees, and the Babes who failed to appear for their scheduled games. Actual wins include victories over the Indians (29-19) and Trojans, (22-20).

Resources of the Cleveland Hostel and Rosettlement Plan will be dedicated in the next few months primarily to the problem of uniting families broken by relocation, according to Max L. Franzan, hostel director.

It is felt that families remaining scattered is a potential social problem for Cleveland and results in instability and unsatisfactory relocation for evacuees.

In the future, priority on hostel space will be given as follows: (1) Remnant family groups having close relatives in Cleveland, (2) whole family groups, (3) single women, (4) married men preceding their families in relocation, (5) single men.

The New York Church Committee for Japanese Americans is establishing a plan to welcome people who plan to settle in New York.

It now has a furnished apartment where a family or a group of four may find reasonable and comfortable accommodations until permanent living quarters are found.
