TECH. SGT. SHIGEO ITO RECEIVES BRONZE STAR IN LEYTE CEREMONY

WITH 77TH INFANTRY DIVISION, LEYTE, P. I.—In a brief but dramatic ceremony in the Philippines, T/Sgt. Shigeo Ito, son of Mr. and Mrs. Toramatsu Ito, 4-7-D, was awarded the Bronze Star Medal and Ribbon "for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy" during the period, July to August, 1944.

T/Sgt. Ito, formerly of Riverside, Calif., is the section leader of the Interpreter Team attached to the 77th Division. His is an extremely responsible job and his efforts have been of limitless value to the success of the campaign.

Two Anti-Returnee Incidents Reported From Fresno County

Sheriff's deputies are patrolling southwestern Fresno County in a determined hunt for a nocturnal shotgun squad which blasted hundreds of pellets into the Fresno home of S. J. Kakutani, 35, while incendiary torches were being put to another Nisei home in near-by Selma, the Los Angeles Times reports.

The shotgun barrage occurred shortly after the dinner hour. Kakutani, his wife and three children, and another family were present.

Pfc. Harry Madokoro Was Killed on Italian Front Last August

The nation's second highest award, the Distinguished Service Cross, will be presented today to Pfc. Harry Madokoro, formerly of Watsonville, Calif., who died on the Italian battlefront on August 25, 1944.

The award, "for extraordinary heroism in action" on two occasions, will be received by his mother, Mrs. Matsuo Madokoro, 213-13-G, in ceremonies today at Cottonwood Bowl in Unit II. The presentation will be made by Brigadier General Wilson, chief of staff of the Ninth Service Command, who will arrive by plane from Camp Hahn, Calif.

Kenji Uyeno, Unit II administrator, will be master of ceremonies. The program has been announced as follows:

WRA CLARIFIES ENEMY ALIEN TRAVEL RESTRICTIONS

Information clarifying alien travel restrictions on the Coast has been released by WRA because of a rumor now current which states that Japanese alien travel will be restricted to an area not more than five miles from their homes.

Under Department of Justice regulations, an enemy alien may travel freely without special permission within the limits of the community in which he lives, in such a way as to permit his engaging in normal activities. This is not limited to the boundary lines of a city or county.

If he wishes to make a trip or move into another community, he must fill out a form

furnished by the U.S. Attorney of the district. If neither the Attorney or FBI know of any reason why the trip would endanger national security, the alien will receive a stamped copy of the statement which he should have with him at all times while he is traveling. Travel

AAF DRAMATIZES KUROKI STORY, ATTACKS RACIAL DISCRIMINATION AGAINST AMERICAN JAPANESE

Emphasizing that racial discrimination produces "wounds in this war that don't get Purple Hearts," the Army Air Forces Radio Unit dramatizes the story of T/Sgt. Ben Kuroki, Nebraska-born Nisei hero of the Eighth Air Force, in a half-hour program which was broadcast recently from New York City's station WABC over a CBS national hook-up.

Early in the program the narrator said it would "tell the story of a boy from a farmhouse near a potato field in Hershey, Nebraska," who had "picked up a very fancy collection of decorations, commendations, medals and citations--including two Distinguished Flying Crosses, the Air Medal and four oak leaf clusters, a Presidential citation, and half a dozen bronze stars--but no Purple Heart. Which is the point of the story."

Recent incidents were used to emphasize that Japanese Americans should not be discriminated against because of their race in the following and other excerpts from the script:

"Have you heard the story of the boy from Nebraska? He was missed by flak over Germany, but he could get it right in the teeth from a store keeper out West. He flew past the Fock-Wulfs all right, but the gentleman from the little town nailed him. He made it through the Floesti raid, but he didn't quite make it through a truck farm in the U.S.A. and the point is, there are wounds in this war they don't get the Purple Heart for."

"The neighbors of the truck farmer who needed help with his crops and hired five Japanese Americans...didn't run out five of the people who brought death to China, and plunder to Burma, and starvation to the Philippines. They ran out five people like the boy from Nebraska.

"The gentlemen (who) counted off the names of the Japanese Americans on their servicemen's honor roll and got a bucket of paint and wiped out the names...weren't wiping out the people who raped Nanking, who came to Pearl Harbor in the dawn, who planned the death march of Bataan. They were wiping out the brothers of the boy from Nebraska..."

WAR DEPT. TAKES OVER CALDWELL (IDA) "INCIDENT"

The War Department has taken over the matter of a Caucasian serviceman, who on Jan. 6 assaulted three Nisei youths in Caldwell, Ida., who were enroute to Fort Douglas, Utah for active duty in the army.

Approximately 40 residents of Caldwell and vicinity had assembled at the station for a send-off. One of the crowd, a 70 year-old man, was pushed off the station platform.

The soldier is a native Caldwell man and has a past criminal record.

BOSTON MAN HELPS JACL FILE TEST CASE BRIEFS

The JACL has received \$479 from Godfrey L. Cabot, a Boston (Mass.) businessman, to partly defray expenses incurred by the JACL in filing the brief in the Korematsu case. The total cost of the brief was \$1114.

Last year when the JACL filed a brief in the Yasui-Hirabayashi cases, Mr. Cabot donated over \$1000.

He has expressed his deep concern over the civil rights of Nisei.

WRA CORRECTS RUMOR ON ENEMY ALIEN TRAVEL (Cont. from front page) by airplane is not permitted.

Change of residence or of employment can be made only after at least seven days' notice to the U.S. Attorney, of the proposed change and the holder of a Certificate of Identification cannot change his name, residence address, or place of employment without written notice to the Alien Registration Division of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and to the FBI at the office shown in the holder's Certificate of Identification.

The travel restrictions apply to all aliens fourteen years of age or older, who were or are citizens or subjects of Japan, Italy, or Germany, or who are at present stateless but who were citizens or subjects of any one of those countries.

The curfew regulations of the Western Defense Command no longer apply, since they were rescinded under Public Proclamation, No. 21.

RELOCATION

DETROIT, MICHIGAN:

The Detroit WRA's efforts to meet the problem of housing resettlers has met with some favorable results, Wendell P. Gee, head of WRA Michigan, reveals.

The new housing now open to war-working evacuees is within the limits of two war housing projects: one at the famous Willow Run offering temporary or semi-permanent housing and situated 24 miles west of the city limits; and the other at Norwayne offering housing to 20 families in permanent-type dwellings. There is frequent and rapid bus service from both of these projects. Each project is a complete community in itself with running water, electricity and gas in the dwellings.

LANCASTER, CALIFORNIA:

A resident of Lancaster, Calif., has stated that he has a 40-acre ranch which he desires to have operated by a person of Japanese ancestry. The main crop is alfalfa. There is a two-room house on the place which would be suitable for a man and wife.

A person of Japanese ancestry, in Lancaster, Calif., has stated that he wishes to do subcontracting with two or three men, or a man and his family. The farm is one of 160 acres, which consists of 80 acres alfalfa and 80 acres of low land very suitable for vegetable growing. The first income will come in May when the alfalfa crop is harvested. A large house is available.

ther Nisei couple, Ty and Kay Arifuku, were unhurt.

Sheriff George J. Overholt and deputies found many lead pellets lodged in the side of the house. This indicated, he said, that the blasts were fired from about 100 yards away.

The house which was burned belonged to Bob Morishige, who before the war operated Selma's largest garage. The building burst into flames and was destroyed along with the household effects stored

there by Morishige and other evacuees. The loss was estimated at \$7,000.

Fire Chief Julius Jensen of Selma pronounced the blaze as "plainly of incendiary origin." He said "the gas and electricity had not been turned on for months and the bedding was new and unlikely to be subject to spontaneous combustion."

Previously, Frank Osaki, who returned to Fresno from Gila center, reported to WRA that three shots were fired from a shotgun into his home on Feb. 9, midnight.

Osaki was alone at the time and no one was hurt, but windows in three rooms were broken.

The 40-acre Osaki farm is located about seven miles southwest of Fresno.

Osaki said that his neighbors are very friendly and helpful, and that he does not know who fired the shots.

He has two brothers, both honorably discharged from the Army. One, Harry, is now working in Chicago, while the other, Moro, is in Gila to take his parents back to Fresno.

STATE DEPT. ISSUES NOTICE TO REPATRIATES

A notice which the State Department wishes to be given to all those who have applied for exchange to Japan includes these two important points:

1. If you do wish to go to Japan, you should be sure to send your changes of address to the Spanish Embassy, Washington, D.C., and to the Department of State, Washington, D.C., in order that you may be reached by telegraph if necessary.

2. If you do not wish to go to Japan as a repatriate or ex-patriate, you should write to the Spanish Embassy and the Department of State, at once, asking that your name be removed from the exchange list.

Note: Cancellations may be made at the Unit Welfare Offices in the center. No applications are taken at the center.

He has had a long and colorful army career since his induction at Camp Roberts, Calif., in March, 1941. After serving with the 40th Division for a short time, he was transferred to the 7th Division. In May, 1942, he was sent to Camp Savage (Minn.) language school, graduating in December that year. Shortly thereafter, he returned to the 7th Division as an interpreter and fought with them through the Attu campaign in Alaska. He was then assigned to a Mountain Infantry Regiment and made the landings at Kiska.

Following that campaign, he returned to the states for a one-month furlough and then returned to Camp Savage in October, 1943. It was there that he was

appointed an Interpreter Team Leader and sent to Hawaii where he was attached to the 28th Division. In April, 1944, he joined the 77th Infantry Division and has been with them ever since.

In addition to the Bronze Star, T/Sgt. Ito holds the Asiatic Pacific Campaign Ribbon, and the Good Conduct Medal. He is a veteran of both the Guam and Leyte campaign.

650 MOVED FROM TULE TO INTERNMENT CAMP

TOBACCO SALE TO MINORS PROHIBITED

In regards to the sale, purchase and possession of tobacco to and by minors, a memo from Unit III Administrator, H. K. Yoshimune was sent in as follows:

A large number of minors has been using tobacco to their detriment and in the interest of their welfare, an inquiry was made into the legal aspects of this.

The Arizona State Code, Chap. 43, Sec. 4003, Vol. 3 states as follows:

"Any person who shall sell, give or furnish any cigarettes or cigarette papers, smoking or chewing tobacco to any minor, and any minor who shall buy, or have in his possession or accept or receive from any person, any cigars, cigarettes etc., shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and be punished by a fine of not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars."

A minor is any person under the age of twenty-one.

The Judicial Council of Boston has the authority to punish a person for any infringement upon or violation of the law of Arizona in force at the time of the doing or omitting of the doing of any illegal action.
