PARKER BUSINESSMEN ISSUE INVITATION TO RESIDENTS OF POSTON

The evacuees and appointed personnel of Poston have received an official letter of invitation signed by the businessmen and other interested residents of Parker.

Stating that they bear no ill will toward the people of Poston, they add that they are desirous of accepting whatever business the residents of the center wish to offer them.

They also suggest the setting up of a commercial bus line between the two communities.

EX-TERMINAL ISLANDERS MAY RECOVER PROPERTY

The evacuee property office here, located in Rm. 48 of the Admn. Bldg., will assist residents who wish to recover property of this type. The following information will be requested: former Terminal Island address; address where property was stored, or as complete information as possible as to where property was left, and full description of the property.

Tooele Ordnance Jobs Now Available to Evacuees on Same Basis as Other Citizens; Prior PMGO Clearance No Longer Required

DSC for Pfc. Madokoro Presented to His Mother By Brig. Gen. Wilson

The Distinguished Service Cross awarded to Pfc. Harry Madokoro for heroism in action was presented to his mother, Mrs. Natsu Madokoro, by Brigadier General J. H. Wilson, chief of staff of the Ninth Service Command, who came here by plane Wednesday from Camp Haan, Calif., to make the presentation. Pfc. Madokoro volunteered from the center in June, 1943, and was killed in Italy last August while fighting with the 442nd Combat Team.

The ceremony took place in Cottonwood Bowl, where the Boy Scout Color Guard presented colors and led the flag salute. The 30-piece high school orchestra from Unit I played the National Anthem.

Among the audience was Mrs. Nase Toyota, mother of four sons in the army, one of whom, Pfc. Shichizo, was killed in Italy last July. With her was her son T/Sgt. Kameo, who was wounded in France last October and December. Mrs. Toyota was greeted by General Wilson after the ceremony. Also present was Pfc. Mitsuru Yagura, who is here convalescing from wounds received on the French front last October.

Family Head May Precede Other Family Members to Tooele Depot

Because of the unusual success of persons of Japanese ancestry working at Tooele and Sioux (Neb.) Ordnance Depots, it has been announced that Japanese who are free to travel anywhere within the United States, may apply and be accepted for Ordnance Depot employment in the same manner as any other citizens applying for such work.

This means that it will no longer be necessary for evacuees to fill out the Personnel Security Questionnaire and obtain prior Provost Marshal General's Office clearance before they go to work. They may apply either at the center or field relocation offices or by going directly to the Depot. At the Depot they must fill out the PSQ the same as any other employee, but pre-clearance of the questionnaire will not be required as in the past.

Those who desire pre-clearance, however, may still obtain it by filling out the PSQ and sending it to the Depot with a covering letter of explanation at the same time the application forms are forwarded.

Another new policy permits the head of the family to precede his family to the Depot, provided he has the approval of the relocation (cont. on Unit I page)

CONTINUANCE OF WAR RELOCATION CENTERS
ADVOCATED BY CHRISTIAN CENTURY MAGAZINE

CRIME:

Found guilty of aggravated assault in a trial before the Project Director, Yosuke Kobata has been given a 90-day sentence, suspended, and will be on probation until Dec. 1, 1945.

Matashiro Iwami, who is still hospitalized, will be brought to trial before the county court.

JUDICIAL COMMISSION:

Scheduled to appear as defendant in Poston's first jury trial on Friday, Feb. 16, Akira Shiraki, accused of driving a government vehicle while intoxicated, was found to be a minor.

The jury appointed for the trial was dismissed, and Shiraki's case was turned over to the Youth Counseling Board who found him guilty of the charges. The sentenced passed upon Shiraki denies him the privilege of driving a motor vehicle within the project and forbids him to use liquor. He must also report twice weekly to the Internal Security office for a period of six months.

For the second time in a month, the Christian Century magazine on January 31 urged that "no Japanese American should be forced to leave the shelter of the relocation camps before he freely chooses to go." The editorial said that although the magazine generally approved the liquidation of government wartime emergency agencies as rapidly as possible, that in this instance the "United States has incurred moral responsibilities which come before all other considerations."

EX-NAVY MAN'S SON TO BE IN MERCHANT MARINE

Davy Arata, son of Charles Arata, 322-10-C, who served 12 years in the U.S. Navy, is now awaiting only his passport to become a seaman in the Merchant Marine, according to information received here.

At present he is attending a Navy radio operator's convoy school in Brooklyn, New York, and impatiently awaiting his passport. All seamen other than those of Japanese descent are allowed to sail upon application for a passport.

He has a brother who recently received his active duty call for the Army.

TEMPORARY HOUSING OFFERED IN RIVERSIDE

The World Fellowship Committee of the YWCA of Riverside offers temporary housing to persons from the centers who wish to visit in the Riverside area.

Commenting on a similar editorial entitled "A Moral Obligation to Japanese Americans," in the January 3 issue, Rev. Shigeo Tanabe, director of the Detroit relocation hostel, in the letters to the editor section, says that to force old people and small children out now—after nearly three years of internment and seclusion and to have them suddenly take their places again in a wartime society is bound to create all sorts of social and economic maladjustments.

"Hardships and sufferings will be just as great as, if not greater than, those incurred at the time of their evacuation. Evidences of these can already be seen where old people have resettled," he said.—Topaz Times, Feb. 10.

PERSONS IN MILITARY STATUS MAY VISIT CENTER WITHOUT PRIOR APPROVAL

All persons in military status, including members of the armed forces and the Enlisted Reserve Corps, and men who have passed pre-induction physicals and are awaiting induction, are now eligible to visit a center upon approval of the Project Director without referral to a field officer, according to Post Exclusion Bulletin No. 6.

RELOCATION

COMMERCIAL PROPERTY:

Regulations on shipments of commercial property at government expense have been modified to eliminate the previous requirement that such property must be certified as irreplaceable at the evacuee's new location before shipment can be approved.

Hereafter, no such certification will be required. However, the relocation officer must certify that the property is essential to the evacuee's successful relocation, and the 5,000-lb. limitation still applies except in cases of commercial property now in storage or use at a relocation center.

PROPERTY ASSISTANCE:

All evacuees who left the center on indefinite leave on or before January 2, 1945, are also eligible for property transportation assistance.

If such persons still have personal property at the centers or in the evacuated area--either in private storage or WRA warehouses--they may apply at their field office and have it moved to the common carrier depot nearest their present location.

This applies to those who left on short-term, seasonal or trial indefinite on or before Jan. 2, and later converted in the field to indefinite leave.

DELANO STOPS

BLACKBIRDS

RAMBLERS, 51; BOMBERS, 29

In one of the most exciting casabe tilts witnessed this season, the youthful Delano quintet avenged an earlier defeat by turning back the Blackbirds, 33-29, at court 38 Tuesday night for their third consecutive win of the second round. Only the unpredictable Ramblers stand in the Dukes path to the second round pennant.

Delano's victory was sparked by George Ikemiya's nine points and fine defensive work.

Both sides employed a cautious man-to-man defense and it was nip-and tuck until the second quarter when Delano "opened up" and reeled off a spectacular rally after trailing 11-7. When the firing was done and the smoke cleared at the half time, Delano was holding a comfortable 24-13 lead with scoring credited to Yasumoto, Ikemiya, Nishijima, and Itami with 6, 5, 4, and 2 points, resp.; during the 17-point rally. Only Morinishi's two-pointer interrupted the Dukes as they "went to town".

In a slow third quarter, the Blackbirds narrowed the lead to 27-20. Opening the final canto, Morinishi and Yamasaki hit the hoop to edge within one point of the Dukes. Ikemiya and Kawashima exchanged buckets and the Blackbirds were still behind, 29-28. Then a high, sideline swisher by southpaw Itami and another by Obata with less than two minutes left to play shattered all Blackbird hopes. Nishida tallied a free throw before the final whistle.
