The screening process is being done at the suggestion of the Chief of State Selective Service headquarters, with whom Mr. Morocco conferred during a recent trip to Phoenix.

In case of relocation, it is imperative that those eligible for selective service have a registration card in their possession at all times.

Civil Service Status Will
Assure Post-War Priority

Men in the Enlisted Reserve Corps who wish to obtain employment at Tooele Ordnance Depot in Utah may do so, according to J.M. Jennings of WRA Salt Lake, who was a visitor here last week.

Mr. Jennings pointed out that such boys can make arrangements to report directly to the Depot and work until they are called for active duty. In this way, they can accumulate money to aid their families.

He also stated that they receive Civil Service status, which with veterans' preference, will give them preferential rights for post-war employment.

Work in reclamation is available at the Depot for Issei who are in fairly good physical shape, Mr. Jennings added. This involves segregating used shells returned from the fronts after they have been fired. Different metals are separated, stored and prepared for shipment, so that they can be melted down into their original metals. The work is reported to be simple and light.

As previously announced, pre-clearance with the Provost Marshal General's Office is no longer required for either Nisei or Issei. The Depot deals directly with PMGO in handling the Personnel Security Questionnaire when the applicant begins work at the Depot.

Checked upon, it was found that none of these firms paid less than 85¢ an hour, with top wages at \$1.00 and \$1.25 per hour. Working hours were from 44 to 58 hours, depending on the firm.

Firms which answered the ad included printing companies; sportswear, millinery, and footwear manufacturers; desk-weight, pulley and luggage companies; a law firm; a tobacco company; paper and twine makers; a plumbing and heating supply firm, an industrial supply, and a novelty company.

Tavern, complete with 7-room living quarters above, \$16,500 in Niagara Falls, New York. Beauty Parlor, west side of Buffalo, containing 8 dryers, rent \$25, very good income, established trade, reasonably priced.



We receive heartening news from our returned-to-California friends, especially in Redley. It makes us wonder why we don't pack up and return, too. But we presume everyone has different plans and problems.

In one of the letters from our friend, she states, "Sentiment around here is not perfect. It depends on your own attitude toward your Caucasian friends. If you do everything squarely and fairly, you won't have any enemy but some people say and demand beyond their rights. That's one reason why there are some troubles popping up." So it may be wise to open our mouth just so much when we return and leave the unbearable to the right officials.

The Issei, most of those who plan to stay in America, would rather return to California more than anywhere else. To them it is their second home where they built a little security with sweat and tears. Now they are too old to pioneer into the eastern states. But due to old age, many may not be able to provide for themselves, if they return "home" alone.

The Nisei, young as they are, have different ideas. Many would like to venture into the new horizon which lies mostly in the mid-west and east-where they will be treated as equals in jobs and face less racial discrimination. But they, too, deep in their hearts, will some day, perhaps when this war blows over, want to return to California. California has such a good climate...

RELOCATION

IN NEW YORK:

Representatives of 20 national and local agencies and organizations co-operating in resettlement attended the first of a series of discussion meetings designed to acquaint them with community resources available to resettlers in the Middle Atlantic Area on Jan. 27 in the New York City WRA office. The audience of some 50 persons included many Issei and Nisei.

Four speakers discussed the various ways in which public and private agencies and assisting evacuees in meeting problems concerned with resettlement and family reunions. They also stressed the fact that these services would be continued after the liquidation of WRA. Resettlers who need aid in planning for family reunions as well as financial assistance were urged to avail themselves of all the services provided by these organizations which have been established to help people who need assistance. All the speakers asked evacuees particularly to seek help because resettlement undoubtedly raises many problems which cannot be solved by an individual alone.

Among the supporters of the Committee is the Selma Enterprise, a newspaper which last November editorially condemned the Fresno Bee's "lurid accounts" of Japanese who were "sneaking back".

Said the Enterprise, "The Army ought to know better than the average as to when the military necessity for the evacuation, if it ever existed, no longer exists." Californians ought to realize that the state was a part the United States, that all other states have Japanese Americans in their populations, and that they have been no threat to the safety and security of the nation, the editorial concluded.
