TWO VIOLENT DEATHS IN CHICAGO NOT CAUSED BY ANTI-RACE ACTION

Violent deaths of two Issei in Chicago March 15 were not caused by anti-racial action, investigation by Chicago police and WRA officials revealed. George Kintaro Matsura, who was never in a relocation center, died from an accidental fall. Riuye Fujii, formerly of Granada, died from injuries received when he was attacked by hold-up men.

In response to an inquiry from project relocation officials, Prudence Ross, acting relocation supervisor for WRA in Chicago, wired:

"On March 15, two Issei were found dead or dying in Chicago in widely separated parts of the city. George Kintaro Matsura, Chicago resident, not evacuee, was killed by acci-

SPECIAL CAR WILL GO TO SACRAMENTO, CALIFORNIA

A special coach heading for Sacramento is scheduled to leave on April 2, according to Corlies R. Carter, relocation program officer. The coach consists of one car for 34 adults, 6 half fare children, and 7 babies. All the passengers are from Camp 2.

Robert C. Wells, relocation officer, stated that there is more room open and anyone interested is welcome to join the group. The train is going through the cities of Bakersfield, Fresno, and Stockton.

Basic Rights of Returnees Must be Protected, Says Law Chief of California

State Attorney General Robert W. Kenny told an annual meeting of the state's sheriffs Friday, March 16, that the basic rights of people of Japanese ancestry returning to California must be protected, and such protection is a responsibility of all law enforcement agencies in California. Denouncing groups which are "stirring up trouble," Kenny said that the sheriffs, police chiefs, Department of Justice, armed services, the WRA, district attorneys, and everyone, as adults, as responsible members of their communities, must do whatever they can so as to allow Japanese-Americans to resettle in safety and peace.

Touching on the lifting of the exclusion ban, Mr. Kenny pointed to the decision of the U.S. Supreme Court that the rights of Japanese Americans must be restored; that the rights to protection accorded the wealthy and strong must be extended those who are small and weak.

Enumerating some of the incidents which have occurred upon the return of evacuees, he praised the sheriffs for the efficiency in quelling the disturbances.

In conclusion, Kenny observed that as long as lawlessness, criminality, segregation, and mental cruelty are allowed to exist, they can and will bring evil consequences in which no one would be willing to have a part.

California Conditions Reported by Relocation Officer After Trip There

Finding adequate family housing is the greatest problem that will have to be met in the relocating of evacuees in California, reported Corlies R. Carter, relocation program officer, who returned Tuesday from a ten-day visit in California.

Mr. Carter found that the attitude of the people regarding the return of evacuees was good, in general, in almost all areas. The people with whom he talked said the attitude is even better than before the war. He stated this is probably due to the record of the Nisei soldiers, and to the great awareness of the people of California of the nature of Japanese-Americans, which is the result of publicity given them during the past two years.

Mr. Carter, during his trip, visited Fresno, Sacramento, San Francisco, Watsonville, Los Angeles, and Santa Clara County. He reported that in Fresno, a hostel is in the process of being organized. In Sacramento there is a small hostel operating, as in Oakland. San Francisco is expected to have several in the near future. There is no hostel in Watsonville. Los Angeles has three and more are expected to be established in the near future. There is none in San Diego, but one is expected to be opened in the near future.

Mr. Carter said jobs of all kinds are plentiful.

Mr. Carter found insurance on houses and farms can be obtained and such persons as obtain this can direct interested evacuees toward people who give such insurance. He found that one statewide bank had been contacted by W. R. A. and had directed its branches to accept applications from evacuees

for loans as from anyone else. One former resident of the Fresno district from Poston received a loan of \$1,000 for building a home in the Fresno district.

Mr. Carter spoke to the block managers of Unit I Wednesday, and reported in detail the results of his trip. He plans to give talks to evacuees interested in going to California.

He said that in the Fresno area there are over 300 relocated, and as nearly as he could find, the majority are getting along fine.

SECOND BATTALION, 442ND, IS NOW ENGAGED IN WORK IN FRANCO-ITALIAN ALPS

SIXTH ARMY GROUP, FRANCE--In some of the roughest fighting terrain in the European theater, the 2nd Battalion of the 442ND Infantry Regiment is engaged in front-line combat high in the French Alps.

The battalion is sending patrols into the mountain wilderness, exploring enemy territory for signs of troop movements and weaknesses.

The battalion previously experienced the difficulties of mountain fighting in Italy where, in the "Little Cassino" line defending the approaches to Leghorn, it fought over mountain heights so impassible even mules could not be used for transporting supplies. Supply men tied themselves together with bolts as they hauled water, food, and ammunition to their fellow troops. The lessons they learned then are paying off now.

Slugging its way through southern France into the Vosges Mountains, the 2nd Battalion played a great part in the rescue of the "Lost Battalion."

Over 1,000 Purple Hearts, some with Oak Leaf Clusters, have been awarded to Japanese American troops. Fourteen Distinguished Service Crosses have been awarded; 54 Silver Stars, 51 Bronze Stars, and 79 Division citations for individual members. Fifteen enlisted men have won battlefield commissions, attesting to the leadership of these men in combat.

dental fall, according to well substantiated evidence at the inquest. Old Chicago residents arranging funeral.

"Ryue Fujii, former ly of Granada, was found unconscious near his home, 3846 Lake Park Avenue, apparently attacked by hold-up men. Robbery apparently motive. He died without regaining consciousness following day at county hospital. Inquest postponed account lack of evidence. Police continuing investigation.

"Many unsubstantiated rumors current among resettlers in city as result of these two deaths which were apparently entirely unconnected. No logical presumption Fujii's death related to national origin. WRA staff has offered services to family and is continuing cooperation with police investigation."
