Sgt. Ogata, Wire Chief, Performs Heroic Acts

SIXTH ARM GROUP, FRANCE--During the 442nd Regimental Combat Team's advance through the Vosges Mountains of Northeastern France, Sergeant Mikiri Ogata, a wire chief in one of the battalions, and the son of Mrs. Yone Ogata of Blk. 6-10-B, performed acts of heroism on the battlefields.

Then a task force composed of two rifle combanies was assigned the mission of encircling left flank the of an enemy strongpoint and striking them from the rear, Sgt. Ogata was called upon to lay communications line between the Battalion Command Post and forward rifle companies. Although he had had but little rest in the past 24 hours, the sergeant followed the assault platoon over rough and heavily-wooded terrain, laying the wire and keeping pace with the riflemen.

A strong German resistance halted the advance at one point and the Bakersfield sergeant volunteered to go forward to assist the riflemen in neutralizing the enemy positions. While moving forward, he observed enemy taking aim upon one of his comrades. The Sergeant immediately fired and killed the German.

Before coming to France, Sgt. Ogata fought with his unit in Italy. They made the northward sweep from Suvereto to Pisa and Florence.

MINIDOKA GIRL ONE OF 12 TO RECEIVE BARDWELL AWARD FROM MT. HOLYOKE

Hattie Kawahara, formerly of Minidoka center, was one of the 12 girls to receive the Bardwell Memorial award from Mt. Holyoke College, South Hadley, Mass., one of New England's outstanding liberal arts college.

Miss Kawahara came to Mt. Holyoke College direct from Minidoka over a year ago as a political science graduate assistant. Entering Mt. Holyoke with advanced standing credits, she graduated with honors in her political science course in October, 1943.
