The Poston Youth Conference which will be held from April 27 through May 4 has attracted the attention of leaders in number of western communities, according to Mas Honda, chairman of the steering committee.

Took Oath Three Hours After Death of Roosevelt

Washington, D.C., April 12--Harry S. Truman of Missouri was sworn in as 32nd President of the United States Thursday at 7:09 p.m. EDT.

He took the oath of office less than three hours after Franklin Delano Roosevelt died of a cerebral hemorrhage at Warm Springs, Georgia, at the age of 63.

Truman took office in the Cabinet room of the executive offices in the White House.

Roosevelt died at 3:35 p.m. Central War Time. About 1:15 today, he had slumped into unconsciousness after complaining of a very severe occipital headache, and never regained consciousness after then. The death occurred after he had been at Warm Springs for more than a week.

A White House statement said: "Vice President Truman has been notified. He was called to the White House and informed by Mrs. Roosevelt. The Secretary of State has been advised. A Cabinet meeting has been called."

"The four Roosevelt boys in the service have been sent a message by their mother, which said that 'the President slept away this afternoon. He did his job to the end. As he would want to do. Bless you all and love,' added Mrs. Roosevelt. She signed the message, Mother."

"Funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon in the East Room of the White House. Interment will be at Hyde Park Sunday afternoon. No detailed arrangements or exact times have been decided upon as yet."

RESIDENTS RETURN TO SACRAMENTO SAFELY

Word has been received by the Unit II Relocation Office that the eleven families who left Poston for Sacramento, Calif., on the second of this month, have reached their destination safely, acquired taxis and left for their homes soon after they were detained.

Treatment by railroad officials during the trip was reported to be excellent by Toichi Hamamoto, who was in charge of the special car. He secured four limousines at the depot from the taxi company for those who had not yet obtained them, and their final destinations were reached without encountering difficulties.

It has been recommended by Mr. Hamamoto that evacuees leaving the center by train be furnished with food for the trip so that waiting in line will be avoided.

This special car had been attached to a United States Troop Train.

Do you softball fans still remember the first All-Star softball selections made by the Press Bulletin (Chronicle to you), back in August of '42? None other than Vista's "immortal" George Sugita was the top choice for King of the Moundmen. With everything from a curvaceous curve to a tantalizing slow ball on his windmill delivery menu, George's selection was unanimous.

Named as the most dependable backstop was Aki Mochizuki of the Golden Bears; Dolano's Lefty Nishijima was first choice at the initial sack; pivoting for Orange County, Ray Furuta was selected to hold down the keystone bag; Riverside's Kobe Shoji was elected for the "hot corner"; speedy Terry Okida of Valley garnered honors for the shortstop position; and the trio of crack outfielders were Ernie Mizuno (Golden Bears), Oshima (Riverside), and Kawano (Indians.)

BOTH ISSEI AND NISEI HAVE GOOD CHANCE IN NY

Facts on acceptances, the opportunities for post-war employment, chances of Isseis to open business in the city, what kind of weather the city has, and what kind of assistance you may get when you arrive in New York, are told in a descriptive pamphlet titled "When You Arrive in New York", which was issued by the relocation office recently.

The pamphlet opens saying that the Resettlement Council of the Japanese American Organization has extended its helping hand and a friendly welcome to those that come to New York. This council was organized in spring of 1944 by including representatives from various groups, such as the JACL, and a number of church organizations. They organized for the special purpose of assisting evacuees who are interested in relocating to New York.

The group felt sure that the Japanese would be accepted in the city since the city is populated by people from nearly every country in the world. A relocatee can walk almost anywhere in the city without being subject of special attention.

Because of its size, friendliness, and wealth a person can find a job in his chosen line of work at prevailing wages. Issei and Nisei are working as mechanics, and kitchen helpers, architects and domestics, auditors and cooks, stenographers and bell boys, and a number of other types of job. Since New York is not primarily an industrial city, it has not had a war boom. Therefore prospects of post-war employment are

far better than in any other place.

There are approximately 100 Issei-owned businesses of which most of the trade is with Caucasians. Many of these are prospering in metropolitan New York. Thirty of the businessmen in a recent survey reported that in the past few years they have experienced almost no discrimination because of the war, and that the prosperity of their business had increased within the past few years. Most of these places have been open for at least 15 years or more with the possibility of some of them being in business for over 25 years. Some of them are located in the busiest section of the city. The Issei businessmen are profiting in a great many ways, such as operating restaurants, nurseries, barber shops, and dental laboratories.
