#### 442ND GAIN 76 MILES IN FIVE DAYS, TAKING PART IN CAPTURE OF TOWNS

Washington, D.C. (war Department Release) - -Members of the 442nd infantry Regiment, now in the vanguard of the Fifth Army's great offensive which smashed the German army in Nor-Italy., thern made gains tional of iles in five days, ture of Genoa, Italy's largest seaport, on April 27, and Ter Turin, the last great city in the Po River Valley, on April 30.

The 442nd is reported to have entered Genca with the 473rd Infantry Regiment, which later swung around in a southwesterly direction, towards Ter Turin. Both regiments are attached to the 92nd Infantry Division, made up of Negro troops.

## SGT. OCAWA KILLED APRIL 21 IN ITALY

### Period to June 1 Named Brake Emphasis Time

A memo to all the appointed personal from Duncan Mills states that the period April 15 to June 1, 1945, has been designated by the international Association of Chiefs of Police for a nationwide brake emphasis campaign.

During this time the internal security secwill conduct an tion inspection program all government and private motor vehicles in the center. Tests will be made of brakes other safety appliances, such as lights, windshield wipers, left front windows. rear view mirrors, and speed-ometers. As part of the campaign drivers may'be requested present their driving licenses. All are asked to cooperate.

Sgt. John Ogawa, the of Mr. and Mrs. son Kirisuke Ogawa of 38-1-B,was kill ed in action on the 1tabattlefront lian April 21, according to a War Department telegram received by the mother. He is the 15th to be killed in action from Poston.

The 28-year-old sergeant was inducted December 1, 1941, going overseas on August 22, 1944. He received his training at Camp Bark-eley, Tex.; Fort Riley, Kan.; Fort McClellan, Ala., and at Ft. Meade, Md., before going abroad. He was also in action with the 442nd during the French campaign.

Sgt. Ogawa is formerly of Santa Ana, Calif., and is a 1935 graduate of Garden Grove Union High School.

ASSISTANCE FACTS GIVEN IN WELFARE'S 2ND LETTER

The second of the series of questions and answers, to answer the request from the residents for a reliable questions-a nd-answers paper on the resettlepersons who ment of will need more than the average assistance furnished by the relocation division to relocatees, is given here. They are compiled by the welfare section from actual cases.

The first of series was printed in full in the Saturday, April 21 issue of the

Chronicle.

second letter follows:

7. Q. A family has some furniture but not enough to sep up housekeeping. They have no savings or other resources to buy furniab wcH ture needed. they apply for Resettlement assistance the necessary items of furniture?

"A. They should make up a list of the furniture they now have in Poston and a list of what they have stored California. These lists left with should be the counselor in the welfare section at the time the application Information is made. should be given in regard to the condition of the furniture. All available furniture and household equipment the family owned by should be taken with them on relocation because there is a shortage of many items in the local markets.

"8. Q. Tamily of 6. Two daughters outside. Father ill. Used to have a vineyard back in California. Son and fourth child, a girl, still in grammar school Would like to go back to California but local sentiment not too good!

"A. The two daughters outside and the parents will probably make a decision together about whether to return to California or to go elsewhere. They should consult the welfare section as soon as the decision is made. family in need of resettlement assistance should plan early in order that the welfare section may get answer to the application for resettlement assistance before the date of departure.

"9. Q. 'Family of 9. Eldest Parents old. son in Army. One son partly blind and lacks schooling. Rest daugh-ters, age 9 to 23.

This family should consult the welfare counselor about special training for the son if he cannot go to the regular pub-hic school. If financial assistance is needed, they should apply for dependency benefits and resettlement assis-Eligibility will depend upon need. question does not state the number of employable in persons in the famin

"10. Q. Family of 4. Parents over 60 a Girl 18. Boy 26 refused induction, serving 3 years term in prison. Used to run a soft drink stand. Nothing to go back to in California, What relocation aid can welfare give this

family?

MILLS EXPLAINS WHY NOT OVER 250 RULE IMPOSSIBLE

Under existing instructions from ington it is impossible to make a rule that the number of persons to be served by a consolidated mess hall will not exceed 250 as requested by the Community Council, according to Duncan Mills, project director. It is quite likely

It is quite likely that this end could be achieved provided residents of the block whose kitchen is being alosed were divided between two adjoining mess halls. However, it has been generally agreed that it is inadvisable to split the block iden tity in this manner if it can be avoided.

The only alternative therefore, appears to be that in some cases it will be necessary to serve more than 250 people in a combined mess hall. In such cases, it is quite In such cases, likely that any temporary overcrowing will be corrected in a short time by relocation.
