# TREASURY DEPARTMENT WILL UNBLOCK ACCOUNTS OF CLEARED PERSONS

WRA in aid its relocation and liquida tion program, the Treahas Department sury informed the WRA that they will unblock all but a limited number of the accounts of evacuees on the Army clear list, according to WRA Washington

Through . the project forms to redirector quest unblocking orders will be forwarded Federal Reserve Bank in San Francisco The bank will determine whether the statements on the individual forms correct. individual unblocking orders will be mailed in care of the project director, and private banks will be notified.

Etacuees tnese ın categories are incligable to apply for unblock ing orders through this arrangement special with Treasury: (1) per sons not on the Army clear list, (2) those Army who have been issued specific blocking or ders, (3) evacuees who have represented or acted as for agents any person outside the continental United States on or since July 26, 1941, and (4) persons who now hold funds belonging to blocked nationals.

Those who are not eligible may however, apply for reconsideration of their cases by filing Form TFU-1 with the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco. Business enterprises may apply for unblocking through the same procedure.

Former internees whose accounts remain blocked may upon application withdraw up to \$200 a month for living expenses. Other persons whose accounts are not unblocked may withdraw as much as \$500 per month.

MORE WRA COMMENTS TO SALT LAKE SUGGESTIONS TOLD

Fifth of the Chronicle's series giving recommendations of the All-Center Conference, and WRA comments thereto, is given below, continued from the May 12 issue.

"Recommendation No That when an eva-15: cuee relocates or returns to his former business or home WRA should make every effort to release frozen as sets (blocked accounts) both in cases of individuals or organizations

"Comment: Those eva-cuees who have been cleared by the War Department for return to former their homes an excellent stand chance of regaining their frozen assets or blocked accounts WRA has already been negotiating with the Treasury Department on this problem and will soon announce procedures for presenting applications to the proper officials for consideration. It is suggested that the Community Councils inform those whose funds are frozen or blocked to take their problems to the Project Attorney and secure his assistance in preparing applications for clearance and his advice on clearance and licensing procedures.

"Recommendation No. 16: That the WRA negotiate for the conclud-ing of arrangements ing whereunder alien parents may be able to operate manage properties with powers of attorney issued by their children, particularly by sons in the United States Armed Forces.

"Comment: We are investigating this matter and will provide fur-ther information at a later date,

"Recommendation No 17: That the WRA arrange to secure outright refor parolees leases who relocate.

"Comment: Parolees

who have relocated and desire to be released from parole restrictions should apply to the Enemy Alien Control Units of the Department of Justice Persons making such application should submit any fac-tual information they may have bearing upon their loyalty to the United States and their willingness to cooperate in the war effort This would include; (a) names and designations of any sons and daughters who are serving in the armed forces with their approval (b) statements from friends acquaintances or colleagues, and (c) any additional information they may have bearing on the continuation of their parole e status WRA will be positive and rapid ac glad, upon the request of an individual parolee, to submit any informa tion it may have regarding his character and loyalty, to the Department of Justice

"Récommendation No 18: That the WRA obtain establishment af the some avenue of governmental indemnities for relocatees who may be some victims of anti-Japanese violence in terms of personal in-

"If evacuees should suffer any damage or they have the irjury, same rights as any person to seek compensation in the courts from the persons causing the loss. If the evacuees need additional money is protection, there insurance to cover al- most any kind of risk. WRA will assist center residents upon request in obtaining insurance for themselves and for their property to cover any risks or damage that they think might occur after relocation. We are entirely confident that coverage can be obtained.

"Federal legislation be necessary to provide indemnities of the sort suggested by Recommendation No. 18. know of no similar eral legislation We Federal that has been passed by Congress. In view Congress. In vic. similar special consideration has been given to other persons or groups, the presumed adequacy of local lawenforcement agencies to handle any problem, and the other avenues available to evacuees seek compensation or protect themselves in advance, it seems extremely doubtful that Congress would give favorable consideration to the proposal.
