## 14TH NAVAL DISTRICT WILL HIRE JAPANESE AMERICAN VETERANS

Returning American war veterans of Japanese ancestry will be given opportunity for employment in the 14th Naval District, Honolulu, T.H., Vice Admiral D. W. Bagley, district commandant, said Saturday, May 19, reported the L.A. Examiner, May 20.

The veterans will be the first Americans of Japanese extraction to be hired at the vital naval installation at Pearl Harbor since the start of the war.

"Returning veterans can expect and will receive fair and impartial treatment by the Navy in accordance with the GI Bill of Rights, which guarantees equality regardless of racial extractions, creed or color," Bagley said.

## Simmons Company at San Francisco Wants Men and Women Workers

The Simmons Company of San Francisco, Calif., peacetime manufacturers of beds and mattresses will open its plant for employment to Misoi, according to Fred W. Ross, district relocation officer for WRA. Interested persons are asked to see the unit relocation office in regards offer 6805-C.

At present men and women army squad tents on the swing shift from 3:30 p.m. to midnight.

Women are wanted to do power sewing. No experience is necessary, but they should have experience at least on a home sewing machine. Work is sewing canvas tents material with the help of a man in handling the fabric. Wages are 65¢ to start. 5¢ hour per week raise to a base of 75¢ hour 5¢ hour production bonus making 80¢ hour the base rate.

Male helpers are wanted to help women machine operators handle the tent material. Squad tents are 16' x 32' when completed and weigh 275 pounds. Only a part of it is lifted at any one time so the operation does not require great strength. Starting wage is 75¢ hour, 5¢ hour per week raise to \$1. Production bonus of 5¢ makes base pay \$1.05 hour.

The company is on Bay Street, in the North Beach area, relatively close to the former Japanese section, compared with most of the industrial plants.

**TRUMAN OK'S TRANSFER  
OF FUNDS TO ASSISTANCE**

A deficiency bill authorizing the transfer of an additional \$175,000 from WRA funds to the Social Security Board's Resettlement Assistance Program, was signed by President Harry S. Truman on April 26.

Accelerated relocation following revocation of exclusion orders, has exhausted the \$50,000 originally set aside to provide outside assistance during the fiscal year 1945, Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, stated. The request for diversion of this sum was made a year ago, before a rescission date could be foreseen.

The diverted funds will be available for minimum assistance through June 30, 1945, to relocating evacuees in greatest need, the director said.

**SAN JOSE HOSTEL OPENS**

The hostel in San Jose is now open and ready to provide temporary housing and board to returning evacuees. The hostel, located at 630 N. Fifth St., will accommodate 50. T. Kawakami is in charge. Rate is about \$1.50 a day, and evacuees will be asked to contribute one hour's work daily for maintenance and upkeep. It has been suggested returning evacuees wire reservations to Mr. Kawakami at the hostel before leaving camp, says the San Jose WRA.

FRESNO CHURCH LODGING OFFERED

According to the letter received from Rev. Hideo Hashimoto of Fresno Japanese Methodist Church, situated at the corner of Kern and D. Streets, 1260 Kern Street, the church is now ready to provide emergency lodging for evacuees who return to make arrangement for family relocation or to seek employment.

The Congregational and Methodist churches, both nationally and locally, are supporting the project, and it is open to all returning evacuees regardless of religious faith.

The building is limited as to facilities and only beds, mattresses and blankets will be furnished. Beds will be arranged on dormitory basis. A shower is also available.

Following is more information.

1. Lodgers must bring their own sheets, towels and personal effects.

2. No meals will be served. No kitchen facilities are available. Restaurants are located nearby.

3. No smoking is allowed in the building.

4. Lodgers will be charged 25¢ per night to cover expenses.

5. Lodgers are urged to limit their stay as short as possible and not more than 2 weeks.

6. Those desiring lodging should apply to Rev. Hideo Hashimoto, 1228 Kern Street, Fresno 1, California in advance and receive confirmation. They should notify him of the date and time of arrival and the mode of travel.

7. Pastor will be available for consultation at the church office.

8. The phone number of the parsonage is Fresno 4 4135.

**MINIDOKA RELOCATEE,  
ISSEI, ENDS LIFE BY  
GAS POISONING IN NYC**

New York--Keisen Tim Nagai, 22-year-old Issei who formerly resided at National, Wash., and the Tule Lake and Minidoka Relocation Centers, was found dead of gas poisoning on May 11 in the furnished apartment he shared with two Nisei at 304 West 107th Street since coming to New York from Chicago early this year.

His death was certified as suicide by the police and verified as such by a local WRA official who talked with the police and with Nagai's roommates. One of the latter indicated that Nagai had been moody and unstable for several years and that he had changed jobs frequently in an effort to find work which suited him. The WRA official was also informed that Nagai had attempted suicide in Chicago last winter.

Nagai's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ikuo Nagai, live at 404-B, Tule Lake, where his three sisters, Mrs. Fumi Sasaki and Annie and Lucy Nagai, also reside. His brother, Sergeant Ralph Nagai, is stationed at Fort Riley. Local WRA officials indicated their readiness to aid the family in making funeral arrangements and were of assistance in many other ways.
