UNIT ONE HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES RECEIVED DIPLOMAS TUESDAY

An overflowing crowd attended the commencement exercises at the Unit I high school auditorium last Tuesday evening, May 29, as 121 graduates were launched into a more adult sphere of life, by Dr. Arthur L. Harris, who presented them with their coveted diplomas. Forty-nine of the graduates were unable to appear due to relocation or other reasons. The number graduating totaled one hundred and seventy for this year of 1945.

The high school orchestra played while the graduates clad in navy blue caps and gowns ascended the platform.

Included in the program were: an invocation by the Rev. K. Yamamoto; the National Anthem, by the congregation; vocal number by Mary Kagata, Chizuko Akiyama, Tori Fukuda, Alethea Yasukochi, Pauline Takahashi, as a quintette, and Harold Nagase. The commencement address was made by John Girdler, principal; while Tsunezo Tanaka spoke in behalf of Unit I Council.

Due to a mix-up concerning the list of persons to be awarded honors for outstanding records, the awards were not given out until later in the week and the names are listed elsewhere in this issue.

WOODCROSS CANNING COMPANY WANTS WORKERS

THOSE NOT ON CLEAR LIST DESIRING TO APPEAL FROM STATUS MAY DO SO

Exclusees desiring to appeal from their present status may do so if they feel that their appeal is justified. Under the present procedure, the screening board established by the Western Defense Command is transferring a number of exclusees to the free list without requiring them to have further hearing or investigation. If the exclusion order against the person is repealed, any segregation recommended against him is automatically withdrawn.

Exclusees desiring to appeal from the exclusion order may request written statements to be forwarded to the Western Defense Command by project appointed personnel who have sufficient basis of knowledge of the exclusee or his record at the center. Personnel furnishing such statements must secure approval from the Project Director. Such statements may expedite action on the appeal. Anyone wishing to appeal his status with the Army may get advice from the unit relocation advisor.

FIVE BLOCK 3 MEN GUILTY OF GAMBLING CHARGES

Five men, one the owner and the rest housemen of a gambling house, were arraigned before Project Director Duncan Mills, Monday, May 28. All pleaded guilty and were fined 5 days or \$5 with the exception of the owner, who was sentenced to 90 days in the county jail with 60 days suspended for good behavior or \$300. They are Fukutaro Murata, owner, George Yoshida, Sadahiko Ishikori, Misao Watanabe, and Teruo Takemoto, housemen and all of Block 3.

Fines totalling \$395.00 was turned over to the project director with the evidence money of the \$178.90 which will be turned over to Murata on his terminal leave from the center. The gambling house was an underground affair with two exits and equipped with three gambling tables, coolers, and fluorescent lights. Books showed that the

operator made a profit of \$435 for the first 21 days.

SHIPMENT OF COMMERCIAL

The shipment of commercial property from a relocation point outside the evacuated area to any point within the evacuated area is the responsibility of the evacuee.

Such shipment will be made by the evacuee in any manner he chooses. No deposit will be accepted for handling under special procedure for commercial property and no commercial property may be shipped on a government bill of lading, from a relocation point outside the evacuated area, even though household goods and personal effects may be shipped on government bill of lading at the same time.

PROPERTY NOT ON WRA

a point of relocation. When property is to be shipped by the Authority at an evacuee's expense, it shall either be shipped on a commercial bill of lading, charges collect, with the owner named as the shipper, or else if the carrier will not accept the goods charges collect, the evacuee shall in advance of shipment deposit with the Authority an amount sufficient to cover transportation charges and shipment will then be made on a government bill of lading.

If the nature of property is such that it may be shipped at WRA expense, the cost of packing, and crating; will be borne by WRA; otherwise, it will be borne by the evacuee.

MARY MASUDA OF GILA
NOT BEATEN IN SANTA ANA

Mary Masuda, of Gila River, according to a rumor, was beaten by a sailor from the Pacific area, at Santa Ana, while on short-term leave there.

Investigation by the WRA relocation officer in Santa Ana, found that this was not only untrue but that Miss Masuda was in Rivers arranging to take her parents and the family to Santa Ana, at the time the beating was supposed to have occurred.

Mr. and Mrs. Albert Trudeau, at whose home Miss Masuda was staying, were visited by several men May 11, who called her host names for letting her into his house. She told them her four brothers were fighting as well as their men. (She has four brothers in the Army, one killed.)
