First Fresnan Detained For Assault on Nisei Gets 6-Months Sentence

Levi wultanen. drew a six months suspended sentence in Justice Court at Parlier after pleading guilty on May 28 to firing two shots into the home of Charles Iwasaki, recent returnee. Multanen was the first man to arrested for shooting Japanese-Americans in Fresno County, whe re there have been half a dozen similar incidents in recent weeks. Judge L.B. Crosby warned him against further illegal acts and placed him on probation for six months, according to the S Francisco Chronicle

Another act of van-dalism was reported in Orosi, Tulare County, where Sheriff S. B. Sher man revealed that two rifle shots were fired into the home of Kaudy Mimura, 32, late one Thursday evening. INSURANCE MAY BE HAD FOR EVACUEES' PROPERTY

WRA project directors were recently notified that a source for insurance covering real and personal property owned by persons of Japanese descent, evacuee or otherwise, on the same rates as on property owned by anyone else, has been found in the Fireman's Fund Insurance Co., San Francisco.

With certain restrictions, automobile insurance of all kinds, including liability insurance, may not be placed for evacuees. The first restriction that aliens cannot be covered; policies are available only for citizens. Other restrictions follow: (1) the insurance company has indicated that applications from certain localities in which there seems to be somewhat more vigorous opposition to the return of evacuees than elsewhere will not be accepted; (2) top limits are \$2500 on property damage; \$10,000 to 220,000 on liability, plus a premium sur-which represents the automobile, fire, and theft insurance, the increase will be 100%; on that portion representing public liability, the increase has been marked at 50%.

Partly responsible for bringing about this insurance availability for evacuees is William a. Kempenish, the issuing agent, who reports that an evacuee has already secured insurance on his automobile from the Fireman's Fund Group in San Francisco.

Evacuees desiring to ship pets are permitted to do so provided they are transported as a part of the free baggage allowance they are entitled to under their personal transportation tickets. If the evacuees are unwilling to use their free allowance in this way, shipment will be made at their expense, according to Ad. Notice 255, May 19.

This rule has been made since most rail-roads will accept pets such as cats and dogs as checkable baggage and transport them in the baggage car on the personal transportation ticket of the traveler.

Shipment of pots is subject to state laws and regulations, which must be complied with by relocating evacuees. Assistant relocation advisers are fully acquainted with conditions pertaining to the shipment of pets from this center and evacuees are requested to consult with them if they have pets which they wish to take with them on leaving the Center.

The evacuee property section, on receipt of a written memorandum from the assistant relocation advisor, will furnish crates adequate for the shipment of pets.

STOCKTON WAREHOUSELEN, AGAINST WORKING WITH NISEI, REFUSE TO TALK

Stockton, May 27-Scores of Warehouse workers accused of threatening to strike ruther than work with Nisei, refused recently to testify at preliminary hearings before a union trial committee set up by the executive board of CTO Varehousemen's local 6, according to the San Francisco Chronicle.

The accused members, charged ith violating the union's constitution by practicing racial discrimination, announced they would take the case to the courts.

Leaders of the rebellion later in the day said a mass meeting would be hald .tomorrow night to explain the stand to public, press, and ILWU members. Harold Myatt, Stockton attorney retained to take the case to the courts, vill address the mass meeting. Schmidt, last year's chairman of the Stockton union and apoKesman for the accused members, will preside.

Accused members of the Stockton unit, of the local appeared at the hours of the succersive groups of defendants, beginning at 11 a.m. and running on through the day. Many laid on the table of the trial committee typed statements they had signed unnouncing:

PROTECT YOUR CHILDREN AGAINST TUBERCULOSIS -Released by Council's Health Committee-

Every Poston mother and father should know how to protect a child against tuberculosis, a disease that is found everywhere, and in greater numbers than ever before.

Since tuberculosis is most often caught from someone who has the distase and who spreads it by coughing, mothers should be on guard to see that their children never get close to anyone who coughs.

Any kind of cough is suspicious but a longtime cough or in one which the person coughs

and spits is always dangerous.

Mothers should teach children while they are very small, not to tough things that other people have used such as soiled handkerchiefs, a drinking cup that has not been washed.

Parents should see that children wash their hands with soap and water, always before eating as dirty hands are the easiest way to get

the germs . Mothers should never take their children to visit friends at the hospital when they call on a tubercular patient as children are

more apt to pick up the germs.

Doctors tell us that our greatest protection against tuberculosis is high resistance which goes hand in hand with a fine strong body. This building of resistence takes constant work and long time and is the result of such things as eating the right food, getting enough rest and sleep and playing in outdoors and vsunshine. This pays big dividends in terms of disease prevention.

In all these ways, Poston parents can help to insure their children against | tuberculosis. This insurance policy cannot be paid in money.
