98 FOUND CUILTY OF NOT REPORTING FOR INDUCTION

Found guilty of charges of failure to report for induction. were 98 from Poston, by a ruling of Judge Dave W. Ling on three test cases which cover the issues of all the individual cases, said the June 5 Phoenix Gazeute.

A motion to quash the indictments against the men was denied by Judge Ling prior to his entering judgment on the three test cases. The three defendants three defendants in the "typical" cases, Hiderchi Takeguma, Ya-suto Fujioka, and Kin-go Tajii are to be sen-tenced by Judge Ling on June 18 in the U.S. district court at Phoe-It is almost cermain however, that the cases will be appealed to the U.S. circuit court of appeals and possibly to the. U.S. supreme court.

All 98 cases have been consolidated into one the United States vs. Ben Yumen, and each defendant previously entered a plea of not ball teams at present guilty and waived trial by jury. WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--appreciation for the outstanding part which American soldiers of Japanese ancestry played in the climantic days of the Italian campaign with the Fifth Army against the Germans was expressed in a special division commendation to members of the 442nd Japanese American Combat Team.

Read as a feature of Victory Parade aand Awards Ceremonies of the 442nd at the Novi airport near Genoa the commendation, signed by Major General Edward M. Almond of Luray Va, commanding general of the 92nd "Buffalo" Division, credited the Japanese Americans with "a great part in vanquishing the German foe on the Itulian front."

service regulations have no bearing on these defendants, since they were classed as enemy aliens and had, in the majority of instances, already applied for expatriation to Japan after renouncing American citizen-

ship.
A. L. Wirin, of Los Angeles, attorney for the defendants, submitted the motion to quash pursuant to a stipulation which provided that if the motion was denied certain typical cases would be selected and the remaining complaints be withheld from ruling pending the decision on the test cases and until legal issues were settled in an appellate court.

Affidavits were submitted by Fujioka, Ta-jii and Takeguma. Both Fujioka and Tajii testified that they had asked to renounce American citizenship and to return to Japan and that they had been placed on a "stop-list" prohibiting them from leaving Poston without a military guard. keguma stated he Tahad not reported for induction because he had been deprived of his rights as an American citizen, and therefore, believed he was subject to draft.

All 98 defendants in the case are at liberty on bail.

442nd REGIMENT COLMENDED BY COMMANDING GENERAL (continued from the front page)

"The 442nd Infantry, with its fine combat record, arrived in the Italian theater on March 26, having just previously left a record .of distinguished combat in France with Sixth Army Group, United States Army. Arriving without organizational equipment, the regiment so rapidly equipped itself and conditioned its weapons that it was ready to enter the offensive on April 5 in a most effective manner against the German Gothic Line in the Lugurian Apennine Mountains.

"The performance by units and by individuals has been a magnificent example of speed, drive, and endurance in combat against an enemy entrenched in most difficult terrain and employing every known device of modern combat.

"The task assigned your regiment was most difficult one which entailed repeated assaults against strongly prepared successive defensive positions: The endurance, stamina, and courage of the individuals of this regiment under these difficult conditions deserve the highest commendation. This has been accorded by the Army Group commander, General Mark W. Clark, by the Army Commander, Lieutenant. General Lucian K. Truscott Jr., to which I add my sincere, thanks and appreciation for your splendid service to the nation, the United States Army, and in particular to 92nd Infantry Division. You as individuals should take great pride in your accomplishments as tried and true soldiers who had a great part in vanquishing . the German foe on the Italian front. I am sure your performance will be great satisfaction to each of you for the rest of your lives.

The ad in the Omaha Evening World-Herald is tude toward Jāpanese Americans in the Midwest once the ice has been broken. Some employers who have never known Japanese-Americans are hesitant to employ them at first, but once they have employed Japanese-Americans, they are almost always eager to employ others.
