ONE MORE DAY ALLOWED FOR PICKING UP GRANT

Because the procedure of the relocation division of requiring evacuees to pick up their relocation grants on the day of their departure has proved to be a burden upon them, the present procedure has been amended, announced Corlies R. Carter relocation program officer.

Relocating evacuees may pick up their grants at any time from two days prior to their departure to the day of their departure. Assistant advisors will learn from the evacuees the date on which he desires payment, under normal circumstances three days should be allowed for processing.

All payments will be made during the afternoon working hours.

HOUSE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS \$25 000 000 FOR WRA

The Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives has submitted to Congress a bill recommending a \$25,000,000 appropriation for the WRA for 1946 fiscal year.

The amount represents a reduction of \$140,000 under the sum requested in budget estimates. The appropriation for fiscal year 1945 was \$37,500,000 for WRA, \$12,500,000 more than the sum recommended for the coming fiscal period.

persons, originally under the jurisdiction of the War Relocation Authority, will be detained at Tule Lake center and turned over to Department of Justice authorities. They fall in two categories—those determined by investigation to be undesirable to remain in the United States, and those who have expressed a preference to be returned to Japan. Of the remaining group, all but 53,000 have already been relocated outside the centers. The 53,000 will be relocated at the rate of six or seven thousand per month and all such persons will have left the centers by the end of the calendar year 1945. At that point, the War Relocation Authority will have no further responsibility for the care and custody of these persons and during the remaining 6 months of the fiscal year will wind up its business affairs and be entirely out of business by June 30, 1946.

"The amount of funds required is not reduced in proportion to the reduced period that the centers will have a large population. On that basis, the appropriation would be somewhat less than half the 1945 figure. However, most persons in the centers are entirely without funds and it is necessary, in addition to paying their railroad fare, to furnish them with a small amount for maintenance for a brief period after turning home. These costs are estimated at \$2,323,375. The Tule Lake center must be supported throughout the year and the cost of this center for the fiscal year 1945, \$23,775, is included in the estimate. HEALTH SERVICES IN CENTER TO BE LIMITED

Country-wide shortages of medical, dental, and nursing personnel make it necessary to curtail health services to center residents for the remainder of the WRA program, the Washington health section announced.

Medical staff members believe the reduction of hospital and dental care at projects will not cause undue hardship. WRA's basic health policy remains unchanged. Center doctors, nurses, and dentists will continue to give the most essential services to the greatest possible number.

Hospital cases, however, will be restricted to those immediately essential and those necessary to meet an acute problem. Dental service will be confined to emergency cases and those in which the health of the patient requires immediate dental treatment.

Out-patient service may continue much as in the past, dependent upon facilities at individual centers. Use of outside medical facilities will still be permitted for essential service which cannot be performed at the project.

Director Duncan Mills calling the attention of all residents of Poston to the traffic and safety regulations applicable to Government and private vehicles driven either the confines of the Center.

The following are considered violations of the safety and traffic laws, the memo said:

1. Exceeding posted speed laws. (Twenty-five miles per hour on highway between North Gate and the South Gate and 15 miles per hour within the respective Unit limits.)

2. Failure to observe traffic regulation signs as "Stop," "Slow," and "No Parking."

3. Driving in a reckless manner.

4. Overloading front seat of vehicle. (Two persons in addition to the driver is the limit.)

5. Riding or hanging on to outside of vehicle. (The driver will be held personally responsible for his load.)

6. Driving vehicle knowing that brakes are defective or that it is otherwise unsafe.

7. Failure to use proper hand signals.

8. Driving without proper license.

9. Operating equipment without proper trip sheet.

10. Using Government equipment for other than official business or business designated on trip sheet.

11. Using equipment in such a manner as to cause damage to same.

12. Operating vehicle at night without proper lights.

13. Parking within 20 feet of any building.

Mr. Mills said in the memorandum that the chief of the internal security section was being instructed to make arrests whenever the driver is found to have violated any of the above cited traffic laws.

RETURNEE IN POSTON FOR A WHILE REPORTS THAT FARM OWNERS MIGHT RETURN AS ATTITUDE IS O.K.

George Shimamoto, 53-4-D, has recently returned from his second trip to the Imperial Valley, where he owns 90 acres of land near Seeley, fourteen miles from El Centro. He came back to the center to get his son to return with him to the Valley, in order to repair the house and get things in shape for the return of his entire family in the near future.

He states that during the six weeks that he was there, he did not experience a single unpleasant instant. He traded in El Centro and came into contact with his neighbors, but spent most of his time on his farm. He feels that the areas around El Centro and Calexico are all right now for people to return if they own their own farms.

"I was treated just the same as before Pearl Harbor. My neighbors were friendly."

WINNER OF BRONZE STAR AND GERMAN PRISONER VISITS FAMILY IN UNIT

Pfc. Jou Okitsu, formerly of Brawley, Calif., arrived here Monday night, June 11, and is presently staying with his father, Eikichi Okitsu, 54-1-C.

He was returned to military control April 29 after having been a prisoner of war of the Germans, according to the War Department.

Pfc. Okitsu is a graduate of Brawley High School in 1937. He was called to the army March 18, 1941. He was placed on the enlisted reserve corps February 12, 1942. He was called back into service from Poston August 9, 1943, and trained at Fort Douglas and Camp Shelby, going overseas with the 442nd May 1, 1944. He was shot through the shoulder in Italy July 4, 1944, and was back on duty in about two weeks.

The bronze star was awarded him in Italy for bravery in action, and the citation brought to him in the front lines.

He was reported missing in action in France October 19, 1944, and was later reported as winning this bronze star.

He was captured by the Germans on October 19, 1944, and imprisoned in Stalag #7 until liberated April

MYER WILL INSPECT WRA OFFICE IN S. CALIF.

Southern California WRA facilities are to undergo the inspection of Dillon S. Myer, national director of the agency, it was announced recently.

Myer will spend three days in Los Angeles beginning June 18, going to Fresno for a conference of key personnel from Los Angeles, Seattle and San Francisco on June 22. Mr. Myer visited at Rivers last week.

His one scheduled appearance in the Los Angeles area will present him as speaker before an open meeting in Thorne Hall, Occidental College, at 9 p.m. June 19, under auspices of the Eagle Rock chapter of the Friends of the American Way.

Southern California WRA Supervisor Paul G. Robertson disclosed that more than 50,000 citizens and aliens of Japanese ancestry, all listed officially as eligible to move any place in the nation and screened for loyalty by the War Department, still remain in WRA's eight relocation centers.

Government offices and staffs for assisting eligibles deciding to make their homes in Southern California are now in operation in Los Angeles, San Diego, El Centro, Santa Ana and Santa Barbara.

In announcing the Myer inspection, Supervisor Robertson made public the latest government estimates on returned evacuees showing that since January 2, when the Army lifted the mass exclusion ban, to May 31, a total of 1022 persons relocated in the nine Southern California counties, 911 settled in Los Angeles county.
