#### Poston Streets To Be Paved

A definite plan has been submitted for the construction of the streets in Poston. Present plan calls for pavement of all streets used for transportation of foods from the warehouse to each Mess Hall before the rainy season.

In the city proper there are 26 miles of gravel, of which 10 miles is to be paved. In each Camp, 2 and 3, there are 13 miles of road. Pavements to be done on five miles.

,The maintenance of three camps totaling 20 miles of pavement, 32 miles of gravel is to be done largely by the operators from the city of Poston.

### .A MEDAL FOR 'CHEESY'

Ichiro Yoshimi, 18, and Russell Cleary, have known each other since the third grade, when they went to the same grammar school. During junior high they went separate ways, Ichiro going to Willard, earning his All-Star letter; and Russell working for his sports laurels at Julia Lathrop in Santa Ana.

Senior high school saw them together again, both of them trying out for pole-vaulting, with Russell always encouraging 'Cheesy' (as he called Ichiro), lauding him when he surpassed the others by clearing

11 ft. and when he won his All-Star sweater.

They were both looking forward to the CBL Championship when they could match poles with vaulters from other schools. But in May, just before the event, Ichiro, with his family, suddenly became a resident of Poston, Arizona (38-10-A). Instead of gripping the slim, strong bamboo in his hands, instead of his body agilely soaring through the air, Ichiro took a firm hold on a paintbrush and he and his 5'6", 130 lbs. went to work in the Sign Dept.

The other day Ichiro came home to find a letter waiting for him. It was from Russell. As he tore it open, a piece of metal attached to a yellow ribbon fell out. The inscription read that this medal was for

the 4th place winner in pole-vaulting.

Puzzled, Ichiro read the letter. "Dear 'Cheesy'..." it said, and after some boyish banalities came this simple paragraph, "I got 4th place in the meet with 10'6". I am sending you this medal because you deserve it. I know you could have done as good or better."

Today, Ichiro Yoshimi wears a bronze medal on his watch chain proud-

ly.

in' today".



### DIRECTOR CRAWFORD BUSY MAN

Perhaps, James Daniel Crawford would deny it, but the consensus of opinion among the personnel of Camp #2 is that he is burdened with the most arduous and responsible position in this 2nd unit and is turning in a swell job. As the administrative director of Camp #2, it is Mr.

Crawford's duties, among a multitude of other matters, to co-ordinate and work with the various divisional officers.

Eventually there will be approximately 5.000 Japanese under his su-

pervision in Camp 2. But he modestly claims that "he's staying in the background and the actual and bulk of the work is being performed by the residents themselves".

Coning under his immediate supervision are the following departments and work programs: building up of the block manager system; progression of the work program; agricultural subjugation; development of the open areas within Camp 2; garbage and trash disposal system; division of operations; fire and police departments; and the post office.

Among the divisions with which Director Crawford has been constantly and perseveringly co-ordinating and their respective heads are:
Recreation, Dr. John Pawell; Employment, Miss Katherine L. Mahn; Education, Dr. Miles Carey; Irrigation and Engineering, Robert Rupkey; Maintanance and Work Crew, C. A. Popkins; Social Welfare, Miss Nell Finley; and Stewards,

While the over-all work program and the administrative system may impress one as being slow in spots, it is Mr. Crawford's contention that the general progress has been encouraging and the bottlenecks are

gradually being ironed out.

In a statement in this regards.
Director Crawford said, "We have made favorable progress, in spita of the many and varied hindering circumstances caused by such as the lack of necessary supplies of machinery. The Japanese residents

have all been cooperating splendidly, and I can truthfully say that I have never had so much enjoyment in my life."

At present his office force consists of Miss Allyce Hirabayashi as the receptionist and Miss Kay Nakamura as the secretary and the administration headquarter is located on Block 215.

Canteen No. 2, Blk. 209, is in charge of George Ninomiya, assisted by Mrs. Chiyoki Yagi. Newest unit, Blk. 229, 8-A, opened Thurseday.

A GROUP OF 23 MUSICIANS, most of them formedly of Salinas Assembly Center, has already begun practicing for future entertainment purposes under the guidance of Mrs. Chizu Iwanaga.

#### Camp 2 Employment Bureau Handles 400 Cases Daily ,

Between 300 to 400 cases concerning employment are handled daily by the Employment Bureau of Camp #2, located on Block 210, Recreation Bldg. That significant statement made by the bureau's temporary manager in charge, Hiro Yamamisaka, may serve to give the readers and idea of the immense amount of work undertaken by the interviewing and clerical staff.

Despite the fact that the Unit No. 2 bureau has been in operation approximately three short weeks ago, the entire staff has made rapid advancement in the procedure of its work. This, avers Mgr. Yamamisaka, is due to the effectually basic organizational standards set by the Director of Employment, Miss K. L. Mahn, and to the assistance lent by Henry Kanegai and his staff from Camp #1's Employment Bureau in setting up Unit No. 2's bureau.

"Our job," says Mgr. Yanamisaka, "is to see that qualified persons are placed in their particular lines of endeavor and to assist others

to determine for which position they are best fitted."

#### Sports For Camp 2 Planned

While the recreation dept. of Camp 2, directed by Dr. John Powell, from his administrative office at Camp 1, is still in the process of basic organization, the temporary division leaders here have been endeavoring to formulate, for the time being, a workable plan partly based on the Salinaw Assembly Center model.

All persons interested in recreational leadership are requested by

Dr. Powell to register with him as soon as possible.

"We have not, as yet," stated Director Dr. Powell, "made any appointments as to who the divisional and departmental officers will be. Inasmuch as we desire to place the entire program on an equitable basis and assure the resident participants a complete and worthwhile recreational program, it is necessary that we withhold making any permanent choice for Camp 2 leaders until the unit is filled and allow all qualified persons for responsible positions to sign up and prove their capacity for leadership. The field is yet wide open to all interested."

In the way of outdoor athletics, softball, volleyball, horseshoe pitching and swimming, with checkers, shogi, go, and ping pong among the contemplated indoor sports.

#### Medical and Dental Clinic Staff

A clinic staff of two medical doctors, three dental doctors, one chiropractor, one optometrist, and two pacrmacists are available to the residents of this camp in Block 216, Barrack 7A.

The establishment is temporary and except for minor cases, all medical and dental work will be done in the hospital in Camp 1 until the

completion of a hospital here.
