POPULATION STATISTICS FOR THREE UNITS TOLD

Total population for Poston on June 23 was: 9,503: in block: 9,261; on short-term, 242. During the week following, 137 left on terminal departure, and two were admitted, making, on June 30, a total population of 9,346; in blocks, 9,128; on short-term, 240.

Total population for Camp I was 5,391 as of June 23: in block, 5,224; on short-term, 167. Net change was 45 terminals, making a total of 5,346: in block, 5,180; on short-term, 166, according to a recent statistics section report.

Total population for Camp II was 1,860 as of June 23: in block, 1,827; on short-term, 33. Net change was 21: 22 leaving on terminals, and 1 being admitted, making the total population 1,839 on June 30: in block, 1,802; on short term, 37.

Total population for Camp III was 2,252 as of June 23: in block, 2,210; on short-term, 42. Net change was 69: 70 leaving on terminals, and 1 being admitted, making total population on June 30, 2,183: in block, 2,146; on short-term, 37.

Nisei in Air Force Visits in Poston

Sgt. Michael Kamimoto, 31-6-B, one of the few Nisei in the air corps, arrived in Poston recently on furlough. He wears the wings of the Army Air Force.

Formerly of San Juan Bautista, Sgt. Kamimoto was assistant flight engineer in a transport plane flying lend-lease for Allied Forces in the European theater of operations. His flying service included the evacuation of the wounded, and hauling supplies and cargo to battlezones. He stated he learned many things that are worthwhile, especially in commercial aviation in which he is interested.

"I certainly hope someday soon the war will be over, for the good of all," he stated.

He was a Flying Cadet before the war. Discharged, he came to Poston and then went outside. He trained at Shelby and went overseas last year with the 442nd, but immediately was put to work in the air corps.

98 REFUSING INDUCTION GIVEN ONE-YEAR SENTENCES BY JUDGING IN PHOENIX

Federal Judge Dave Ling showed leniency towards the 98 Nisei at Poston, charged with refusing to obey draft board orders, when he imposed sentences of one year in three cases which are to serve as test cases for appeal to the Circuit Court of Appeals at San Francisco and possibly to the Supreme Court of the United States. In these cases, the majority of those involved have sought expatriation, and are in a similar class to the Selective Service violators at Tule Lake, said the June 30 Los Angeles Open Forum, published by the A. C. L. U.

In the Tule Lake cases, Federal Judge Louis Goodman of San Francisco ordered criminal charges dismissed on the ground that persons imprisoned in Relocation Centers were not subject to the draft. An appeal in the three test cases was taken by their attorney, A. L. Wirgin.

In the three test cases, Hideichi Takeguma, Yasuto Fujioka and Kingo Tajiri, Judge Ling permitted the Nisei to remain on bail of \$1000. At the same time, Judge Ling reduced the bail in the remaining 95 cases to \$500, and postponed decision in the 95 cases until the higher courts act in the test cases. All of the Poston defendants have been out on bail while their cases have been pending before Judge Ling, and will continue to remain on bail until the higher courts decide the question. Judge Ling explained the reasons for his showing leniency and consideration by stating that the defendants were actually imprisoned anyway in the Poston Relocation Center;

In addition to the two boys mentioned in last week's issue, who reported for Ft. Douglas on June 30, were two others. They were Yoneo B. Akahori, 222-4 B, and Thomas T. Saruwatari, 27-6-A.

George Ito, 38-4-A, was added to the list of inductees who reported to Phoenix on June 29.

Induction of Don Jiro and Ross Ichiro Yoshisato, 19-10-B, both of whom have yet to take pre-induction physicals, was postponed. The brothers were notified to report for physicals on July 16.

FUNERAL DIRECTOR WILL NOT STAY AT POSTON

Under a new contract for funeral services, signed and effective July 1, the funeral director does not intend to stay at Poston as has been his custom in the past, but instead he will come to Poston from his place of business in Yuma only when called upon.

TREK BACK TO CALIFORNIA OF ROWHERS DESCRIBED IN CHURCH PUBLICATION

In the May issue of THE MESSENGER, a magazine published by the Evangelical and Reformed Church, David D. Baker describes the first train caravan of Rowher evacuees who were greeted in St. Louis on their way home to California. Excerpts from Mr. Baker's article entitled "Fearful of Freedom" follow:

"Such a beaten lot of just plain folks you could scarcely imagine. Grandmothers and grandfathers who spoke rather broken English; young mothers and fathers weighed down with babies and baggage; some mothers alone with babies--"G.I. babies," one of them said laughingly; "with daddies in France." A few young girls with high heels and veils--no different from our own Caucasian girls; younger boys and girls running up and down the steps of the Y.W.C.A. There had been no steps to climb in the Rowher Relocation Center and this was strange fun.

Who were they? None other than a group of Japanese Americans passing through St. Louis on their way back to California...

The group of 68 had left Rowher, Arkansas, the night before...

It was announced that the Y.M.C.A. was welcoming them for their six-hour layover. A few were anxious to get off and relax. Most of them held back; they had heard too many rumors of Japanese American mal-treatment to feel sure. But finally all were persuaded, save one who was sick. (She was taken in a wheel-chair to the station hospital). At the Y.W.C.A. coats were set up for the babies, who proceeded to make up for

the sleep they had lost the night before. A few brave souls ventured out to shop; most of the crowd, however, preferred to stay inconspicuously behind the sheeting walls of the Y.W. When you've lived behind barbed wire for thirty months, it takes courage to appear as a free man.

Fortunately, people were kind; there were scarcely any cold stares. This was very good for the morale of the Japanese Americans who were feeling painfully conspicuous...

One mother who had ridden in our car to the station came up to shake hands and say goodbye. That started an avalanche of handshaking. One after another--old men and old women who couldn't speak too clearly--came up to say thank you. It made one feel humble, to say the least. Why on earth should they thank us? And how on earth would they?

Easter Sunday morning they would be in Sacramento. What then? Most of them had homes waiting for them, the same homes from which they had been evacuated three years ago. But in what condition would they find them and what about rumors they had been hearing of white people refusing to take out of Japanese American-owned homes? With in some of their old neighbors plus the knowledge that the camp must be evacuated were all that urged them on.

The faith was probably justified. We haven't heard. But the scars of evacuation will remain."

GILA DOCTOR TO WORK AT
LOS ANGELES POLYCLINIC

Gila River announced the relocation of one of its most prominent residents last week, that of Dr. George Iki, recognized as Canal's "Dean of doctors" by evacuees and appointed staff.

Although Dr. Iki lived in Sacramento before evacuation, he has relocated to Los Angeles where he will be associated with the Polyclinic. He had been chief surgeon at the center hospital since it opened, and chairman of the medical committee.

On his return to the center from a trip to investigate conditions in Los Angeles, Dr. Iki expressed the opinion that the evacuees have more friends now than before evacuation. Telling center residents that he was "enthusiastic" about his acceptance in the city, he said that people "went out of their way to be friendly and helpful."

Through a doctor friend, Dr. Iki was able to secure an apartment which he says "will do for the time being." On his own initiative he also secured a telephone.

HAWAIIAN VETERAN STUDIES AT IOWA STATE ALTHOUGH HANDICAPPED

The following story comes from the June 10 Des Moines Sunday Register:

HIS LEG GONE AND PARTLY BLIND NISEI VETERAN STUDIES, HOPES

Ames, Iowa-- It is hard to see how Kenneth Otagaki, 27, retains his amiable disposition.

Studying animal husbandry at Iowa State college isn't easy when you have one leg, and you must scurry around barnyards on crutches.

Keeping up your studies in college isn't comfortable when you are partly blind in one eye and "can't see so good" out of the other. Nor is it easy to take notes in class with a right hand from which fingers have been blown off.

Kenneth volunteered for the army nine months before Pearl Harbor, when the Japanese attacked. An anti-aircraft shell plunged through the roof of his barrack and exploded three beds away from where he was sleeping.

"It demolished the bed, locker and everything around there," he said, "but I didn't get a scratch."

He was sent to Africa in 1943 and later landed at Salerno, Italy. He was in Italy for six months before he was wounded, "and we fought every day of that time."

Otagaki, a Nisei native of Hawaii, was critically wounded at Cassino, Italy, while serving in the famous 100th Battalion, composed of soldiers of Japanese ancestry. He was one of eight volunteers who went forward in the snow on a bitterly cold day to rescue two wounded men.
