LATH HOUSE PLANNED FOR NURSERY DEPT.

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Under difficult conditions prevailing in the Center in obtaining necessary materials to develop a nursery large enough to fulfill the capacity as a center nursery, the department has requisitioned for a lath house, 60x120ft.; two of such structures will be made soon. The lath house will be used in stratification of vegetable seed, as well as flower seeds, this measure has been taken to insure maximum result from seeds imported. The plants so stratified will be distributed to the various Agricultural Dept. for final planting outdoors.

At the present time, a temporary lath house has been constructed from tree branches, to protect the tender plants from the direct rays of the sun. Cuttings for flower bushes of various varieties have been received from Phoenix, Arizona and are proving to be satisfactory.

The first of the agricultural seed to be planted will be the celery seed, which is expected to cover approximately five acres of ground. All planting will be carried on experimental basis, covering only small plots.

Harry Kikuchi, head of the Nursery Dept., stated he has about 25 workers at the present time, majority of whom are experienced workers, he also stated that the actual development of the nursery is pending upon the arrival of materials and supplies.

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POSTON TO HAVE 12 ACRES TOMATOES

The Agriculture Dept. of Poston has steadily been developing and planning the land allotted to farming. Already, most of the firebreaks and more than 16 acres have been cleared; and as soon as the necessary equipment and machinery arrives, actual work on the soil will begin. Twelve acres near Blk. 6, which is under the supervision of Frank Fukuda, will yield tomatoes later.

All, or most of the vegetables grown will be primarily for camp consumption. Fish hatcheries, bee-keeping, hogs, poultry, and other projects are being worked out by the Agriculture Dept.

The western section of the community is to be developed this year; the adjoining area next year. In time, Poston will be a flourishing farming sector of America.

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SHOP BUILDINGS GOING UP

Two new shop buildings are being built, one east of the warehouse, and one across the highway on the east.

The first building is to have three shops for the maintenance of Camp 1, electricity plumbing, and carpenter shops. It is being built by Del Webb Construction Co. and will be about 100'x40'. It should be completed in a few weeks," said Roy Potter, Transportation and Supply officer. The other building across the highway, is being built by WRA, and completion is expected next month.

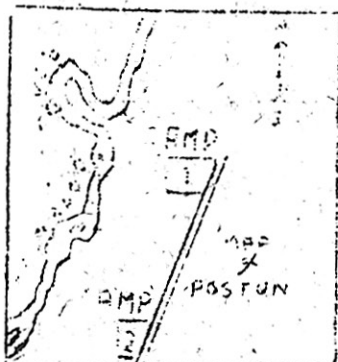

Any persons having qualifications as sanitary inspectors are requested to report to Mr. Kido, situated in the Public Health department in the Camp 1 hospital.

One of the most ardent protectors for the safety and well-being of this community is the fire department, managed by Chief Fireman Seizo Kodani, Block 218.

At present the department is equipped with one fire truck and 800 feet of 2-inch hose. Another fully-equipped truck is expected to arrive soon.

The lack of necessary equipment compels the Chief to stress the public in being exceptionally careful with matches, cigarettes, and electrical appliances. Fires of any kind are prohibited in the camp.

There have been reports that many fire extinguishers have been tampered with and left in a useless state. The department requests all residents to be careful in this regard, for a major disaster may result from such carelessness.

Chief Kodani also requests the residents to stop using water if a fire should break out so that a reserve may be built up.

Assisting Kodani in the corps are Captain Utaka Nakamoto and a crew of 8 First Class firemen.

**TEACHER TRAINING COURSE
TO START AUG. 3RD WITH
DR. HOWARD AS DIRECTOR**

Training courses will commence Aug. 3rd for all persons seeking teachers' positions in the local schools, as reported by Dr. Carey of Camp #1, who is heading the school system.

The course, directed by Dr. Howard, is designed to teach the Nisei applicants the fundamental principles of tutorship.

Diplomas will be awarded at the conclusion of the course on Sept. 11th. Qualified Niseis are asked to register with the Employment Bureau.

The school system will consist of 25 Caucasian and 25 Nisei teachers, all of whom must have a college degree.
