

442ND SLATED FOR JAPAN OCCUPATION

The August 18 issue of the Pacific Citizen reported that the famed 442nd (Japanese American) Combat Team, now stationed in Northern Italy, will be sent to Japan to assist in the occupation of the home islands of Japan.

The 442nd has previously been scheduled for redeployment to the United States in February, 1946, and was to have been placed in the strategic reserve.

Japanese Exclusion League Founders Are Charged With Fraud

Founders of the Japanese Exclusion League, Arthur J. Ritchie, former Seattle newspaperman, and E. A. McCroskey, one-time oil promoter, faced charges of fraud Aug. 23, as a war veteran sought to recover \$1,250 which he asserts he invested in an enterprise known as the Victor Lewis Associates, stated the Seattle Star of Aug. 23, said Harold S. Fistere, in a wire to the project Monday.

The Star stated that in a complaint filed by Attorney Ralph Hammer in Superior Court, H. P. Mears, 1733 Belmont Place, charged that the two promoters led him to believe that they had secured the services of Alonzo Victor Lewis, Swattle sculptor, to create war memorials in parks and public squares throughout the nation.

They represented to Mears, the complaint reads, that they had each paid Lewis \$500 apiece to "commercialize the sculptor's ability" although he claims they only said that to "deceive him and lead him to believe that they had faith in the promotion of the enterprise" George Crandall, attorney for the defendants said today he had entered a demurrer to be heard next Monday and that "there is no basis whatever for the suit." Mears, he said, voluntarily invested in the association and had secured a 40th interest in the sculptor's creations.

MYER ANSWERS LETTER FROM ALL-CENTER CHAIRMAN

Following is a letter dated August 13, 1945, from Dillon S. Myer, national W.R.A. director, in reply to a letter from, and addressed to, Mr. Masaru Narahara, Chairman, All-Center Headquarters, Central Utah Relocation Center, Topaz, Utah.

Dear Mr. Narahara:

I am glad to have your letter of July 23 and to learn that the all-center conferees will continue cooperating in the relocation program. I cannot, however, concur in your major recommendation that the centers be maintained beyond the present closing dates.

Your letter, of course, is based on the premise that there are a number of people in centers who are "incapable of relocating." This is a premise with which I strongly disagree. Over the past nine months we have steadily improved the types of services and assistance which our field offices are equipped to render for relocating families and individuals. We have already helped people with almost every conceivable type of problem in making a successful adjustment back to private life. I have no doubt whatever that we can continue doing this for everyone remaining in the centers.

I have said it before, but I want to repeat that the problems of relocation cannot be met by remaining in the centers, living over past grievances, and conjuring up reasons why relocation is "impossible." These problems can only be met by going out, facing them, and working with the WRA field offices toward a feasible solution. None of the evacuees enjoyed absolute security before evacuation, and we are not of course in position to guarantee absolute security for everyone leaving the centers now; very few people in this country or anywhere else are fortunate enough to have such a guarantee. But we can and will help people through the admittedly difficult transition

COUNCIL APPEALS TO SWISS IN RICE SITUATION

Chairman G. Iseda of the Community Council disclosed at the Council meeting on Tuesday, Aug. 21, 1945, that at the Council had appealed to the Swiss Legation for assistance in obtaining a sufficient supply of rice until the center's closure. The Poston Red Cross had also asked the Red Cross Office in Washington, D.C., for assistance.

It was revealed that the last supply of rice had been distributed to the mess halls. Unless the army is willing to lift its order freezing the rice supply, Poston would no longer be able to obtain rice.

The Local Councils of Units II and III recommended the disbursement of the Community Council general fund to each of the local councils of the three units since Units II and III will be terminated. The Community Council appointed a committee consisting of Chairman Iseda G. Katow, chairman of finance committee, and each of the unit administrators to estimate the amount of expense that will incur with the closing of this center. The body decided to donate the sum left in the general fund to each of the councils for assistance in relocation.

Circuit Court of Appeals at Denver, recently, reported the Los Angeles Open Forum, Aug. 25.

Frank Emi, as well as Kiyoshi Okamoto, Paul T. Nakadate, Tsutomu Wakaye, Minoru Tamasa, Isamu Horino and Guntaro Kubota, Nisei Heart Mountain Relocation Center residents, were sentenced after a trial at Cheyenne, Wyo., to penitentiary sentences of from two to four years.

They were all leaders of the Fair Play Committee, originally organized by Okamoto to secure a clarification of the rights of the Nisei, and to protest the military evacuation and the WRA detention. When the Selective Training and Service Act was enforced against Nisei at the centers; the Fair Play Committee, as claimed by its leaders, took the position that the applicability of the draft to persons detained in relocation centers should be challenged in the courts, and that they refused to report for induction or physicals until measures to remedy past wrongs had been taken.

The appeal is set for hearing in the Federal Court of Appeals, Denver, Sept. 6; Atty.

In a wire just received by T. Sumida from Masano Sano, he says: "This is to advise that I found Wilson

Plantation exactly as presented by Mr. Ragon. I am well pleased with whole situation and recommend it to all other evacuee farmers. I am going to stay here. Have wired my family to leave about September 15th to relocate with me on Wilson Plantation. Cotton season is late, so would advise all evacuees coming here to leave center 15th to 20th of September. Main cotton picking season will start 20th to 25th of September. Families coming should notify Little Rock office two weeks in advance of departure, so arrangements can be made at Wilson for their arrival."

period between the time when they leave the centers and the time when they resume life in normal communities once again.

By the time you receive this, the WRA plan for scheduling relocation on a quota basis during the last several weeks before each center's closing will doubtless have been announced. Under this plan there will of course be no "residue" at any center on the closing date. All center residents will have left by that time.

I want to emphasize that this plan was adopted only after long and, I think, extremely patient effort by WRA to keep the relocation program on an entirely voluntary basis. We have given center residents ample warning that the centers were going to close before the end of the year. We have allowed many months in which to make relocation plans and complete necessary arrangements. Yet many of the residents--because of bad advice, wishful thinking, or both--have persisted in holding back and refusing to take advantage of our facilities and services. The quota plan was adopted not in any sense as a punishment for such people but as a practical device for achieving a comparatively even flow of movement during the weeks that remain before the final closing of all centers. Under the plan residents will of course be given the greatest possible freedom of choice in the selection both of relocation destinations and departure dates.

I fully agree that there must be mutual understanding and cooperation between the center residents and WRA, and want to assure you that we shall continue our operations in that spirit until the last resident is relocated.

SOLDIERS OF EUROPE AND ONE OF PACIFIC VISIT

UNIT I LIBRARY GETS
NEW HOURS AND NEW BOOKS

Sgt. Seichi "Buster" Minami, of Compton, Calif., has been on the project visiting his father at 309-8-A. He has been on furlough from Camp Carson, Colo., where he is a patient. He came back from overseas May 26 of 1945.

He wears the presidential citation, the European theater ribbon with three campaign stars, the combat infantry badge, and the good conduct ribbon.

He entered the service January 21, 1942. He was at Shelby, in the cadet school, and when, in April of 1943, 2600 from Hawaii entered there, he was among the persons who trained them. Soon men from the relocation centers entered, and these were trained. The looth went over first, and as the others were trained, replacements were sent. On the 1st of May, the 2nd and 3rd battalions pulled out, and Sgt. Minami was among them. They met the looth just above Rome. One battalion had been left in the States, and replacements were sent from this remaining battalion.

They started in France about the end of September. In the rescue of the 36th Lost Battalion, in October 1944, four riflemen came back of the 231 who originally went, Sgt. Minami said. He served in three campaigns: the Arno, the one for the Appennines, and the Rhineland.

(For their rescue feat, the 442nd soldiers who rescued them were presented a silver plaque by the survivors of the 36th (Texas) Division's now-famous "Lost Battalion.")

Under the "Remember the Alamo" regimental insignia of the 141st Infantry Regiment, of which the encircled battalion was a part, and under the insignia of the 442nd, are en-

graved these words:

"B the 442nd Infantry Regiment: With Deep Sincerity and Utmost Appreciation for the gallant fight to effect our rescue after we had been isolated for seven days.

1st Battalion, 141st Infantry Regiment.

Biffontaine, France. From the 24th to the 30th of October, 1944.")

In Sgt. Minami's company were four of Poston's boys who are never to return: Pvt. Joe Shiomichi, Sgt. John Ogawa, Sgt. Lloyd Onoye, and Pvt. Tadao Hayashi.

Sgt. Minami plans to go to school in Michigan or Milwaukee, following his discharge from the Army.

Following his visit here he will visit his brother in Milwaukee.

He has three other brothers: one in Germany, one in England, and one discharged from the Army.

Others who visited here included three with the 442nd who returned to Poston to spend their furloughs before going on to Ft. Snelling.

Pfc. Seiji B. Hamamoto visited relatives at 38-1-C. He wore the Presidential citation and combat badge with 3 bronze stars, having seen active service in France, Italy, and Germany for 11 months. A former resident of Poston from North Hollywood, he attended Leuzinger High School and Compton, J. C. at Hawthorne.

Pvt. Kaoru Kamochi, 42-3-B, was at Poston with his wife and 2 children. He also has received a Presidential unit citation. Kamochi was inducted from Poston, going overseas in Nov., 1944. Evacuated from Oxnard, Calif., he graduated Stockton grammar and high school. He has a brother in the service.

Instead of being too resentful of their status they are perspiring under the hot Poston sun over 8 hours a day so that the exodus from the camp may be processed more smoothly. Some consideration by the WRA should be given these boys.

Many who have returned from short term visits to the Pacific coast say it's no wonder that the people in camp are so dull and listless because of the extremely hot weather here. They say that once you get out in the cool of the ocean breeze, you feel like working and doing anything. So I guess it's no use worrying that we have become lazy here and won't be able to work.

August is just at the end. Just one more month to go!

In the article in the Pacific Citizen, Sgt. Sam Rokutani, one of the first Japanese American soldier ~~mand~~ in the Okinawa campaign to return to the United States declared last week that the enemy Japanese soldiers display no special feeling of hate for Americans of Japanese ancestry fighting against them and "just took them for granted."

A veteran of fighting on Saipan and Leyte, Sgt. Rokutani was wounded on the last day of organized resistance on Okinawa by the explosion of an enemy mortar shell a few feet from where he and his fellow Nisei GI's were trying to ferret two fugitive Japanese generals from a cave.

Sgt. Rokutani, formerly of Alameda and Unit III, now resides at 1725 James Ave., St. Paul, Minn. He arrived Aug. 1 after 31 months in the Pacific for a 30 day visit with his mother and brother.

Sam will be remembered in this unit as the first volunteer for the army and a peppy first baseman of the first Poston III All-Star Baseball Team.
