 * DR. SCHNUR CALLED TO ACTIVE DUTY WITH THE ARMED FORCES *

Local residents will miss Dr. Leo Schnur, Director of Health and Sanitation, who leaves Aug. 1st to serve with the Armed Forces of the U.S., as a Captain in the Medical Corps.

"I regret that I must leave you so soon. I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the Hospital and Administrative staffs for their kind cooperation during my stay at Poston. I wish you all lots of luck", was his final statement to the Press as he announced his departure.

Formerly from Tuba City Hospital, where he was Senior Physician in charge, Dr. Schnur was appointed here May 5th, from which date he has served with untiring efforts in organizing the medical service for this community. Dr. Schnur will be remembered as being the backbone of the whole setup here regarding hospitalization and sanitation. He was instrumental in the building of the present 250-bed hospital, in fixing quarters for doctors and nurses, and getting all drugs and equipment. His advice and his high ideals, were heartening and reassuring to his hospital staff. His various talks at Mess-Halls gave confidence to despondent people who had been just transplanted here to the pioneer-life from civilization.

It is with deep regret that his friends see him leave, for his hopes and ideals have only just begun to take root; but his work will be appreciated all the more when this enterprise reaches successful maturity.

SURVEY FOR PROSPECTIVE BULLETIN BUYERS STARTED

All the daily happenings of Poston fit to print will also be printed.

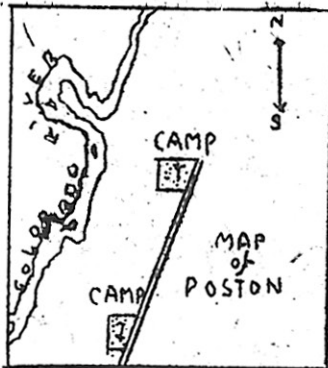
COUPLE MARRIED

The council immediately settled down to the businesses at hand and decided that the following committees be appointed: agriculture, mess hall and food, education, recreation, adobe construction; entertainment, charter committee, public health, community enterprises, domestic water supply and irrigation, landscape gardening, police, fire, religion, and employment.


NURSERY SCHOOL #1 OPENS
