" POSTON'S CANAL SYSTEM NEAR COMPLETION "

To date, roughly 6200' of the Main Canal has been completed: 2640' running west and 2610' running south; also, approximately 2650' of the sub-main on the Turn Out #1 has been dug, according to Shig Imamura,

Water Master of the Poston Irrigation District, yesterday.

Approximately 1800' of the Main Canal remains to be dug. The Main Canal when completed will measure about 6600', from Poston's city limits on the east to those on the south. This excludes sub-mains. With the sub-mains, there will be 14,700' or about three miles of canal in Camp 1.

Now there are about 10 second feet or 4490 gallons of water per minute in the canals. (One second foot will cover one acre one foot deep in 24 hours). Maximum will be about 20 second feet. Average

flow will be about 10-15 second feet for Camp 1.

Ultimately, Poston's water comes from Headgate Rock Diversion Dam, from which water is diverted to irrigate Indian territory around Parker. A main canal leads there to Poston's Main Canal, called "73.2", which starts five miles outside of Camp 1.

WAIVER OF FISHING LICENSES FOR EVACUEES REFUSED

PHOENIX, July 28. (AP) -- Reprinted from the Los Angeles Times --- Japanese evacuees on relocation projects in Arizona will be required to buy a \$25 non-resident hunting and fishing license or a \$75 alien license, K.C. Kartchner, State Game Warden, asserted today in reply to a proposal that those on the Colorado River Indian Reservation be permitted to hunt and fish without charge.

William Zimmerman Jr., assistant commissioner of the Division of Forestry and Grazing, proposed to Henry Welsh, reservation tribal council chairman, that the \$5 reservation hunting and license fee be

waived for the Japanese.

Kartchner said State licenses always have been required for reservation hunting and fishing in Arizona.

3000 EVACUEES EXPECTED STARTING MONDAY

Beginning Monday, August 3, approximately 3000 evacuees from Visalia and Reedley are expected here at the rate of about 500 a day for six days according to Moris Burge, Director of Housing and Registration. The incoming groups will probably be received at Camp 3 Intake Center.

Although Camp 2 is not yet filled to capacity, all three camps will be fully occupied very soon.

SALES OF WAR BONDS and stamps are reported to be good although the percentage of people is small.

The total sale last month was \$1068. The same amount or more is expected to be sold this month, according to the local Post Office.


She will depart from Parker; 11 P.M. Friday for Minneapolis, Minn., to join her husband, who is stationed at Camp Savage.

CRAWFORD ASKS COOPERATION

"Poston's program is your responsibility as well as mine. The Addinistration is opposed to a dictatorship. We hope to get things done by consultation and by advising....By coopera-

tion, by working together, we hope to make Unit 2 the outstanding Camp in Poston." Such, in essence, were the words of Director James D. Crawford to the "pre-temporary" community council which met Thursday evening in the 214 mess hall.

In making a general report on the program and progress being made in Unit 2, Mr. Crawford presented an enlightening history of Poston and advised as to the high aims and hopes of the Administration, headed by Made Hoad, for a radiant and prosperous Poston future.

In regards to the program and progress being made, Director Crawford had this to say: "A major portion of our time will be devoted to agriculture. While we have 80,000 acres of cultivable land, we expect a maximum of 25,000 acres to be in production. By this fall, we expect to have several hundred acres planted."

The school system will get underway by September. Mr. Crawford stated that recreation is another big project and that "an must retain our aesthetic values of living." Mr. Hand is endeavoring at all times to keep the Army convinced that there is no necessity for restrictions, on such as radios and other things which will aid us in making Poston an ideal community.

Mr. Crawford closed his address to the council members with the following words: "I? we suffer together daily, we will all learn to support and help each other, and work for the best Unit."

Three members for each of the 15 committees were announced by Chairman H rry Kita; and Secretary John Maeno requested each committee to get to work as soon as possible as fact-finding, investigative committees.

Sponsored by Bl!. Mer. Yasushi S. Mimoto, the organizational plan is in charge of Nic! Nishi. The club be comprised of 221 teen-age lads and will be formed along Boy Scout lines to maintain the block as habitable and comfortable as possible.

MILK SUPPLY TO BE INCREASED
