HOME OWNERS TO REGISTER PROPERTY

Rental agents for Japanese evacuees must register under the federal rent-control act, it was announced today by Ted Haas, Project Attorney.

"If you have rentable property, rented or offered for rent in one of the defense-rental areas," said Mr. Haas, "it must be registered either by you or your agent. If you have an agent, be certain he has filed your property. If you personally are handling the renting of your own property, it will be necessary for you to obtain and fill out the regular registration form."

You can obtain registration forms by applying to Ted Haas. Requests should be made not later than Aug. 15, 1942.

The rent law covers all types of dwelling units, but not commercial structures unless any portion is used for dwelling accommodations, nor does it include farm lands or any dwellings thereon which are customarily used in the farm operations. If, however, a structure exists on a farm and it, or any part of it, is rented solely for purposes of residence, it must be so registered.

If you are in doubt as to whether your property is located in one of the defense-rental areas, be on the safe side and consult your camp director. If still in doubt, apply for application blank, which will be mailed to you if your property is in one of the areas.

POSTON RESIDENTS TO GET POULTRY FARM

The cackling of hens, and crowing of roosters may soon be heard by the citizens of Poston, when the first batch of approximately 5,000 ten-week old chicks make their appearance to begin the first poultry farm for the "agricultural" city. The shipment which is "due" within the short time will become the future home of "Egg Baskets" to provide the people of the Center.

Subjugation of the poultry area is now under way, with more than eighty acres of land to be cleared. The industry, when completed, will produce enough eggs to go around to "everyone" in Poston 1, it was asserted.

The Agricultural Dept. in pioneering this great project, reveals that modern heating system of brooder will be constructed to protect the chicks during the winter, as well as numerous 20x20 coops to accommodate 250 chicks each. Experimental constructions on a "underground" or "basement" coops for the hens to shelter them from excess heat, are also being planned.

The farm will be located on Section 34, with eighty acre tract, sub divided, which in turn will be sectioned into one acre lots. Here will grow green substances to food the chickens.

FAIR PLANNING BOARD TO HOLD MEETING, TOMORROW

The Fair Planning Board will hold a meeting this Wednesday, August 12, 7:30 p.m. at Mess 32 for the purpose of forming a more permanent committee for the coming Poston County Fair. The date has not been set yet.

Various committees will have their reports ready, and it "is hoped" that details and date could be set at that time. On the program planned will be the vegetable raising contests, bazaars, concessions, and displays of industrial models.

The most diversified athletic program yet to be seen in Poston, which will include swimming, boxing, judo, sumo, wrestling and soft ball will be featured during the Festival.

Min Nitta and his Orange County boys helped the Riverside nine to clinch the American League pennant when they defeated the second place Delano team to the tune of 5-3, August 9 on Fld. 30.

ERROR IN EIGHTH FRAME RESULTS IN WINNING SCORE FOR "OUR SIDE"

A crowd of approximately 2600 Postonians braved the dust and the wind of Poston, Sunday night to watch the home team All-Stars squeeze out a 1 to 0 decision over the formidable Polecats of Poston One in the first of the series of games to be played between the three Poston Areas.

Following seven scoreless innings, an outfield error with a runner on second base produced the determining run for the All-Stars in the eighth frame. Shig Morimune, pinch-batting for "Jug" Takeshita slammed out a high fly to the centerfield which slid out of the leftfielder's glove, whereupon, Matsuo scurried home from second and in a dust-filled atmosphere, slid under the mitt of Catcher Teshima for the lone tally of the game.

The game was closely contested in all nine innings, and without the eighth inning error, darkness probably would have halted a scoreless ball game.
