POSTON HIGH SCHOOL PRELITINARY REGISTRATION TAKEN

First registration for high school students, (9, 10, 11, 12 grades) will begin immediately, Dr. "iles E. Cary, Director of Education informed the Press yesterday. Official forms are now available at all Elk. Manager's office, and students must return their application by Friday noon, August 14th. In filling out the form, Dr. Cary advises the enrolless to keep definitely in mind, "the occupation most interthe enrollees to keep definitely in mind, "the occupation most interesting to them." Practical courses will follow in this new institution in Poston.

The required subjects are English, Social Studies, Physical Education and part-time work. It is suggested that each student enroll in two elective courses in the following fields: Agriculture, Arts and Crafts, Commercial Studies, Momemaking, Larguages, (Spanish, Latin, etc.) Mathematics, (Algebra, Plane Geometry, etc.) and Shop, (Mood-

work).

The registration of students will determine the number of teachers required for the Poston High School.

POSTON TO MANUFACTURE CALOUFLAGE METS

A new project under the current war-time defense program for the manufacture of camouflage nets under the direction of army engineers,
