BEST ASK FOR WOMEN AIDES IN MESS HALLS

To replace manpower necessary for the development of outdoor projects, Earl Best, Chief Steward, on Monday night at Mess Hall 32, requested representatives of all mess halls to decrease their man power and replace required labor in many instances with women workers. It was pointed out that while women can replace men in table service and as stewards, essential jobs such as those of cooks and dish washers cannot be filled by women.

The Chief Steward revealed that the center is now operating 71 mess halls and his department is employing the largest percentage of work-

ers in Poston.

Mess Hall representatives declared that the past week has brought about a situation where insufficient food is being served in most kitchens. Mr. Fest attributed the shortage to the sudden increase in Poston's population through the emergency opening of Toston III last week.

Representatives from the city council, supported by kitchen workers from the three Center units, strongly urged the chief steward's department to make daily distribution of supplies to all kitchens. Committee members representing the cooks are formulating a menu, based on the U.S. Army ration allotment of 40 cents per head per day. Requisition of food supplies based upon this menu is expected to become effective within 50 days.

The next meeting for cooks will be held, as tentatively revealed, on Aug. 15 with time and place to be announced later, when the menu will be formulated and the future activity of the cooking school will

be determined.

AGRICULTURE DEFT. REVEALS PLANTING TABLE

So that the residents of Poston may widen their knowledge in regards to planting time for vegetables in their Victory Garden, the Agriculture Dept. today released to the Pross, a general outline of Center's future agriculture program relative to climates, seasonal and soil conditions.

The data, which is the thorough study made by the Dept. shows that relatively high temperatures, continuous mostly during the summer, with low humidity prevailing throughout the year, with almost negligible precipitation. Short winters with mild climate, and "killing frost" occurring from the middle of November to the middle of March is seen annually. The soil in this area is of clay sandy loam, with a second content of soil may be certain amount of alkalinity included. Three grades of soil may be hard, medium and soft.

Celery seedling: Utah Pascal, Thite Crystal Giants-August and September-Potatoes: Irish Cobbler, Puerto Rico Yam, Nancy Hall-August 20 to September 10. Turnips: Purple Top Thite Globe, Early Snow Ball--August-January 30. Squash: Zucchini, Thite Scallop, Yellow Crookneck --March 1-September 1.

the convenience of the residents.
