POSTON 2 DEPARTMENT HEADS TO MEET RECULARLY TO DISCUSS PROBLEMS FIRST MEETING TODAY

To exchange ideas, discuss individual departmental problems, coordinate each other's activities and to work toward the welfare and progress of Poston 2, inter-departmental meetings will be held regularly, it was announced Tuesday by Director James D. Crawford.

The first of the meetings, scheduled to be held on either a twice-weekly or weekly basis, will be observed Wednesday at 2:00 p.m.

Every departmental head of Poston 2 will be invited to attend the meetings. It is the hope of Director Crawford that such gatherings will make each department conscious of the other's problems and dove-tail such questionable points to eliminate any "bottle-necks" in the progress of administrative details.

10 BLOCKS FAVOR WRA COUNCIL SETUP 5 BLOCKS POSTPONE ELECTION

The final count of the block meetings as to whether Poston 2 will have a representative community council or not revealed that ten blocks had voted in favor of such a temporary council and had either nominated or petitioned for candidates to be elected.

"AGR PROGRAM MAKING PROGRESS LATH HOUSE, PERGOLA UNDER CONSTRUCTION, NURSERY PLANNED

Despite the prevailing circumstances in regards to the shortage of supplies, equipments, etc.,
the agriculture department of Poston 2 is making definite progress.

In this respect, Charles Onoye, temporary chief of organization of the ag division, points to the efforts of Jimmy Tanda and his and nursery landscaping That unit has already constructed a temporary structure on the south-eastern corner of their building in the 211 block to serve as In it will be houa lath house. sed 45 Chinese elm trees brought from New Mexico recently by James D. Crawford, and "boxed" mesquite, cottonwood, willow trees and other plants will be set.

A pergola has already been started on the west side of their building on which fast-climbing vines are hoped to be abundantly thriving in the very near future.

Block 212 has been reserved as an area for a permanent nursery. It will be landscaped and beautified with different varieties of flowers, shrubs, and trees for benefit of Poston 2 residents.

Oleander and date cuttings have been promised by Farm Supervisor William C. Sharp, and hot beds will also be set in the nursery. Actual work will begin as soon as equipment and irrigation water are available, Onoye stated.

WATER SYSTEM AND DISPOSAL PLANT NEAR COMPLETION

Director James D. Crawford announced that the sewage disposal plant and the water supply system will be completed in a few days.

At present an open cess pool is being used which is causing the unpleasant odor over the entire camp and upon completion of the septic tank it is believed that the odor will be eliminated.

The cement base for the motor and pump have been installed for the water supply system. Within a few days more complicated connections are required between the huge 200,000 gallon steel storage and pressure tanks before the entire system is completed.
