NEW SCHOOL EXPECTED TO OPEN OCTOBER 1ST

The much-awaited statement in regards to the new school, which is expected to open sometime in the Fall, came from Mrs. Tachibana, chrmn, of the Education Committee, when she told the Council meeting on August 19, that the date for the initial classes will be October 1st., that temporary instructors will be placed for a while "until such time" when more quarters could be obtained.

An enrollment of 1300 is expected in the Elementary Dept. which will include a library and a practical arts shop. Because practical training is such an essential part in vocational jobs stress is been placed strongly on this Dept., for both the elementary and senior high school students. A three-year course in English is recommended by the Education Dept. for all high school members.

In reply to the many inquiries in regards to period of school-courses, it was announced that a 12-month schooling may be established.

Some Mess halls may have to be used as class rooms until more permanent quarters could be built.

RED CROSS TO FORM CLASSES REGISTRATIONS NOW ACCEPTED

In a meeting held at Rec. 30 last Tuesday, August 18, Lynn Rodgers, Field Representative from the Arizona Red Cross Headquarters, announced that applications for the Instructors' Training, in First Aid, Lifesaving, and Boating, are being taken. This is a part of a nationwide campaign for safety trainings:

Dr. J. Powell, head of the Rec. and Education Dept., reported that First Aid and Water Safety will first be taught to the Rec. Dept. staff, the Police Dept., Fire Dept., and the future instructors, eligible to teach the others interested.

Survey in form of questionnaire is being handed to each Rec. Hdqtrs. of Poston 1, 2, and 3, also to the Blk. Mgrs. to ascertain the persons qualified to be instructors.

CUSTODIANS MAKE SPECIAL REQUEST TO "CHECK IN" EQUIPMENTS ON TIME.

The Custodian Dept. of the Rec Division made the following signed statement to the Press yesterday, in regards to checking of sports' equipment, by the various individual softball teams.

"The athletic equipment, the property of this Community, is slowly being depleted. The equipments are checked out by the Depts' Custodians, for your own recreational purposes. We now have a very limited amount of bats and balls, to accommodate some 93 softball teams, due to some clubs not returning their materials at all.

"Because of this shortage, we must conform with the following rules in regards to lending out of supplies: "That all equipments taken out by the managers must be brought back to the Dept. within two days after the release. Teams not able to respect the terms will be "Blacklisted" and no additional materials will be furnished until said articles are again checked in."

The Dept. added that the teams not able to cooperate may be left out without equipments, for the duration, due to lack of supplies at hand. Takeo Yamada is the Head Custodian.

SET-UP FOR SOAP FACTORY SEEN FOR POSTONIANS

More soap suds may be floating around Poston City, according to reports made by the Factory and Manufacturing Dept. here. Expectations for its actual production is contemplated very soon, to replace the fast diminishing supply of this vital commodity in the kitchens and laundries.

Experiments and tests are currently being conducted to determine the excellence of quality and its effectiveness. The soap under these tests thus far have proved to cut grease when used in hot water.

The new program will be supervised by Masao Yano, Division of Sundries and Soap, Factory Planning Dept.

30 POSTON 2 DEPARTMENT LEADERS ATTEND INITIAL MEETING CALLED BY DIRECTOR CRAWFORD WEDNESDAY

Thirty divisional leaders representing 23 departments of Poston 2 responded to the call of Director James D. Crawford Wednesday afternoon for the first of a series of weekly inter-departmental meetings in the 218 Personnel mess hall.

The meeting was opened with Director Crawford explaining the purposes of the gathers and the representatives unanimously concurred with his beliefs that such regular meetings may tend to be constructive and may alleviate situations which cause intolerant and misunderstanding attitudes.

Herbert Yoshida, Bob Kitaji, James Abe and Hiro Yamamisaka of the truck dispatching unit, construction department of the Division of Operations, timekeepers' office and employment bureau, respectively, presented brief reports concerning the "trials and tribulations" encountered by their respective departments.

Yoshida and Kitaji requested the patient cooperation of all departments, especially because of the current shortage in trucks, equipment and supplies of all kinds.

An excess use of water and the resulting increase in humidity was considered detrimental to healthful living conditions in the apartments. It was urged that the water flow from the coolers also should be regulated to prevent damage to the barrack foundations.
