O-BON FESTIVAL ENDS TONIGHT - WINS, APPLAUSE

In an impressive O-Bon Festival atmosphere, created by hundreds of lanterns, paper chain-ribbons, and flowers, more than 4,000 spectators attended the various ceremonies held throughout Poston 1, yesterday, in the first night of the two-day gala Festival.

In the evening's main program, Ralph Gelvin, Associate Project Director, told the audience the significance of such O-Bon ceremonies, to be able to prepare the elaborate program under many sacrifices, and what it means as a morale builder to Poston community.

"It is with reverence and appreciation that I speak to you in behalf of Mr. Wade Head who is unable to be with us on this occasion."

"I know the significance of this O-Bon ceremony. Like the eternal goodness that is in the hearts of all mankind, the goodness that exists in this sacred rite is eternal.

"The fact that here at Poston, each man and woman may worship in his or her own way, is of course, something that only has been possible in the last few hundred years. There was a time when men and women of different religious faiths could not do this. But we can and are doing this in Poston, and I am sure it is helping to maintain our courage and our tolerance toward our fellow Citizens

"Speaking directly to you of the Buddhist faith, may I extend my congratulations on the splendid team work, and an interesting program. Best Wishes to you all!"

The Bazaar, with all its novel Concessions and Exhibitions, enjoyed one of the largest crowd, in the history of Poston, while more than 700 dancers, attired in "yukatas" participated in many rhythmic ondo dances.

Similar programs will be held tonight to conclude the two-day O-Bon Festival, in one of the biggest events held to date at Poston.

GARNISHING FACTORY INCLUDED IN MANY BUILDINGS PLANNED

Immediate construction of Poston's first large-scale factory, a Garnishing plant, to include six major building units was announced today by Ellis Georgia, area chief, US Army Engineers. The plant will cover 14 acres of land, now being cleared by the Indian Service Irrigation crews, and is located just south of Poston 1. The Callowell Construction Co., Long Beach, has been awarded in the building contract. Units to be built include five garnishing sheds, each 250 feet by 26 feet 4 inches, a warehouse and office structure 400 feet by 60 feet and a cutting shed with 20 tables.

ABSENTEE VOTE PROCEDURE EXPLAINED BY LEGAL DEPT.

To clarify certain amount of confusion created by the voters in Poston in regards to absentee voting in the coming primary election, the Legal Dept. today told the Press that:

"The California Law requires that the ballot be exhibited to the notary public or officers before whom the voting is to be done and show that the said ballot is unmarked.

"The markings on the ballot must be done in the presence of the notary public or the officer in charge, but in such a matter that only the voter may see and mark the given ballot."

However some voters have been marking their ballots way before, away from the presence of any said authorities. Such practices mean another new ballot must be used, which require extra red-tape.

K. MISAWA HITS .591 WINS BATTING HONORS

K. Misawa, Peacock first sacker took both the American and National League batting crown with a remarkable .591 in eight games. He was followed closely by T. Okida, Valley shortstop who hit .586 in nine games played. Delano's first baseman L. Nishijima, who is also sitting above the .500 mark, is the home run king with five circuit-clouts.

Their comments are, for the most part, good-natured. One short, lean issei laughed, "Shucks, if these clothes don't fit me, it'll be because my physique isn't all that it should be." Looking at the roominess of the pants' seat, a nisei said, "They look more like women's slacks than anything."



Some are planning to hike up their pants to the chestline and hold them up by means of suspenders; to put pleats and elastic in the snug-fitting coats so that they can move their arms just a little when they are so inclined.

And for what type of man were these clothes designed? As far as imagination can ascertain, he had a slim, wasp-like back and narrow shoulders. He wanted a strait-jacket effect to not make him too nostalgic after his old cell. His waist and seat were of enormous size, his legs very long. His head was utterly shapeless. CELERY PLANTS WILL MAKE APPEARANCE IN LARGER FIELD

The Nursery Dept. announced yesterday that they have stratified approximately 200,000 celery plants which will be transplanted to another plot before it is sent to the fields:

The seedlings are of the Utah and Pascual varieties, known to be most suitable for this region. It is estimated that the new plantings will cover at least five acres, the field being located in the Fire Break areas, adjacent to Blks. 22 and 27.

Construction of the new Lath house is expected soon, with the arrival of lath-wood strips a few days ago. A 120x60 ft. building will provide sufficient room for the immediate need, the report said.

Supervised by Harry Kikuchi, the Nursery Dept. is growing cabbage seedlings, to be set into the field this Fall. Planting of flowers for the Center is being considered, if ample space could be provided in the lath houses.

SEWER DISPOSAL SYSTEM

Ten tons worth of sewage disposal equipment arrived yesterday making way for the immediate installment of sewer system which is to be located at the southwest end of the Community. The concrete structure, now finished will have circulators and separators, claimed to be one of the most modern type of disposals found in the whole Western Arizona, according to reports made by the U.S. Army Engineers.

It is expected that work would be completed by middle of September.

A GOOD BOOK, A CHAIR AND A COOLER

Visible improvements in the Library, Poston 1, since its opening days include a new blower-type cooler at the west end of the room, and pink flower-print curtains on the windows.

Card index file system has been revised, and books which have been previously catalogued only by the authors, are now classified by titles too. Non-fiction books are listed by the Dewey system.

New books contributed to the library, include such as: The Timeless Land, by Eleanor Dark; The Woman in the Hall, by G.B. Stern; Sergeant York, by Sam K. Cowen; Myths after Lincoln, with Introduction by Carl Sanburg, by Lloyd Lewis, Walt Disney's Bambi and Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs.

PRESS PROGRAM TOLD BY JAMES, NEWS DIRECTOR

Problems concerning the development of the Press Bulletin was related to the Blk. Mgrs.' Council, Poston 1, Aug. 21, by Norris E. James, Project Public Relation Director, at Rec. 45.

In the statement to the Council, Mr. James disclosed:

(1) That equipment for the development of a printed newspaper has been coming in small quantity and will be increased.

(2) That studies are being made by the Press Bulletin Community Enterprise for the possible development of a job printing industry to the profit of the people of Poston.

(3) That the Press Bulletin Staff will soon be on a Civil Service bases.

Mr. James was introduced by Tomo Ito, chrmn. of the Blk. Council.

ADOBE CREW ON STRIKE

POSTON 2 RESIDENTS MAY SOON BE SERVED MORE APPETIZING MEALS' ACTION TAKEN BY COOKS, STEWARDS

Residents of Poston 2 may soon be served appetizing meals more suited to their accustomed epicurean tastes. This possibility came as a result of a meeting called by James Ota, chef of 227, and held Friday evening in the 219 mess hall with chefs, cooks and stewards of Poston 2 in attendance.

A committee consisting of Messrs. Shintaku, 219 steward, Okamura, 216 chef, Ota, 227 chef, and Nakanishi, 222 steward, was appointed to formulate a menu that will be more suitable to Japanese. The menu will be submitted to Poston's Chief Steward, Earl Best, who in turn will forward it to the San Francisco headquarters of the Army Quartermaster. The action was taken to assist the Quartermaster to purchase rations more intelligently.

The committee will welcome and consider any suggestions of Poston 2 residents, it was announced, and will also confer with the Unit group who have already submitted a menu for consideration.

Mr. K. Shiba, 214 cook, was appointed to represent the cooks and chefs at the community council meetings.

PROSPECTS FOR INFIRMARY IN POSTON 2 ARE SLIGHT

Prospects for opening an infirmary in Poston 2 are slight according to Dr. Inouye and Dr. Kazato after a meeting with Dr. Press, director of the Poston medical department.

Lack of equipment, medical personnel and surgical instruments are the main reasons why the desire for a hospital unit here is hopeless.

Hospital in Poston 1 will be enlarged to 250 bed capacity from its original 100 beds. Emergency and those cases approved by the local clinic will be admitted for hospitalization, it was indicated by the local medical staff.

CHARLES POPKINS CONFERRING WITH PROJECT DIRECTOR, W. WADE HEAD TO SATISFY WORKERS' DEMANDS

Workers Claim They Were Promised \$16 Per Month Cash Advance; Paid On Basis of \$12

Fifty-six adobe workers of Poston 2 voted to strike Friday afternoon, halting the manufacturing of adobe bricks for an indefinite period.

Tets Fukudome, foreman of the work crew and speaking in behalf of the strikers, claimed that the workers were under the impression that they would receive \$16 per month. Following the receipt of their paychecks Friday, the workers discovered that their cash advances were based on a \$12 per month basis.

Carl Puterbaugh, supervisor of the construction department of Poston 2, disclaimed any knowledge of any such promise of a \$16 cash advance level and stated that he had always been of the opinion that such workers would be paid on a \$12 per month basis. However, Mr. Puterbaugh admitted that the timekeeper for the adobe crew had been sending in the workers' times on the \$16 basis.

Efforts are now being made by Charles Popkins, Poston's chief of the construction department, to settle the situation in behalf of the workers. Mr. Popkins is reported to be conferring with Project Director W. Wade Head to arrive at a settlement which will be satisfactory to the workers.

CHANGE IN STEWARD SUPERVISORSHIP

Palmer Back, assistant steward to Earl Best and in charge of the Poston 2 stewards, released the information that Toishi Hamamoto, 207, has replaced Henry Tanda as the supervisor of stewards for this community with K. Takiguchi, 214 chef, still performing an efficient job as the supervisor of chefs.

Mr. Takiguchi is still in Unit 3, assisting the chefs and cooks there to get organized.
