SOME HIGHLIGHTS FROM POSTON II ELECTIONS

A few of the highlights of the election held Tuesday in Poston 2 for temporary community council representatives were:

The widest margin of victory, and, incidentally, the only lawyer, was scored by John Maeno of 227, piling up 120 votes as against his closest rival's 22.

The smallest margin of victory was recorded by Takeo Takeuchi of 229, garnering 79 as against his nearest competitor's 72.

Block 226 may boast of the greatest percentage of votes cast with 206 going to the polls out of a total of 210 eligible voters.

Block 211 made the most dismal showing in the percentages with only 44 casting ballots out of 186 eligibles, with Blks. 216, 209, and 220 following respectively with 53 cast out of 196, 59 out of 209, and 51 out of 180.

Blk. 213 had the greatest number of nominees with 6 on the ballots.

A lawyer, Maeno, and two doctors, Optometrist Masao Takeshita and Dentist Dr. Frank Ito, and Pharmacist John Nakamura were the only "professionals" elected.

Kenji Uyeno of Block 226 polled the greatest number of votes with 122.

POSTON III POPULATION INCREASED TO 4421

With an additional 1421 residents from Santa Anita, Poston III's total population has jumped to 4421.

BLOCK MANAGERS TAKE TEST; APPOINTMENTS TO FOLLOW

The first examination to be held in Poston was taken by a group of 36 temporary managers, and 4 other candidates, in order to select a permanent manager for each block in Poston I. John G. Evans, Assistant Project Director, conducted the examination immediately following a regular Block Managers meeting at Mess 5. Wednesday morning, Sept. 2, 9 a.m.

The examination, of a type similar to that of civil service, to get a comprehensive picture of the candidates' background was in the form of an autobiography. The list of facts to be included in the autobiography was: full name, former and present address, age, marital status, schools attended, business positions held, memberships in clubs, associations and similar organizations, and accomplishments or attainments of the candidates.

POSTONIAN NISEIS AFFORDED DOMESTIC WORK CHANCES IN MINNESOTA

Postonian Niseis of unquestionable character and integrity are afforded opportunities in domestic work in Minnesota, according to letters received here from Fred Hirasuna, secretary of the Int'l Chick Sexing Association of Mankato, Minnesota.

Col. A.B. Coxé, Chief of the Minnesota State Military Intelligence division, is reported to have contacted Hirasuna explaining that many inquiries had been received with regard to the availability of persons of Japanese ancestry who are now in relocation centers for domestic employment in Minneapolis and St. Paul.

RED CROSS CHAPTER IN POSTON CENTER

With more than 70 volunteers already enrolled, Poston is now included among the full-fledged chapters of the Red Cross which has been in operation since Aug. 25, according to the notice received from the Pacific Area Division located in San Francisco.

Aijiro Takahashi is in charge of the unit here, which is located at Rec. 30. Roy Takeda is the secretary.

Preparations are now under way to have an inauguration program to take place sometime during the end of this month, when William C. Wilkinson, the Arizona State representative to the National Red Cross, arrives here to advise on the functions and duties of the world-wide organization.

The Group is prepared to conduct instructors' course in First Aid and Water Safety, which teachers, Blk. mgrs., the Fire Dept. and the Police Dept. will attend. More than 1000 citizens are expected to take such instructions.

Among the Administrative heads who aided in the development of the unit are: Ralph Gelvin, Associate director; A. W. Emple, Chief Administrative officer; and Dr. John Powell, Director of Education and Recreation.

RECREATION DEPARTMENT FACES EQUIPMENT SHORTAGE

The Poston III Recreation Department met with Dr. Powell on Tuesday afternoon at the new Administration building "A" to smooth out difficulties arising from the shortage of athletic equipment.

The group was faced with the problem of meeting equipment needs in view of a government order stating no more funds will be available for recreational use. Dr. Powell declared in a statement to the Press Bulletin.

POSTON III TO HAVE UNIFORM MEAL MENUS

Chief Steward Burdick of Poston III announced yesterday a plan for having uniform meal menus at all kitchens as one of several steps under consideration.

Improvements planned included a menu adjustment for a diet best suited to Japanese, milk to be served eventually to all persons, and an effort to seek the type of food found most nourishing.

Mr. Burdick particularly wished to express his appreciation for those who unselfishly suggested free use of their refrigerators and electric stoves by dieticians.

A meeting of stewards, stewardesses and dieticians will take place tonight from 7 p.m., at Mess 310.

ADULT ENGLISH CLASSES ARRANGED IN POSTON III

A large sign-up was reported already for a class in English, which is scheduled to begin on Sept. 10 or earlier, according to the Poston III Adult Education Department. Tak Sato and Kiyoaki Murata will be in charge of the English language class.

Those interested may still sign up at the Adult Education Dept. at 310 or at the offices of any of the block managers.

TRAFFIC ORDINANCE FOR POSTON CITIES

This is the first installment of the TRAFFIC CODE, presented by Ted Haas, project attorney to the Press Bulletin. The initial chapter is being printed today. More will follow soon.

CHAPTER I (LICENSES)

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to drive a motor vehicle owned or used by the U.S. Government in the community of Poston unless such person holds a Motor Vehicle Operator's license of the Department of Interior, Indian Field Service.

Section 2 The operator of any motor vehicle shall have his operator's license in his immediate possession at all times while driving a motor vehicle and shall display the same upon demand of the judge of the Municipal Court or a member of the Police Department.

Section 3. Suspension of License. Whenever any person is convicted of a violation of all provision of this Traffic Code, the Court may in addition to such other penalties which may be provided by ordinance, recommend to the Chief Transportation Officer the suspension or revocation of the Operator's license.

editorialSOME SIMPLE TRUTHS ---

Each of our three Poston communities are composed of people from different areas all along the California coast. And as individuals each of us have individual ideas, habits, and opinions; each of us will react a little differently from anyone else in any given situation. In many cases, what we think, feel and do may be in utter contrast, perhaps even in conflict, with what our neighbors think, feel, and do. Because of these reasons, we will often find some people objectionable and we may want to express this feeling.

But whether we want to show our disapproval of others or not, we must face the inescapable truth that we are here to live together and for some length of time. We have the alternative now of either submerging our petty differences and combining all our mental, physical and spiritual resources to forge ahead as a flourishing community, or else of clinging to a dead past and salving our old selfish egos to slowly perish in the heat and the dust.

Each of us have come from an acquisitive society, where success was measured in terms of material possessions--money, clothes, a good car--and in directing our efforts towards this kind of "success" we have always thought and acted in terms of advancement for ourselves and ourselves only, often times blindly disregarding the social consequences of what we were doing.

But here in Poston, material possession--money, clothes, a good car--are no longer important--the quest for material gains has fortunately lost its former glitter. We must measure success now in terms of the social services that we as individuals may render to the community. Instead of devoting our energies towards the selfish accumulation of material wealth, we must divert them into channels leading towards community betterment.

If this must be so, if our single purpose is community betterment, then we have no place here for anyone interested in self-aggrandizement at the expense of others. The issue which we must face is this: the success or failure of our project will depend largely upon the question of whether or not we as individual residents will take an active interest in the progressive development of our community. If we are to accept this challenge, then what we must do is clear.
