## SOME HIGHLIGHTS FROM POSTON II ELECTIONS

A few of the highlights of the election held Tuesday in Poston 2 for temporary community council representatives were:

The widest margin of victory, and, incidentally, the only lawyer, was scored by John Maeno of 227, piling up 120 votes as against his closest rival's 22.

The smallest margin of victory was recorded by Takeo Takeuchi of 229, garnering 79 as against his nearest competitor's 72.

Block 226 may boast of the greatest percentage of votes cast with 206 going to the polls out of a total of 210 eligible voters.

Block 211 made the most dismal showing in the percentages with only 44 casting bellots out of 186 eligibles, with Blks. 216, 209, and 220 following respectively with 53 cast out of 196, 59 out of 209, and 51 out of 180.

Blk. 213 had the greatest number of nominees with 6 on the ballots.

A lawyer, Maeno, and two doctors, Optometrist Masao Takeshita and Dentist Dr. Frank Ito, and Pharmacist John Nakamura were the only "professionals" clected.

Kenji Uyeno of Block 226 polled the greatest number of votes with 122.

# TRAFFIC ORDINANCE FOR POSTON CITIES

This is the first installment of the TRAF-FIC CODE, presented by Ted Haas, project attorney to the Press Bulletin. The initial chapter is being printed today, More will follow soon.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any per any person to drive a motor vehicle owned or used by the U.S. Covernment in the community of Poston unless such person holds a Motor Ve-hicle Operator's lihicle cense of the Department of Interior, In-Field Service. dian

Section 2 The operator of any motor vehicle shall have his operator's license in his immediate possession at all times while driving a motor vehicle and shall display the same upon demand of the judge of the Municipal Court or a member of the Police Department.

Section 3. Suspension of License. Whenever any person is convicted of a violation of all provision of this Traffic Code, the Court may in addition to such other penalties which may be provided by ordinance, recommend to the Transportation Officer the suspension or revocation of the Opera-. tor's license.
