

NET PROJECT SUPPORT REQUESTED CANDIDATES RUN AGAIN

A re-election of candidates in sections 15 and 27 is being held at the Government house today and tomorrow, revealed Registrar Mitzi Shiraishi.

The polls will be open until 5 p.m. today and from 9 a.m. till noon tomorrow.

In Friday's election, Tom Sakamoto and Kingo Ouchi tied for first in district 15 with 15 votes each.

Importance of Camouflage Work To National Defense Stressed

Full co-operation of Japanese-American citizens in the camouflage net project was urged today in a statement issued by H. Russell Amory, Center manager.

"Santa Anita Assembly center has been delegated a big job--and an important one," Amory stated. "It is necessary for us to produce a large number of camouflage nets per day. This huge task will necessitate a doubling of our present force of workers."

Amory proceeded to dispel certain rumors which have been circulating about the project. He said:

"There is no private contractor nor profits involved. The work is done directly for the Army and in this connection I might add that everyone on the project is making a direct and important contribution to the war effort."

"A thorough investigation is being made by public health authorities within the Center and their findings will determine if further steps shall be taken for the protection of the health of those working on the project."

Amory stated it was the duty of residents to accept transfers of employment which the management has to make in order that the Center turn out the quantity of nets allotted to it. He pointed out that allegations of "black-listing" and "drafting" are unfounded.

"Such allegations probably arose," he said, "from the fact that assignments on certain projects necessarily have been, for the time being, closed. At the present, assignments are being made only to essential projects of which the camouflage net project is the most vital."

He explained that persons volunteering to work on the net project will be given first consideration later when transfers to other activities are available.

"Let's all put our shoulders to the wheel," Amory concluded. "The Army needs camouflage nets. It is up to every American citizen to contribute his share of work to see that it gets them. With the full co-operation of every American citizen, I am sure that we can and will do the job delegated to us."

HANDICRAFT SHOW A HIT Canteen Items Over 3000 Visit To Be Increased On Opening Day

"If guayule is successfully raised at Manzanar," said Frank Ioba Hirose, youthful research chemist and graduate of University of Washington, "the Japanese evacuees from the West Coast can utilize their talent in worthwhile work."

This morning the Hirose, who resided at B-4 U-1 A-11, left Santa Anita for Los Angeles where they will entrain for Manzanar.

There, Hirose will assist in the experimental production of guayule together with other specialists.

More than 200,000 seedlings and cuttings have been planted at Manzanar. "If it's successful," he said, "Manzanar can be enlarged. The Japanese can really contribute something worthwhile to National defense."
