Los Angeles city school officials will be present at the Santa Anita Assembly center for the graduation ceremonies of junior and senior high school seniors on June 26.

University and junior college degrees will also be awarded at that time, and arrangements are being made for the graduation of San Diego students.

As all diplomas are to be sent to the office of E. J. England, Recreation department chief, students who are eligible for graduation must register by 3:30 p.m. tomorrow.

Dr. Yamato Ichihashi, professor of history and government at Stanford university for 30 years, addressed Center primary and secondary school teachers Saturday morning at the Recreation hall.

He advanced ideas for organizing a parent-teachers association and a course for training instructors. He will lecture every Saturday morning.

Dr. Ichihashi lived at Stanford for 40 years, having enrolled as a freshman in 1903. He received his doctor's degree from Harvard university.

Dr. and Mrs. Ichihashi came to Santa Anita with the Santa Clara evacuees. Their only son, Woodrow, a student at the University of Oregon, was inducted to the Tule Lake relocation center.

Despite the fact that he specialized in Japanese history, many residents of the college town, Palo Alto, believed him to be an American citizen. He was many times solicited for funds at election time.

Amory Talks at Holiday Rites

GLENDALE, June 16--H.R. Amory, manager of the Santa Anita Assembly center, climaxed the MacArthur Day ceremonies by presenting the key of the new Glendale city hall to Mayor Archie L. Walters.

Manager Amory, who is also Southern California administrator for the Work Projects Administration, gave a short talk before making the presentation.

The WPA contributed a total of \$119,000 toward the cost of the new edifice at Broadway and Howard streets.

Kimmel explained that the WRA will furnish the mere necessities and that the residents themselves are to organize and run their community life.

Albert Nozaki suggested that relocated residents be given opportunities to develop their creative and artistic abilities in the manufacture of hand-carved and hand-painted articles. Section 26 Representative Masao Satow urged that vocation schools be set up.

Summing up the meeting, Chairman Kiyoshi Okura said:

"The first order of business of the council would be to take up the ideas presented and form a committee to study these problems."

There may be a shortage of rubber balls in the Center, but thrifty Santa Anitans have devised a way to make a new kind of ball for games.

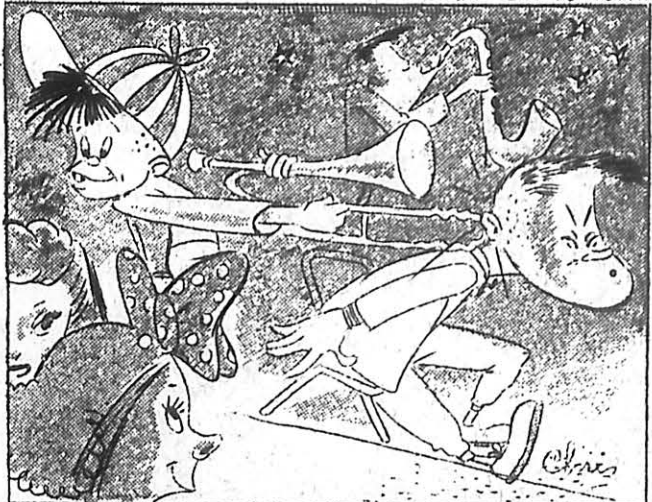
The balls are made from loose gunny sack threads,
