Democracy Is Not Acts of Few

The recent New York specal of Pearl S. Buck, Nobel prize winner and famous novelist, is one with which we

concur heartily. She said, in part:

"I den't know a more difficult position than that in which Americans of Japanese blood find themselves today ... Now when we are at war with Japan this burden is a hundred times heavier to bear than it has ever been. Japan is today our enemy. We cannot and will not see a world where the military fascist mind is the ruler. We are enemies to that mind. I know that the Japanese Americans of whom I speak are enemies, too, of that mind. They hate the Japanese mind that is waging this war of Japanese aggression, but even those Japanese who are the most loyal to our democratic cause and to the American government...must bear the added burden of doubt and suspicion. Ignorant persons...may wreak a childish vengeance upon these Japanese Americans...

"When such acts happen, I beg the Japanese Americans not to despair of democracy or of America. I ask it to be remembered that there are millions of other American citizens who believe in justice and fairness and equal-

ity, and that these are the true Americans."
