## NEW MESS SYSTEM TO START MONDAY

A new mess system, designed to eliminate long periods of waiting in line, will be inaugurated Monday at all mess halls, the Mess division revealed today.

Meal tickets, numbered from 1 to 3 to determine when the holder is to eat, will be distributed every two weeks by census takers to all Center residents.

Everyone with meal cards will be admitted to breakfast. At lunch, holders of No. 1 cards are to eat at 11:30 a.m., No. 2 at 12 noon, and No. 3 at 12:30 p.m. Supper servings begin at 4:30 p.m. for No. 1, 5 p.m. for No. 2 and 5:30 p.m. for No. 3 holders.

Tickets will be colored to conform with the color of the mess hall and ticket punchers have been instructed to stop anyone without tickets or proper numbers and colors. No exceptions will be made to the rule, it was emphasized.

Anyone losing a meal ticket is to apply at the Information section of the Government house where a No. 4 ticket will be issued to him. Holders of these tickets must wait until No. 3 servings are completed before they may eat.

Workers must present their meal tickets in addition to their passes to eat at mess halls near

## Chinese Napa, Radishes Picked

Thirty-five crates of Chinese napa and 297 dozen bunches of radishes were harvested recently from the infield truck garden, according to Lynn R. Thomas, general labor foreman.

"The Chinese napa," he said, "was just a thinning and we will begin our first picking in two weeks." In the first radish harvest, 185 dozen bunches were gathered.

"Only farmers are on the project," said Thomas, "and they take great personal interest in their work. Work begins at 8 o'clock but these boys come in at 7."

their places of employment. Camouflage workers must have their meal card perforated to eat in the Red mess and must also have their 107 cards if they wish to enter their regular mess halls at the head of the supper lines.

Trays to be taken to sick persons may be obtained if tickets are punched as the dishes are taken out of the mess halls. All dishes taken out must be returned promptly.

The mess division explained that some changes may be necessary after the initial issuance of tickets and asked that residents give the first allotment a fair trial.

"In order for the plan to be 100% effective, we ask the full cooperation of Center residents," officials of the Mess division said. --by Anna Sakaizawa.

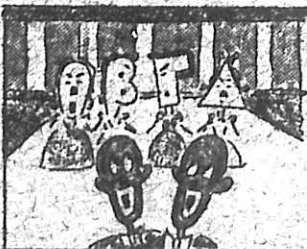

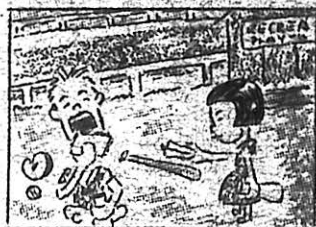

It is difficult to conceive of any attitude more dangerous to the future welfare of the nisei than that of defeatism (second only to fascism).

True, it is only the mentally short-sighted, the spineless weaklings, plus perhaps a few who are attempting deliberately to spread defeatism, who go about crying "What's the use?" to any progressive suggestion or program concerning our welfare.

And yet, as few as these pessimists are in this Center, as illogical as is their reasoning, their voices are loud--loud, no doubt, in inverse ratio to their lack of reasoning.

Those who have faith in a democratic America must remain firm in their belief that a productive future awaits us in America's future.



## Americanism Classes Draw Issei

"It is the eagerness of the students to learn that makes our classes possible," says Joe Koide, instructor of Americanism classes.

With their own initiative Koide and Bob Fujii, 12-6 12 street, started American history and geography classes to give the issei an opportunity to become better acquainted with America.

The morning class which started with 28 students now has an enrollment of 220, and the demand was so great that afternoon classes were begun.

Classes meet daily except Saturday and Sunday from 9 to 11 a.m. and from 1 to 3 p.m. One hour is devoted to lectures and the other to discussion and questions.--by Betty Kana-meishi.
