San Diego Group To Lead Exodus Wednesday

The complete evacuation of the Santa Anita assembly center will begin Wednesday (Aug. 26) when a contingent of approximately 600 persons will leave by train for the Colorado River relocation project at Parker, Arizona. An additional group of 600 evacuees will leave Thursday (Aug. 27). These two groups will be made up of families evacuated to Santa Anita from San Diego city.

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Five Points

MANAGER WILBUR'S STATEMENT QUOTED

"As Santa Anita residents prepare to move into War Relocation Authority Relocation projects commencing next Wednesday, there are several points which I would like to make clear," Center Manager Gene W. Wilbur said yesterday in a statement to the PACEMAKER.

He listed five points as follows:

1. Orders directing the transfer of evacuees from assembly centers to various relocation projects are issued by the Army just the same as they were in the original evacuation.
2. The Center Management has no jurisdiction in deciding when or where transfers are to be effected. It is our duty-- as it is yours -- to obey Army orders.
3. Transportation orders received from the Army indicate by family number those individuals to be moved and to what particular location. After we receive the orders it will be impossible to make any changes.
4. Announcements as to dates of moves and places

PAYCHECKS

Paychecks will follow residents to wherever they may be relocated, announced Henry E. Scofield, Finance division head, yesterday. Workers will receive credit for all scheduled hours worked up to the day of departure, it was emphasized by Director Scofield.

Gift Offerings Hit by Ruling

Residents are reminded of the following section in the Interior Security regulations for assembly centers:

"No evacuee shall make, or offer to make, any payment in money or other thing of value to any member of or employee of the Center staff, the interior security police or the military police for any act or omission on this part or as a simple gratuity."

PACKING INSTRUCTIONS GIVEN BY CENTER HEAD

Belongings of Center residents to be transported to relocation centers will be classified as hand luggage, baggage and freight, said Center Manager Gene W. Wilbur Friday in disclosing packing instructions.

The interior guard will inspect all baggage and freight before shipment and upon arrival at the destination.

Hand luggage includes articles of personal use needed on the train trip, such as small hand bags and suit cases. Since all hand luggage must be car-

ried by the evacuee from the time he leaves his barrack until his arrival in his new home, it should be held to a minimum.

Baggage consists of bedding, a limited supply of clothing and personal belongings that will be needed in the first few days after arrival at the new center. The limit for this classification is 100 lbs. or 20 cubic feet for each adult and 50 lbs. or 10 cubic feet for each child. Baggage should be tagged and stacked neatly in the

Trains carrying about 600 persons will leave on each alternate day thereafter until the movement of this group has been completed. This group of 3450 residents will be made up of the families of evacuees from Santa Clara county, the city of San Jose and portions of the city of Los Angeles.

Present plans for the evacuation of the San Diego group call for the train leaving Wednesday immediately following the evening meal.

A box lunch will be supplied each person and special formula and supplemental feeding will be given infants and small children.

The train will include two pullmans where berths will be supplied mothers with infants, old persons and those requiring special care. A United States Public health doctor and two nurses will accompany each train.

Details of further evacuations will be published in the **FACEMAKER** as soon as released by the Army in San Francisco.

MONITORS TO AID IN EVACUATION PROCEDURE

Monitors will be selected for each group of 10 or more persons leaving the Center for a relocation center, announced Center Manager Gene W. Wilbur yesterday. It will be the duty of the monitors to see that their groups are organized and checked through for the whole evacuation procedure.

Information regarding shipping, crating, packing and tagging of luggage will be supplied by monitors. Tags will be obtained by monitors for members of their groups. Monitors will check all freight baggage for proper crating and tagging.

Change of address forms will be distributed by the monitors for postal purposes.

On the first visit to each family, monitors will obtain names of persons in the following classifications: bed-ridden, infants under two years of age, infants wearing diapers, expectant mothers whose pregnancy has passed seven months, expectant mothers whose pregnancy is less than seven months but who have complications, babies on formula feeding, persons lame or crippled.

The foregoing informa-

tion is for the purpose of determining what parties should have fullman transportation.

Final checking will be made by the monitors to see that all packing is complete, all government property turned in and that all orders have been carried out.

All government property including blankets, mattresses and beds must be returned.

Knives, forks, spoons and other table utensils should be returned to the mess halls as they constitute non-expendable government property.

Barracks must be left clean, floors swept and windows washed. All papers or cardboard on walls must be taken down and piled in one corner of the unit. Trash will be collected and disposed of in trash containers.

The War Relocation authority has agreed to pay all costs for shipping household and personal effects of evacuees now in central storage outside of assembly centers to the relocation centers where they are sent.

It will be necessary to refuse additional baggage at the front gate, except in emergency cases approved in advance by the administrative office.

Removal of All Woodwork Asked

All shelving and wood work constructed in the barracks should be removed by the Center residents before leaving, according to William R. Towle, Utility chief, yesterday.

Army regulations require barracks to be left in the same condition as when first occupied. This includes removal of wall paper and other forms of decoration.

Towle suggests that box wood, crating and miscellaneous lumber used in shelving be utilized to construct crates for packing freight.

Story of the Week: Tanforan's

Sailboat

A feature from the Tanforan Totaliser is herewith reprinted as the story of the Week:

Lake Tanforan's vast fleet of model sailboats has been a recreation feature unique among all the waters. And to this distinctive scene has now been added a comparatively mammoth vessel -- a sailboat capable of carrying its skipper and 2 young passengers.

For a sailboat, it has a somewhat unorthodox look, being equipped with 2 outrigger pontoons, which give it its amazing buoyancy. With a hull 8 ft. long, it has a single central mast 11 ft. high, carrying a sail with a spread of 28 sq. ft. It weighs less than 100 lbs. and is credited with a nominal cargo capacity of about 22 lbs. It has been christened "Mayflower."

Its builder and skipper is Hisaichi Tsugawa, who used to captain a fishing boat. Tsugawa, it seems, has always been an ingenious sailer. Once when his ship lost its rudder at sea, he steered it back to port with a raft attached to the stern.

In building his ship, Tsugawa hollered out an old telephone pole for the bull and pontoons, taking 2 weeks for the job. The pole was so old he had to put on 5 coats of paint, besides stuffing it with 6 lbs. of cotton. For the mast, he used a "2 by 4." The total cost of the materials for the boat was 12 dollars, including 5 dollars for

paint, which was the highest quality enamel the dealer could supply. Tsugawa has made a practice of ferrying kids across the lake, 2 at a time, and 75 of them have already made the trip. On one of these crossings, a computer got shaky as the computer the middle of the island loomed up before him, and he toppled into the lake. The captain, ever the tight man to leave the ship, sat tight until the prow shot into the air and then finding himself in the water, he shouldered the kids to

the shore (the lake isn't very deep), dragging the ship behind him. So far, there have been only 3 such spills, but the captain licks these, he says, stirs his sea fever.

About sailing on the lake, Skipper Tsugawa has this to say: "It's worth a million dollars to feel the wind tug at the sail. With no worries, there's happy sailing all the time."

So, the captain does not sleep on his ship. Mooring it to a special buoy, he goes home to 7-34.

Editorial Await Authentic Information

The final process of evacuation, that is, the relocation of evacuees in Santa Anita to a more permanent home for the duration, is now a reality.

We deplore, however, all the rumors which have been flying around during this week regarding the transfer. We say now, as we shall have occasion to stress in the days to come, that every bit of authentic information regarding relocation will come to you from two indisputable sources--and no other source purporting to "know all, see all, tell all," will be the authentic, official news.

The two sources of official news regarding transfer will be the official administrative bulletins issued over the name of the Center administrator, and the RACEMAKER, the official publication of Santa Anita.

From now till the Center is cleared of all evacuee residents, the RACEMAKER will appear as often as the occasion demands. So also will the administrative bulletins.

We cannot recall any case where the spreading of rumors had a salutary effect. On the contrary, the very opposite is true.

This is no treatise to prove the point: it is too obvious. You need only to remember the last rumor which you heard and your reaction to it, or your reaction to its being proved false, to know that rumors, like all wishful thinking, is no help in facing realities.

To repeat a rumor, which is tantamount to believing in it, only proves your gullibility.

To originate a rumor can be construed only as a deliberate attempt to cause unrest and confusion.
