"Organized recreational activities, especially in early childhood and adolescence, prepare the indivi+ dual by teaching him the spirit of cooperation and of sharing,"Mrs.Amy Furuta today said.

Mrs. Furuta, with Henry Nakaji, is supervisor of recreational activities for children in the 5-12 group.

"The ability for leadership is already fast developing in the children and their willingness to share is encouraging," she added.

Enrollment in this activity has increased in the ten day period from April 21 to the end of the month from 200 children to well over 500.

Assisting Nakaji and Mrs. Furuta are group leaders Mrs. Mabel Hibi, Mrs. Lillian Oye, Kiyo Saiki, and Sophie Shizume, with staff of 66 recreational leaders.

"We have had an alarm-, ing number of persons who have failed to report to work due to various caus-


Personnel office hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The office is located in the west wing of the Grandstand building.

## EVACUEES AIDED BY COMMITTEE

Lunches for the evacuees from 3500 S. Normandie and 2314 S. Vermont avenues in Los Angeles were provided by the aethodist Committee for Japanese Evacuation, it was disclosed today in a letter from the Rev. Lester Suzuki.

The Committee is headed by Dr. Russell E. Clay of the Vermont Square Lethodist Church. Eesides furnishing more than 3000 lunches, the group provided for transportation to the evacuation center, and also storage space in private homes and churches for those desiring such storage.
