Clean Up of Units Asked

Residents leaving the Center were requested to clean their quarters and leave them just as they were before being occupied.

All woodwork in the barracks such as shelves and decorative pieces should be removed before leaving, according to William R. Towle, Works division head.

Rock, flower and vegetable gardens should be destroyed since live plants can not be transported with the evacuees because of railroad regulations.

Prior to departure, residents are asked to pile the materials from which the gardens were made next to the barracks. Disposal crews will pick up the materials after the residents leave, Towle said.

Cooperation of the residents in cleaning up their units would be appreciated, said Towle, in reducing the load on the clean up crews.

Total of 4500
 Set for Wyoming

At the rate of approximately 600 every other day, the second Center movement which is headed for Heart Mountain, Wyo., will start tomorrow morning. Lasting until September 15, the total movement is expected to transfer 4500 Center residents to the Wyoming relocation center.

According to the schedule released by the administration for the second movement, all persons leaving must be in the departure area between 6 and 6:30 a.m. to eat breakfast in the Green mess.

At 6:55 a.m. the evacuees should be ready to check out with the first group going through the visitors' house at 7 a.m. The last group to check out should be on the train car at 7:30 a.m.

Although the trains are scheduled to leave at 9 a.m., they will depart earlier if all is in readiness and the way is cleared.

THURSDAY'S DISPATCHING SETS RECORD

Thursday's dispatching of 550 Center residents to Poston set a new record in speed, it was announced today by the administration.

After ironing out some of the kinks in Wednesday's departure, the loading of passengers Thursday was accomplished in 42 minutes, it was said.

Thursday's train left at 4:40 p.m., 20 minutes ahead of schedule. Wednesday's departure was delayed until after 8 p.m.

The dispatching record was the result of much cooperation from the train monitors, the conductors and the administrative staff, it was stated.

Workers' Aid Requested

The complete cooperation of all Center workers until the final day of evacuation was urged today by Lewis J. Horn, Personnel chief.

Since their work is so essential to the welfare of the Center, mess workers especially were requested to continue their work in a cooperative spirit.

The management expressed its appreciation to Center workers for their cooperation in the past.

ELIGIBLES MAY GET PULLMAN RESERVATIONS

Pullman reservations are to be made at the Public Health or Pre-natal clinic, Dr. A. Kobayashi said.

Eligible for pullman accommodations are mothers with infants up to two years of age; women pregnant from six to eight months; women pregnant less than six months if there are complications; aged and infirm persons, and ill persons.

The medical phase of the relocation movement is handled by the US Public Health service, the director of the Service division revealed.


Ill persons, unable to go at the scheduled time, will rejoin their families after they have recovered, it was assured...by Anna Sakaiwawa.

As a result of camp life, we think women have gained in domesticity. Many girls are learning to patch. The spoiled child almost disappeared for want of a quick fix for boredom. We see girls with leisure backgrounds discovering work for the first time.

Jeanne Kurihara is only seven years old but she knits and crochets. She gathers scraps of yarn and pieces them together to make a blanket for her doll. She learned by watching older women.

Clever furniture has made comfortable barracks. Colorful material wrapped around a nail keg makes the simplest chairs we know. Attractive drapes can be made by cutting out a large bright figure and appliqueing it onto a plain field.

Of course, some women must have their careers, Millian Uta wrote in the Sanforan Note some time ago, "Relocation centers will give the girl, who had secretarial training but found work only as a clerk in a Grant Avenue cigar shop, the opportunity to put to use what she's learned. The home econ major, who used to work as a domestic servant in some Caucasian home, can engage in dietetic work or whatever is her specialty."

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Story of the Week: Nisei Soldiers Cheered

A front-page story from the Pacific Citizen, edited by an ace nisei newspaperman, Larry Tajiiri, is today's Story of the Week:

MADISON, Wis.—The feature of a recent Victory rally in Madison, state capital of Wisconsin, was the appearance of a "snappy" platoon of 54 Hawaiian-Japanese national guardsmen from Camp McCoy, the Madison State Journal reported recently.

American Legion posts said that the Japanese sol-

diers "liked the city so well" that many were returning to spend furloughs there.

The Japanese from Camp McCoy represented the U.S. Army at the victory rally which was attended by 11,000 persons in the University of Wisconsin stadium and field house. The audience cheered the appearance of the American Japanese who marched in a parade with thousands of representatives of civilian defense units.

After the rally the en-

tire Japanese platoon was entertained at Club Craft, Inc., by Judge Fred X. Evans, Robert House and Elmer Waldyogel of William J. Cairns Legion post. The boys sang Hawaiian songs and danced with girls who were "loaned" by their escorts, the legionnaires said. Charles Schuetz, proprietor of the night club, presented packages of cigarettes to each of the soldiers.

All members of the platoon expressed a desire to fight the Axis enemies, well educated and skilled freely of their ancestry and experiences, he reported.

The soldiers are part of a group of approximately one thousand Hawaiian-born and American-born Japanese troops who are now undergoing final conditioning at Camp McCoy for eventual combat service overseas. These troops were recently featured in a newscast which showed them in training at the Army post.

Editorial**Right To Vote Is All-Important**

Now that the August primary elections are over and those of us eligible to vote have done so by means of the absentee ballots, much of the unease which we felt over the possibility of losing the right of franchise has been alleviated.

Before the general elections in November, all of us will be in other centers, relocation centers, but the right of voting will still be ours.

Also, assurance has been received that those citizen evacuees who have attained their majority since evacuation may apply for registration in the county of their last residence prior to removal to either assembly or relocation centers. This procedure of registration is to be handled by the individual through the Registrar of Voters of his county.

The significance of this is a welcome antidote to the poisonous threats made against the citizenship rights of nisei who, through no desire or act of their own, have been placed in the unavoidable position of having their loyalty to America questioned.

Voting by absentee ballots on local issues in the former hometown from relocation centers hundreds of miles away may sometimes seem futile. The principle, however, of the right of franchise granted to all citizens by the Constitution of the United States is one not to be taken lightly.

Whereas the mere possession of the right to vote, in itself, is thought of casually where the right is not challenged (witness the many eligible voters on the outside who do not exercise that right and privilege), imagine the position of the nisei if that right were revoked.

The possession of this constitutional right may prove to be the one bridge after the war is over by which the nisei may once again attain his former place as a useful, functioning American citizen.
