

THIRD POLIO VICTIM FIVE-YEAR-OLD BOY STRICKEN

Theodore Tokuno, 5-year-old boy of 11H-4D, was stricken with poliomyelitis and was admitted to the isolation ward Monday afternoon, it was disclosed by Dr. William Carstarphen,

chief medical officer.

Theodore is the third polio victim of Amache. The Tokuno family was immediately placed under quarantine, it was reported.



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LABOR CAMP INCIDENT PROVOKED BY TRANSIENTS

A teletype received yesterday by Project Director Lindley from Ottis Peterson, acting relocation supervisor, reports an incident which occurred at Provo WPA labor camp, Utah, Saturday night.

With 200 evacuee residents housed in the Provo labor camp, the camp director reported that persons had fired shots into the camp. As a result of this, a girl received a scratch from a shot gun pellet, but no medical treatment was required.

Following up this case, it was reported that the incident was largely instigated by transients stopping at Provo, and 5 arrests have been made. The arrested ringleaders are facing federal charges, and Provo

city officials, headed by Mayor Maurice Harding promised the camp residents full prosecution to those involved.

After a conference with WPA relocation officers, most of the evacuees expressed their intention to remain as long as their services were needed in saving Utah counties' crops.

NISEI TROOPS IN ITALY

PROVE THEY ARE REAL AMERICANS

With their motto "Remember Pearl Harbor," the first unit of American-born Japanese troops entered the European theater of combat in the mountains above the Gulf of Salerno in Italy on Sept. 25, according to an Associated Press release.

The unit was recruited from Hawaii and most of its officers are Regular Army men who have served there.

"They're really anxious to get into action," their commander said, "and feel they've got a chance to

prove they're real Americans and demonstrate their loyalty."

It was said the men preferred to be in the Pacific fighting the Japanese than the Germans.

When a German prisoner saw these soldiers, he asked if they were Japanese. The reply was that they were Americans of Japanese ancestry.

The German shook his head in bewilderment and cried: "Ach! That's American."

Opening of the Baltimore relocation office for resettlement opportunities in Maryland and the Delmarva peninsula is announced by Robert C. Cronin, relocation officer in charge. Cronin discloses the following facts about this area:

Agriculture of various kinds is carried on throughout the area, principally, diversified dairy, grain and livestock farming.

The largest city in this area is Baltimore with a population of 1,000,000 and located in the center of Maryland. Here, housing is one of the chief problems as is true of any large industrial metropolis.

Just as in any community, there will be some problems to be overcome with respect to community attitudes. However, there are numerous opportunities, with a great many socially-minded and

tolerant employers, civic leaders and ordinary citizens in Baltimore, who are willing to welcome the evacuees and help them to adjust in the community.

JAPANESE PROBLEM

May Become An Important Issue

The Japanese problem in America may become an important issue in the approaching Presidential campaign was the talk given by Dr. John R. Lechner, executive secretary of the Americanism Educational League, was the news item in San Francisco Chronicle's recent issue.

"There seems to be a determined effort on the part of the WRA to ignore completely the wishes of coastal citizens, and already Japanese are filtering into this area," stated Dr. Lechner.

"Since Japanese-Americans are not wanted back in the Western states, political leaders in Oregon and Washington have indicated their intention of presenting

this problem to the platform committee of a national party," he concluded.

Said Brenton, "Residents should need no urging to relocate in the Chicago area for it offers not only respectable jobs, but unequalled access to education. There are large colleges and universities where, by enrolling in night classes one may train for better jobs."

Latest figures show that 21 relocators have signed up for the "Special" and at least 14 more are needed to fill the quota required for the "Special."

KASAI FIRST MAINLAND-NISEI
TO DON MERCHANT MARINE UNIFORM

Natily attired in the all-white uniform of the United States Merchant Marines and seen within the center since Thursday is 1st Shipmate Sam Tsutomu Kasai, 23, formerly of Santa Rosa, Calif., who is visiting his folks here.

At present, there are more than 200 Hawaiian-nisei seamen in the Merchant Marines, but Sam holds the distinction of being the first mainland-nisei to don the uniform of this important branch of the Navy. Therein lies a story of perseverance, tenacity and "never say die."

Sam was 17 when he first attempted to join the Navy at Vallejo, Calif., but because he was a person of Japanese ancestry he was refused. Then in 1941 when construction workers were needed at Pearl Harbor, he offered his services but again he was turned down--and again, for the same reason.

Finally, came evacuation, and Sam was sent to the Poston relocation center. When best workers were needed Sam packed his grips and went into the fields and upon conclusion of the harvest he drifted to Denver. Not content with this Colorado city, he then traveled

cross-country to New York and was employed in a restaurant.

Here his desire to join some branch of the Navy took hold again and he visited the Merchant Marine recruiting office. Once more he was turned down, but discouragement meant little to him--he visited the office every day for 11 days. Finally, when he had given up all hope, he met the officer in charge of the recruiting branch, who sensed Sam's eagerness to fight for his country, and subsequently made arrangements for enlistment. After 6 years Sam was a part of the Navy!

During the past four months, Sam has been overseas to Sicily and to various points in North Africa.

Upon his return to New York, he received his Campaign Bars, indicating the seas that he had sailed. They include the Mediterranean, North Atlantic, and Asiatic.

Asked why he enlisted, Sam replied, "Well, I'm doing my part to win this war, and at the same time I'm doing what I like to do best, travel. I've sailed around three-quarters of the world and traveled through 39 states."--S. Sako

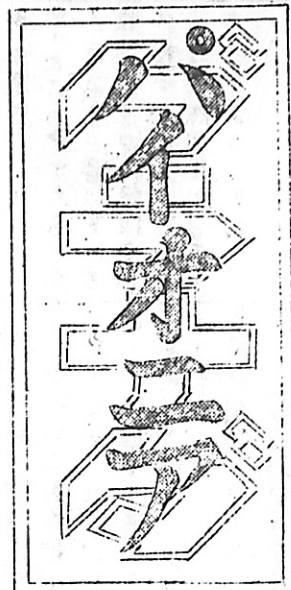
HOMEMAKING**PLACES THIRD**

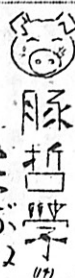
