

Lamar received some undesirable publicity by radio Tuesday, when announcement was made over a Denver station that a polio epidemic was raging here and that schools and other places were closed. Full publicity has been given to the polic cases which have occured here, on the theory that publicity is better than keeping such matters "under cover", which is some time advocated by some people.

With the exception of one case at Amache no new cases have developed in this community for several days and with the gradual coming of cooler weather all authorities say. that the number of cases will continue to recede. The radio story was undoubtedly based on the What do the people of action of Pace county authorities inclosing the schools one say to this? I there. I would like an answer Weeks ago local school authorities conferred with

health officers and issued a statement that the schools would not be closed, because investigation has shown that an orderly procedure of community activities provides a better battle ground against polio than releasing children to go hither and yon. All parents are undoubtedly taking care to see that their children are not unduly exposed in orowded places and otherwise are informing themselves as to what the symptoms and on how to handle the disease in its preliminary stages.

There is nothing in the local polic situations to become panicky about and it is to be hoped that the authorities will continue to handle the matter in the same level headed way in which they have to date.

# "TAKE A CHANCE" EVACUEES RECEIVE BEST JOB OFFERS Evacuees going out to employed as semi-skilled

Evacuees going out to relocate who have sufficient faith to "take a chance," and find suitable jobs on arriving at their destinations are actually receiving the "oream of the crop" of all job offers available for evacuees, according to word received from E. Raymond Booth, relocation officer in Cincinnati.

This statement is true as only a small proportion of job offers are actually sent to the project leave

offices.

Booth stressed further that evacuees still in the centers may even lose contact with opportunities in the Cincinnati area so he disclosed the following information.

"Back in March when the Cincinnati relocation office was first opened, there were only 75 nises soldiers at Fort Thomas just across the Ohio river on the Kentucky side," Booth revealed.

"Today there are over 325 nisei and issei in Cincinnati and the surrounding territory, and not one person is unemployed, although not all have gotten their "dream jobs," he continued.

Booth declared, "There is no wage discrimination here, no one is living in a slum area, and the evacues children are treated well at the public school."

"Those who have relocated in this area have different types of jobs--some are


