NISEI SOLDIERS IN ITALY

RESCUE 22 AMERICAN PARATROOPERS

American-born Japanese soldiers went into action for the first time in the war several days ago at Renevento, Italy, the United Nations Radio at Algiers reported Monday night, ac-cording to a UP release.

The detachment of Nisei was under fire "four long days" and finally entered the town to rescue 22 Amerioan paratroopers who had been behind enemy lines for more than two weeks.

Today I traveled to Sioux City accompanied by my brother, Roy Hatanaka, and his wife, to meet Dr. Jipson who will lease a 300 acre farm to my brother. Dr. Jipsen also owns 6,000 acre farms which he intends to lease to the evacuees.

Sioux City is the secand largest city in Iowa, somewhat similar to Sacramento in size and popula-tion. Perhaps, because the majority of the local residents are Scandinavians, whose mother country is neutral in this war, there is no sign of discrimination or racial hatred.

We have met a young nisei who operates an art goods store in the center of this city, and we have noticed that his business is quite flourishing. should think if any Amache resident establishes a business firm here, American customers would patronize just as they are favoring this young nisei 1 mentioned.

Coming to the Mid-Western state, I have been impressed by the vastness of the American continent and I have been convinced that the evacuees should forget about returning to California where anti-Japanese sentiment is high, and resettle in an inland state.

Two Japanese Buddhist temples used as storehouses for household effects of more than 100 Japanese-American families evacuated from the West coast have been looted, it was disclosed Monday by WRA officials here, was the news story in Tuesday's Los Angeles Times.

Three Japanese, two of them aliens and one a third-generation resident, arrived in Los Angeles from the various relocation centers to identify the remaining property, which till be removed to government warehouse temporarily and sent later to the real

Vandals who broke into the temples destroyed dishes, furniture and personal effects, besides turning upside down and scattering belongings of various families throughout the room.

The damages of the locted temples located at 2800 E. Third St. and 123 S. Hewitt St., were estimated to amount to several thousand dollars.

Accusation by some neighbors that a Japanese-American couple hadbeen "slipped" into a kitchenette at Kansas City was described as "ridiculous" Tuesday by a WRA representative, according to a news story in the Kansas City Star's Cct. 12

"They are American citizens and Christians and should enjoy the same rights as other citizens," Robert Iki,as WRA counselor, said. "They obtained their residence just as many other citizens, by responding to a newspaperadvertisement."

The couple -- Mr. and Mrs. Nish Kumagai -- are worshipat his church, Rev. Clark Holt said.

The pastor said he visited the couple and learned they were members of a Baptist church at Seattle, where they had been in the floral business. A picture of Kumagai's brother, in his army sergeant's uniform, proudly displayed in Was little apartment on the the third floor, the minister said.

.They were invited to attend the Forest avenue church and said they would appeara week from the following Sunday. The preacher 'told his congregation of the circumstances, including reports of antagonism as to their residence. When they attended the church, members staved late to shake hands with the couple and welcome them to the church group.

Both husband and wife are employed in a garment plant, he as an order filler and she in the sewing room.

"Mr. and Mrs. Kumagai have proved their citizenship under pressure," Iki said. "They were both born in the United States and at the evacuation center they established that they were good citizens by test."

Iki said there now are about 130 Japanese-Americans, who have established their loyalty and desire to remain Americans, located

in Kansas City.

There are persons and organizations in every country of the world who believe that self-control is the best kind of control, that no minority has a right to dominate or exploit majority, and that no majority has right to deny equal opportunities and responsibilities to any minority who lives among

it. There are other issues


