

DEFENSE COMMAND RELEASES CONTRABAND CLAIMANTS CLASSIFIED IN THREE CATEGORIES

The release of contraband in custody of Western Defense Command at Los Angeles and San Francisco warehouses was announced by the commanding general of the Western Defense Command with certain restrictions and limitations, according to word received from Leland Barrows, acting director of the WRA in Washington.

All prohibited articles now in the custody of the Western Defense Command

may be returned only to original owners of the following classifications: (1) United States soldiers of Japanese ancestry; (2) United States citizens now residing outside the Western Defense Command area; and (3) any person who has been exempted from the provisions of Western Defense Command proclamations pertaining to persons of Japanese ancestry (i.e., mixed marriage or mixed-blood exemptees) unless such persons are aliens to — continued on page 3 —

SIXTY TULEANS TO ARRIVE, FACE HOUSING PROBLEM

A request to accommodate 60 more Tuleans (12 families and 12 singles) who are either relatives or friends of local residents was received this week from Raymond R. Best, project director of Tule Lake, stated James G. Lindley, project director.

"This group will be accepted at Amache as soon as the housing is available," Lindley declared.

"Although a number of evacuees are relocating continuously, regular block apartments are not suffi-

cient for the expected newcomers, therefore, the various recreation halls will probably be used," added Lindley.

SURETY BOND APPROVAL

HALTS CASH GRANT ISSUANCE

"No cash grants will be made for several weeks until the approval of Miss Vera Hayes's surety bond has been received," declared T. Read Hanson, finance officer, Wednesday. This move was necessitated when James C. Hanagan, agent

cashier, left Wednesday evening to report for active service in the U.S. Army on Nov. 1.

Miss Hayes, secretary to James G. Lindley, project director, was selected as Hanagan's successor.

Hanson added, "All cash grants made after approval of Miss Hayes's surety bond has been received will be made in form of checks. Meanwhile, relocators may have to use their personal funds while en route, but all checks and meal allowances will be forwarded to them at their destination."

TWENTY-FIVE LAMAR SHOPPING PASSES SET AS DAILY QUOTA

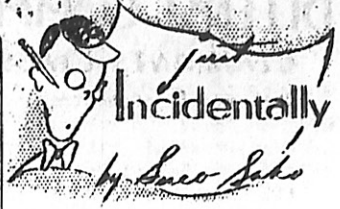

GRANADA PIONEER

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Residents may soon feel a "pinch in their pocket-books" if the proposed revenue bill approved by the House Ways and Means Committee Tuesday in Washington, passes the Senate and is signed by the President.

This tax bill will boost local postage rates from 2 to 3 cents, and air mail would be hiked from 6 to 10 cents an ounce and rates doubled on second-class mail, money orders, registered mail, and insured mail as well as third-class mail. The proposal to push the 3-cent-rate on out-of-town letters was rejected.

Another noteworthy increase was the boost from 1 cent to 3 cents tax for each 10-cent admission on all entertainment.

A number of serious accidents has occurred in the various relocation centers during the past several weeks, and word has been received from Washington which indicates we may have more strict traffic regulations enforced.

Two of the relocation centers will be closed by next July, was the prediction voiced by Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director, in his address Oct. 22, before the community council and key leaders of representative groups in Topaz, according to the Topaz Times.

15,000 DISLOYALS STAGE STRIKE AT TULE LAKE

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 28-- Claiming they are "prisoners of war," 15,000 disloyal Japanese in Tule Lake, Calif. went on a strike-- "a passive resistance" policy against harvesting crops for center consumption, according to Robert B. Cozzens, assistant WRA director.

The strikers are under strong army guard and the center is enclosed by a double barbed wire fence.

No violence thus far has been observed and none is anticipated.

Between 300 and 350 loyal Japanese from the other centers volunteered to harvest the hundreds of acres of root crops, including potatoes, cabbage, carrots, beets and turnips. They are being moved to Tule Lake, and will be sent to other centers for use of

the loyal Japanese. Officials of the Tule Lake center asserted the strike is "the work of experts," but that no apparent leader or spokesman has appeared. The strikers refuse to talk to the camp officials.

Agitation began at the center, a WRA spokesman said, soon after the disloyal Japanese arrived, and a truck accident in which one Japanese farm laborer was killed and several injured was seized upon as an excuse for the strike.

MONDAY SET AS OPENING DATE FOR WORKERS' MESS

No one will be permitted to receive another person's check.

from the contraband provisions of Presidential Proclamation No. 2525 of March 7, 1941 are applicable.

Articles which will not be returned to the above indicated owners are military weapons including all fire arms, radio transmitting sets or parts thereof; and Japanese phonograph records. In addition, short-wave radio receiving sets will not be returned to citizens presently residing in Jerome, Rohwer, Granada and Heart Mountain relocation centers.

The proper procedure in securing these released articles will be issued soon, according to Barrows.

FIVE LOCAL JAPANESE WOMEN NABBED BY FBI

TRINIDAD, Colo., Oct. 27-- Five Amache Japanese were held by FBI authorities when snapshots showing six German war prisoners and Japanese women in fond embrace, one with a small baby, were taken from one of the Germans. These six German war prisoners escaped from the nearby internment camp and were captured in northern New Mexico last week, two at a time and at various localities.

Prisoners of war from the Trinidad camp and Japanese-Americans from Amache have been working together on farms in the recent months.

The FBI confirmed that an investigation of the matter was underway and that the women were being questioned, but would release no details.

Project Director James G. Lindley said five Japanese-American families, numbering 24 persons, had been resettled in the Trinidad area and that seven others—including four women—were on seasonal leave from camp to work on farms in this area.

HEALTH CAMPAIGN LAUNCHED BY ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Stressing the importance of two major factors--rest and washing with soap that help materially to keep children healthy and free of disease,--the elementary school launched their health campaign Wednesday by issuing health charts to children, which are to be filled out at home and returned to school.

Parents are asked to cooperate in the present campaign of health and safety by bringing to the children the importance of following the health factors in keeping their resistance high. Little children of pre-school age should have "around the clock" sleep periods, according to the school health department, while elementary school pupil should sleep at least 9 hours.

Still the cheapest and the most effective way of keeping disease from spread-

ing is washing of hands more often with soap and warm water, the medical authorities added.

280 BARRELS OF PICKLES CANNED

The Maximum production of the center cannery will not be attained this season as this industry was started late, according to John Spencer, chief of agriculture.

To date, the cannery has produced 280 barrels of cucumber pickles and chow-chow pickles. The latter food is a combination of cucumbers, turnips, and beets. These preserved food are stored for center consumption during the winter.

At present tomatoes, beets and turnips are being canned.

DEPORTATION OF LOYAL JAPS URGED AT HEARING

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 19-- "If we're going to have a bunch of weasels in our pulpits, let's find them out," Dr. B. Carruthers, a former Navy chaplain, pleaded at the hearing to determine the community's attitude on possible return of Japanese to the Pacific Coast. Carruthers told a California Senate Investigating committee that too many clergymen are influencing the American public toward leniency for the Japanese which he described as "a race that is undeserving of leniency."

Continued Carruthers, "I'm in favor of postponing the question of Japanese resettlement until after the war. And wait till our boys come home for they may have something to say about this matter. I don't believe they want to come home and find that the Japs have taken all the choice land."

The place for loyal Japs after the war, Carruthers

argued, is in Japan, "where they can aid in the rebuilding of that land after it has been thoroughly conquered by the United Nations."

Preceding Carruthers on the stand was a former Navy undercover agent who testified that a Japanese naval Commander said, "90 per cent of the Japanese merchants here are in the pay of the Japanese government."

WAKE UP AMACHE! THIS IS WAR!

Yes, you say, but some of these minorities are trying to exploit us, and have done so in the past. Why should we fight for the rights of the Jews when some of us were cheated out of our eyeteeth by Jews during evacuation? True, even among minorities there are selfish persons, shortsighted exploiters who have to be kept in line.

But the majority of Jews are not of that sort, and many evacuee can testify to the help he received from a Chinese, a Negro, a Catholic, or a Jewish or Gentile friend during that same evacuation. It would be unjust indeed to class all Jews as exploiters, or all Japanese Americans as spies or disloyal persons, just because a few such can possibly be found among them. If we are willing to give up the political and economic rights of another group on racial, religious, or economic basis, then we can hardly expect other groups to fight for our rights either. "United we stand, divided we fall."

We may always expect the selfish individual to use all the tricks he can to gain his ends—including the powerful force of or-

ganization. That force we can wield just as strongly, and with just as much benefit to ourselves and to all lovers of freedom and democracy—if we really try. What have we done to go out and tell our story and offer our help and cooperation to the American public and to the groups and organizations in it who sympathize with our stand for freedom and democracy?

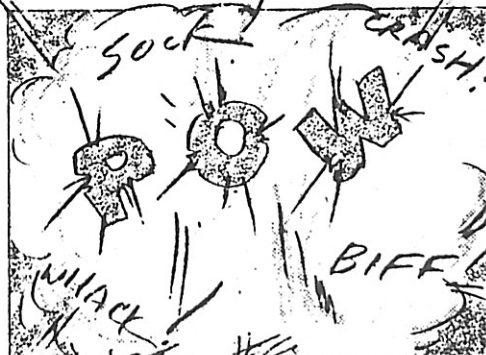
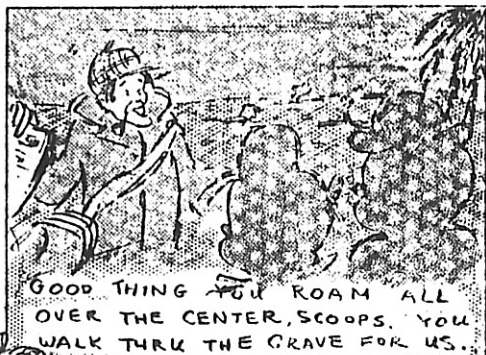
We have received aid from some, and we have talked at length with and reached fine and durable understandings with the church and school groups and the social workers, but frequently that was the result of their initiative as much as ours. What have we done to sell ourselves and our cause to the labor unions, the newspapers, the movies, the manufacturers, the chambers of commerce, the Kiwanians, the Rotarians, the bankers, the tradesmen, and all the others?

Before we succumb to sitting around complaining about how sensational newspapers treat us, it behooves us to do some real thinking and active speaking and working to put our situation, our point of

view, and its importance to democracy and freedom over. So far only a small but determined group of Japanese Americans have had the guts and the gumption to carry on the argument—to answer the Dies Committee and tell them off as they should be told: Mary Oyama, Mike Masaoka, Saburo Kido, Togo Tanaka, Walter Tsukamoto, Kenji Okuda, Larry Tajiri, Hito Okada, and a handful of others.

Did you write a letter to some Americans of non-Japanese ancestry and tell them the truth in refutation of the Dies smears? Have you gone out of the Center to carry the ball for our team by showing your mettle to a new employer, by getting a chance to demonstrate to a new group of fellow-employees that Dies, Costello and Co. are wrong? Have you helped those forces in the United States who are fighting tooth and toenail for the freedom and liberty we hold so dearly by wanting or trying to get in and doing some enthusiastic work in producing food, pounding a typewriter, tending a bunch of babies in a day nursery, running a truck, or doing anything else necessary or helpful?
