

AMACHE NISEI: HONORED AS FIRST WAC RECRUIT TO BE INDUCTED AT DENVER ON DEC. 7

The distinction of being the first Japanese American accepted as a WAC recruit is believed to be Miss Iris Watanabe, 20 years of age, of Amache. She completed arrangements for induction with the WAC officials in Chicago on Nov. 22.

Noteworthy is the fact that Miss Watanabe is scheduled to be inducted on Dec. 7, the second anniversary of the sneak attack by Japan on Pearl Harbor.

This week, Miss Watanabe is visiting her parents here and will be leaving within a few days for induction at Denver.

Said Miss Watanabe, "I hope to help make the land of my ancestors pay for its unwarranted attack on my country."

Prior to her enlistment in the WACs, Miss Watanabe was employed at the center leave office.

GRANT SEASONAL LEAVES IF CERTAIN CONDITIONS ARE MET

Seasonal leaves will be granted despite CDT request in special merited

cases, disclosed Willis Hanson, leave officer, if transportation used is not by train or bus, nor in any way interfere with this bureau's emergency measure.

ODT "directive" states that during the period of Dec. 1-Jan. 10 no short-term or seasonal leave shall be granted so that the expected heavy holiday traffic on traveling by service men will not be further taxed by civilians.

But if a farmer needs seasonal workers for immediate harvest and is able to furnish his own vehicle for transportation, the leave office will consider his case on its merit, concluded Hanson.

EMPLOYMENT PROCEDURES TO BE REORGANIZED FOR EFFICIENCY

A new reorganization plan for operating evacuee employment procedures efficiently will be installed which calls for the formation of a relocation division and a personnel management section. Discussions for the new plan have been underway since Monday with Harold James, employment officer of the personnel division in Washington DC, who arrived here the first of the week.

The relocation division will deal only with the relocation program while the personnel management section under administrative division will be responsible for the selection and placement of appointive and evacuee personnels. To date, the employment division has been handling both problems.

This revised plan will be inaugurated in all the centers to establish a higher standard of center employment.

NISEI CASUALTY LIST IN ITALY REACHES 169

Secretary of War Stimson has given special praise to the battle record made in the Italian campaign by Americans of Japanese ancestry. In his re-

cent press conference in Washington (November 25) he said:

"General Clark reports that the 100th Infantry Battalion, composed of Americans of Japanese ancestry, continues to make a highly creditable campaign record. These soldiers are well trained and well disciplined and fight with confidence and resolution. They are particularly skillful in scouting and patrolling. They are cheerful and uncomplaining, and their rate of illness is practically nil. The casualties to date in the Italian campaign are 34 killed, 130 wounded and 5 missing."

NURSES' AIDE PROBLEM BECOMING MORE CRITICAL

The problem of alleviating the nurses' aide shortage still remains unsolved with only 10 new employees answering the call for one nurses' aide from each block, according to W. Ray Johnson, chief of community management.

At present, only 24 nurses' aides, 11 part-time

workers and two orderlies are caring for the patients at the center hospital, while minimum requirement is at least 40 nurses' aides.

Out of the 24 workers, six have already given intentions of relocating to outside hospitals or furthering their training else-

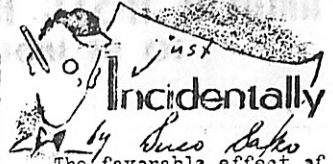
GRANADA PIONEER

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The favorable effect of Ambassador Joseph Grew's recent plea that a distinction be made between enemy aliens and loyal Americans of Japanese descent is becoming more and more noticeable.

Jumping on the bandwagon and supporting the nisei cause was the Minneapolis Star Journal in its editorial of Nov. 23.

It said impart:

"Undoubtedly, Mr. Grew's vigorous words were evoked in part by public reaction to the trouble early this month at the Tule Lake, California camp where disloyal Japanese are segregated. The careful, factual job which most newspapers did in reporting what actually happened there was tarnished by the colored accounts published by a few newspapers on the Pacific coast and by the Hearst press elsewhere, and by inflammatory treatment of the episode on the radio.

"The happenings at Tule Lake ought not to be allowed to reflect upon the more than 100,000 loyal persons of Japanese origin among us, most of whom are as eager as the rest of us to see an United Nations victory and to have a part in it.

"The Japanese-Americans have a higher percentage of men in our armed forces (10,000) than any other racial group. Before the war they had a smaller crime percentage than any other group. They had a higher per cent of their young people in college. Almost none ever were on relief. Secretary Stimson is authority for the statement that there has been no known case of sabotage by Japanese in Hawaii, either on Dec. 7, 1941, or since. The FBI says there has been no known case of sabotage by the Japanese on the Pacific coast.

COMBAT TEAM LAUDED FOR THEIR FIGHTING QUALITY

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN ITALY, Nov. 27,--There are few if any more loyal soldiers than the Japanese-Americans of the 100th In-

fantry Battalion now fighting the Nazis in this theater.

That's the word of soldier-comrades and officers whose story, although necessarily brief because of security, is told here for publication for the first time; A picture of their few days in port of embarkation and their trip to this theater which shows them loyal, democratic, earnest, ready to fight--and inveterate gamblers.

They went into the fight in Italy shouting "Remember Pearl Harbor" which totally confused the enemy and, to a lesser degree, confused some Americans.

SAW JAPS ATTACK

Americans are sensitive about Pearl Harbor, but the 100th Infantry Battalion--recruited from loyal Japanese-Americans in the Hawaiian Islands--is especially resentful. So are most of their friends and relatives, as evidenced by a letter signed by hundreds of Japanese-American girls in Hawaii and received just as the unit left its port of embarkation. The letter said:

"Beloved Friends and Brothers of the 100th Infantry:

"We are so proud that you are able to represent us from the Hawaiian Islands and that you have been given

APPEAL BOARD PLANNED FOR "INNOCENT" JAPANESE

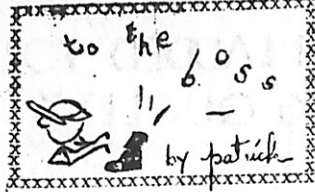
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 24--Robert Cozzens, regional director of the WRA, said the agency was considering plans for the establishment of an appeal board to head applications from Japanese who wish to leave the Tule Lake relocation center.

He said some "innocent Japanese may have been

caught in the net" and taken to Tule Lake, which was established as a segregation center for those identified as disloyal.

Cozzens asserted many of the Japanese at Tule Lake had gone there because of family ties.

"No Japanese will be released if there is anything to indicate they are pro-Japanese," Cozzens declared.

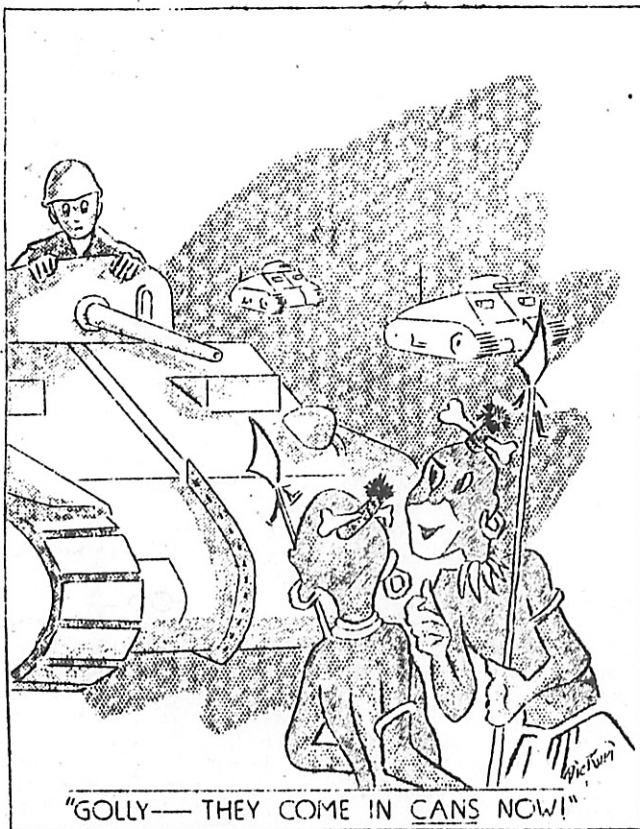

NISEI POTPOURRI

VIEWPOINTS

MANY of you must have read Miss Jonnie Aizawa's letter to the editor in the Nov. 26 issue of the PIONEER. I was almost certain that somebody would express his or her opinion on the matter--but so far no letter.

So purely from academic standpoint, not to mention self-defense, and being glutton for punishment, I'm going to devote today's column on that subject.

ONE column is quite inadequate in dissecting Miss Aizawa's missive properly so let's just take the major points and see where we are not in accord.

In the first place she is talking exclusively about nisei, while my commentary dealt primarily with issei. But aside from that point let's see what follows.

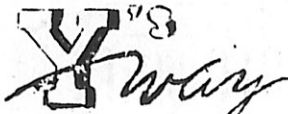
Our writer states--WRA is finding that "many relocatees are hard to place simply for the pathetic fact that they are unable to speak their mother tongue, American, intelligibly." From where I sit (just south of the 8-ball) the American language could apply as "mother tongue" in the foregoing statement only to the nisei.

Plainly Miss Aizawa is saying that the nisei are hard to relocate because they can't speak American intelligibly. A nisei in that category is certainly pathetic. I agree.

SHE ends with "It does not enter into the normal course of life, since it is not our duty to perpetuate the language of ancestors from other countries in this land of ours."

To that statement I can't agree. Aside from the fact that I did not say that it was "our duty to perpetuate the language of ancestors," but because foreign languages do enter into normal course of life. Too many schools have courses in Spanish, French, German, Latin, etc. Too many students are taking foreign language courses.

So I must stand by my ---continued on page 8---

SAN FRANCISCO--Japanese resident of Oakland, who find it uncomfortable to visit California just now even when under military permit and escorted by WRA.

That's the statement of Mrs. Yoshiko Takahashi, 36, Japanese alien, formerly a

resident of Oakland, who has asked for immediate return to the WRA camp at Topaz, Utah, on the ground that much hostility has been shown her.

Mrs. Takahashi, who lived in Oakland for 24 years before being excluded from the defense area came to Oakland with her two sons, Frank 21, and Yoneo, 19, under a permit from Western Defense Command to visit her husband, Chiyuzaimon Takahashi, ill in a hospital at San Leandro since 1933.

Mrs. Frances M. Farrell of the WRA accompanied the Japanese family. Mrs. Farrell complained to WRA in San Francisco that hotel accommodations which had been reserved in advance by WPA were denied at San Leandro, and that the Japanese felt that in general so much hostility had been displayed that they wished to return to Topaz at once.

To the men who commanded and staffed the United States Army transport which took the unit from American shores toward the invasion of Italy, the quick and eager courage of the soldiers came as no surprise.

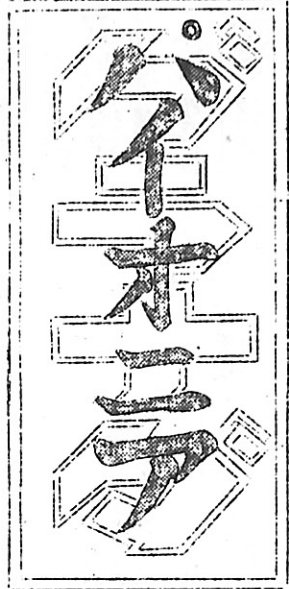
