Katsuki Iki was elected Executive Secretary with an Executive Committee composed of Dr. Itasuge Okubo, Dr. Fatsuhiko Miyamoto, Rev. Lester Suzuki, and Mack Saito (with Kay Sugahara as alternate for Saito) at a meeting, Saturday.

The group feels that persons deciding to relocate may be helped considerably by a service of this kind, which aims to supply information on various problems, such as how to travel, rationing, how to secure housing, and other things of this nature. Details —continued on page 3—

COMMUNITY LEADERS SET SOCIAL AFFAIR POLICY

We, the Community Council and the Block Managers Assembly of the Granada Relocation Center, after a thorough study of the matter of traditional formalities in connection with weddings and funerals, have mutually agreed that these formalities should be limited because of the present living standards and conditions of the evacuees. Therefore, we appeal to every resident of this center to give this matter his deepest consideration and cooperation so that the following limitations may be carried out satisfactorily:

1. Discontinuance of receptionists at the place of the wedding or the funeral.
2. Conducting the wedding receptions as inelaborately as possible.
3. Discontinue the sending of obituary gifts (koden) or gifts of any other form in the aforesaid instances with exceptions being given to relatives or close friends. However, this limitation is not to

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FEDERAL EMPLOYMENT

49 NISEI TO TAKE CIVIL SERVICE TEST TOMORROW

Tomorrow morning's civil service test will have at least 49 of center's comely, clerical-minded nisei taking the typing and stenography examination for federal employment, stated Mario Vecchio, assistant placement officer.

The place for this test was not known at press time

but the time will be 9 o'clock and all applicants will be personally notified as to the place, and Paul Kelly, civil service representative, will be in charge.

Those passing this test, as announced previously, will be eligible to apply for government jobs in the various branches of federal service.

Others wishing to take this test may yet do so by filing short form "Application For Federal Employment" with Vecchio before tomorrow morning and arrangements will be made.

GRANADA PIONEER

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A 17-year-old girl, Bessie Yasumatsu, became a "headache" last Thursday for the police and Federal authorities in San Francisco because she had too many "halves."

Bessie caused a big hub-bub among the officials over her status--half-white, half-Japanese, and living at the home of her half-sister, a Caucasian married to a Chinese.

It was discovered that Bessie's mother, a Caucasian, first married a white man, then a Korean, and finally a Japanese who died ten years ago. Still more complications "cropped up" when the police were informed that Bessie had one brother and a half-brother in the US Army. Adding to the muddle was the news that she came to San Francisco from Utah in June of 1942 to care for her blind and crippled mother and her half-sister, Mrs. Inez Woo, who is likewise ill.

Finally, Bessie was released on an order from Thomas C. Lynch, Assistant US Attorney, until further investigation and study were made. But according to US Attorney Frank J. Hennessy the girl could not be detained unless the Attorney General issued an order.

In order to keep in touch with the latest and most accurate information, correspondence with persons who have already relocated will be carried on, newspapers and other literature describing various parts of the country will be secured, and the Board will take over supervision of the Relocation library.

Iti expects to establish an office somewhere in the center within a few days.

INCOME TAX RETURNS TO BE FILED BY DEC. 15

All residents who fall in the following category and those who have not filed their income tax returns last September must file them on or before Dec. 15 at the project attorney's office, according to Jack Curtiss, acting project attorney.

In general, the "Declarations of Estimated Income and Victory Tax," reads as follows:

1. Farmers who have sufficient income to require filing and have postponed filing, under the special provisions of law which

permit farmers to wait as late as Dec. 15.

2. Persons who did file in September but underestimated their tax by more than 20 percent and who should, therefore, file "amended declarations" to avoid penalties.

3. Persons who did not file in September because their estimated income at that time was insufficient to require filing, but now come within any one of the following classes:

(a) Anyone who expects to have during the calendar year 1945 more than \$100 gross income from a source outside of wages which are subject to withholding and who also expect sufficient gross income to require filing an income tax return.

(b) Any single person expecting wages of more than \$2,700 during the year.

(c) Any married person or any married couple expecting individually or together more than \$3,500 from wages during the year.

(d) Any person who was required to file an income tax return for 1942 and who expects his wages in 1943 to be less than in 1942.

DeWITT'S EXCLUSION OF JAPANESE UPHeld BY US CIRCUIT COURT

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 2-- The constitutionality of Lieut. Gen. John L. DeWitt's evacuation orders for all persons of Japanese ancestry from West Coast military areas was upheld by the Ninth Federal Circuit Court of Appeals in a case ratified by the Supreme Court, according to the New York Times.

The decision, written by Judge Curtis D. Wilbur, was signed by four other western judges.

That General DeWitt's orders had exceeded "the area of descretionary powers legally to be exercised by him in Military Area No. 1" were not denied by Judge William Penman. How-

ever, DeWitt devoted much attention to hardships sustained by Japanese Americans not only through their being evacuated but by being kept in detention, and he expressed the hope that the evacuees might be compensated, stated Penman.

Judge Wilbur declared that the Supreme Court had upheld the validity of West Coast "curfew orders" against the Japanese in two known cases. He added that the government in prosecuting a war has the power to do everything necessary even if the powers it assumes temporarily infringe on some guaranteed liberties of individuals.

On the other hand, Judge Stephens elaborated that "there is no sanction in our governmental scheme for the courts to...take unto themselves the power to veto the acts of Congress and the President upon war matters so long as such acts are not in conflict with the provisions of the Constitution itself."

HOSPITAL NEWS

Due to the prevalent sickness in the center, block managers are requested to cooperate with the mess stewards and see that in case an entire family is ill, some provision is made regarding food and toilet facilities for them.

Center residents are asked to use their judgement as to when to call up a doctor, stated Dr. William Carstarphen, chief medical officer. Since numerous cases of colds and influenza occur among the hospital staff it is impossible for the doctors to respond to all the calls, he explained.

Since colds, influenza, and pneumonia are prevalent the following instructions which might be helpful to the residents were released by Dr. W. T. Carstarphen, chief medical director.

1. Avoid direct contact with people who seem to have colds. Avoid crowds.
2. At the first sign of cold start treatment immediately.
3. Stay in bed or at least indoors.
4. See that bowels are open and take laxative if needed.
5. Drink plenty of water.
6. Keep pan of water or stove. Keep temperature of room around 65 to 72 degrees.
7. If hot liquid is used or chest "treated" with ointment, stay in bed with extra blankets. Avoid drafts.
8. Cough or sneeze into paper napkin or cloth which can be burned.
9. Scald and wash with soap and water dishes and drinking glasses before using.
10. If you have a fever stay in bed until temperature is normal.

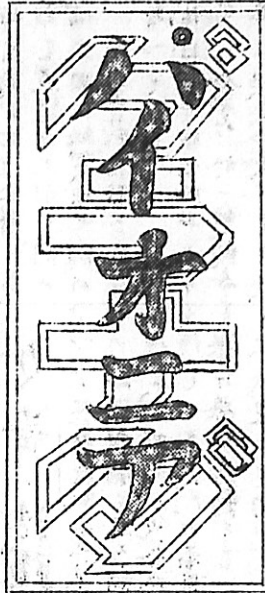
