WASHINGTON, -- Two recent actions, one by the Navy Department and one by the State Department, have made it practically impossible for fishermen or sailors to be hired along the Eastern Seaboard, or to sail out of East Coast harbors.

The ruling by the State Department requires that all persons of Japanese ancestry have a passport before sailing, and the day Department has been removing certain persons of Japanese ancestry from duty on vessels because of what may be a misinterpretation of the findings of the Japanese Joint Foard.

Until these two problems are adjusted, nisei who are planning to go to the Seaboard hoping to find such employment will be discouraged and will be assisted in temporarily ob-

Capt. George Contreras, head of the country's antisubversive unit, declared that the Japs all are here legally under permits issued by the western defense command after there investigation of each case. The whereabouts and activities of all are known to his group, army and navy intelligence offices and the FBI, he said.

# FIRST NISEI GIVEN RIGHT TO REENTER SEATTLE AREA

Shaffli, Wash.-An American-born Japanese girl who is the wife of a Seattle Chinese American and her two children have received permission to return home on January 1 to Seattle, Wash., according to the Post-Intelligencer. 3 he is wirs. hun P. Woo and is believed to be the first hisel to be allowed to re-enter the Seattle region.

Mrs. Woo was evacuated with other persons of Japaness ancestry in 1942 from Seattle, her two children, Mazel and Grace, accompanied their mother to a relocation center.

The Post-Intelligencer reported that it is understood that a number of other American-born Japanese women from Scattle, married to non-Japanese husbands, have filled similar applications.

Federal authorities, nowever, declared that lifting of regulations in Mrs. Woo's case does not indicate that the army will permit evacuated Americans of Japanese ancestry to return.

A small number of persons of depuness descent have been residing in the eventated area in the state of Washington because they were either too old or too ill to be removed to a recontion center without endengaring their lives.

DOUGHBOY JOE WISEI

JOE NISEI, American doughboy 1943, is pretty much in the thick of battle in the four corners of the globe. Heroism and glory isn't all in the 100th Infantry battalion. From the cold tundra of the Aleutians. the Attu landing, to the jungle-wilds of the hot South Pacific, the New Guinea's tropical thicket "everything just where molds," he is in there fighting for Uncle Sam.

He knows what it means to spend hours in a stinking fox hole, to be strafed by enemy planes, to go thru a campaign for weeks at a time without taking off shoes or clothing. Comfort reaches an irreducible minimum and life is rugged.

He knows what it means to sleep under a mosquito netting, to eat your food with the troical flies fighting for every spoonful. Nisei is in there pitching for something bigger than that, you can be sure of that. he is fighting two battles at once. He fighting a tough battle on the war front and indirectly fighting on the home front with their gallantry. He hopes to safeguard nisei future in the United States, to that end he is dedicating his life. To that end he will not fail us.

He wants to bring closer the day that will mean peace for this troubled world and infinitely a better and fairer treatment of the nisei when it is "all over but the shouting."

On the other hand, recreation department is not required to meet such an overhead and therefore is able to put on its program inexrensively. Which results in lower admission price.
