FARM DIVISION PURCHASES 900 SACKS OF POTATO SEEDS

Nine hundred sacks of potato seeds, enough to produce a 9-month supply of seeds for the center, were purchased for early and mid-season planting by the Farm division, according to Ernest Tigges, assistant farm superintendent. These seeds are expected to arrive during the latter part of February and March.

The varieties of seeds purchased were 50 sacks of "Early Strain Bliss Triumph" for early planting, 400 sacks of "Irish Cobblers" for mid-season planting, and 450 sacks for

storage use.

Tigges expressed the opinion that Amache was very fortunate in procuring her quota of quality seeds at a reasonable price.

CONSUL SCHEDULES PERIODIC CHECK-UP

A Spanish Consul with H. M. Benninghoff of the state department will visit this center for a periodic check-up on or about Dec. 27 and 28, according to a teletype received from Dillon S. Myers, national

Military Intelligence Service Language School. Lieut. Claire E. Armstrong and S. L. James Tanizawa and David Watanabe are the members of this visiting team.

All interested candidates will have an opportunity to talk over Army Language school problems and other pertinent information during their purported two-day stay, announced Walter Knodel, selective service officer, yesterday.

The primary purpose of the consul's coming here will be to consult with the Japanese nationals and to report to the Japanese government the conditions existing within the relocation centers, stated W. Ray Johnson, chief of community management.

The consul will confer with the block managers and with members of the appointed personnel.

During the course of the consul's stay he will be escorted on an inspection tour through the hospital, mess halls and to other divisions of the center.

This marks the third visit of a Spanish Consul to Amache.

Your new superintendent, Dr. Lloyd Garrison is certainly performing a wonderful job in operating the school system. I hope to see all the students relocated and perhaps may have the privi-

lege of seeing the boys in the navy."

Lieut. Terry graduated Dec. 10, from the Navy Basic Training school at the University of Arizona in Tucson, Ariz. His great ability and leadership stood out as he graduated in the upper 10 per cent of the class. He was selected as one of the 25 men, among the 400 trainees, for special assignment at an undisclosed location.

The junior high school choir paid him a tribute when he dropped in their classroom by singing "Anchors Aweigh."

Lieut. Terry was accompanied by Mrs. Terry and daughter.

FACING FACTS

JUST recently an anxious group of three women greeted home at the Denver union station Miss Arleta M. Miller, a daughter of one of the welcomees, who had traveled half way around the war-torn world. A journey that was delayed two years, a journey that took many weeks in this modern era of speed and more speed. This person was one of the Gripsholm repatriates who just reached here from Shanghai.

The significant part of this story is her true factual account about the French Concession and the Chapei concentration camp where she was interned.

SAID Miss Miller in part: "I experienced nothing that needs concealing. I WAS WELL TREATED THERE." Furthermore she continued "the committee faced the Jap commandant for us, gaining extra food and other things which did so much to take the sting out of the situation."

It wasn't so much that she spoke freely but that she spoke with honesty and without censure. No doubt her stay in the concentration camp was no vacation by any means. We can reflect upon that from our stay in a relocation center. Yet if she felt any remorse or bitterness she kept it to herself.

THEREIN lies a deep lesson for us--to make the best of any situation, good or bad. It is admitted that we went thru many "trials and tribulations" and we will go thru many more. You can bet your last year's bonnet on that. But what counts is our reaction. Will we bounce right back each time and fight for what is rightfully ours? Or give up when the going gets tough? Will we keep spending our spare time "knocking" each other" and keep griping?

OR shall we, like Chapei repatriates, take a more realistic, mutually beneficial viewpoint? That is, keep our evacuee represen-

This group constituted the fourth and last Colorado All-State contingent who enlisted after an extensive campaign.

Misses Bette Nishimura of Rocky Ford and Sue Ogata of La Salle, both natives of Colorado, were the other two nisei WAC inductees.

"I am delighted to be in the WACS," commented Miss Watanabe. "It is an honor not only to me but to other Japanese-Americans, and I shall be conscious of that all the time. I have always hated the militaristic clique in Japan and I resolved that I would do everything in my power to fight it. Not only for myself but for my native land."
