

# FIRE DESTROYS III APARTMENT; DAMAGES HEAVY

Amache's first major fire that had the local fire department in "dithers" occurred Monday afternoon about 3:30 o'clock at the Sugi Morimoto residence, 11E-6B. The Morimotos were absent at the time

the blaze was discovered. The alarm was sent to the fire department about 3:40 p.m. by a neighbor who saw the flames through the front windows. Both fire trucks answered the call under assistant Fire Chief

Jerry Sullivan's direction and the blaze was brought under control after much difficulty due to heavy smoke.

Considerable loss was suffered by Morimoto and his family with all their household goods and clothing burned and subsequently damaged by water. Apartment was ruined beyond repair and must undergo complete rebuilding before it can be tenanted again. But actual estimation of damages was not released by Fire Chief Vern Campbell.

Origin of the fire was not known but it was believed to have been caused by short circuit, according to the center fire authorities.

## AIRCRAFT PLANT OFFERS SKILLED JOBS TO NISEI

Nisei interested in airplane assembly work are given the long-awaited war plant clearance from the Internal Security Division of the 6th Service Command to place themselves at the Tuttle and Kift Inc., according to word received here from the Chicago WRA office. This concern manufactures air craft assemblies, PT boat galleys, and electrical control and switch equipment.

Out of approximately 350 employees there are about 20 nisei on the payroll who are operating drill and punch presses, power brakes, riveting, welding, and heat treating. General working conditions are said to be satisfactory since the turnover among nisei workers has been at a minimum, and employee relationship is rated as excellent.

This plant operates on 24-hour basis of three shifts and the wages range from 60 cents to \$1 an hour depending on employee's background and aptitude. And the night workers will re-

ceive ten per cent above day-shift rates. Automatic departmental bonus plan increases monthly income on percentage basis, which becomes effective after two weeks of employment.

Only citizens are eligible to apply and all applications should be forwarded to Elmer L. Shirrell, relocation supervisor, 266 West Jackson Blvd., Chicago 6, Ill. Further information may be gained at the center employment office.

## 150 LEAVE CLEARANCE CASES LEFT; 400 FINISHED TO DATE

Approximately 400 evacuee hearings have been processed so far and there are about 150 cases left on the docket at present, stated Walter J. Knodel, placement officer, Monday. Six persons have been denied clearance but supplementary hearings may change the status of several.

If possible the process will be speeded up to about 60 hearings a week with two three-men board meeting

twice a week and handling about 15 cases at each sitting, disclosed Knodel.

Average time consumed at each hearing is estimated at 20 minutes and takes anywhere from two weeks to several months before the final decision is received here from the leave clearance section of the Washington WRA office. There are three steps to the process:

1. Cause for the hearing;
2. Hearing before the project board.
3. Final decision from Washington.

In case the person cited for hearing is out on a leave there is an added step of having the nearest relocation officer take his testimony.

Any evacuee denied clearance may ask for a re-hearing if the project board is assured that he has new "evidence" to add to his original testimony.

## 103 DECEMBER INDEFINITES BOOST 1943 TOTAL TO 1532

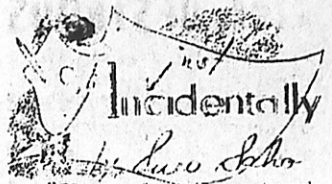
With 103 indefinite leaves issued for the month of December the grand net total for 1943 reached 1532 persons relocated to normal life on the outside, according to information released Monday by Mario Vecchio, ass't placement officer.

Seasonal leaves for December hit the year's low

of seven placements due to travel restrictions and low-ebb of seasonal works during winter months. Total placements for the year was 1488 with August, September and October as the peak months. There were 758 seasonal placements during the month of October, which incidentally was the highest for the year.

## TWO NISEI SOLDIERS DECORATED FOR COMBAT DUTY WITH US FORCES

Two Japanese-American soldiers are among those recently decorated by the War Department for service in combat duty with U. S. Forces in the Southwest Pacific and over Europe. Staff Sgt. Ben Kuroki of the Army Air Forces has been awarded the Distinguished

Flying Cross and Sgt. Kazuo Komoto has been decorated with the Purple Heart.

Inducted prior to Pearl Harbor, Sgt. Komoto is a veteran of both the Guadalcanal and New Georgia campaigns against the Japanese in the Southwest Pacific. He received the Purple Heart after taking part in an engagement in which he and several other men in his detachment were wounded by an enemy sniper who opened fire on them with a machine-gun mounted in a tree.

In announcing the award of the Distinguished Flying Cross to Sgt. Ben Kuroki, the War Department revealed that he had been a turret-runner on one of the Liberator bombers which delivered the crippling blow to Nazi oil supplies in the attack on the Ploesti oil fields in Rumania last August.

Sgt. Kuroki has previously been awarded the air medal for "participation in 100 hours of operational flight against the enemy in the Middle East Theatre", and three oak leaf clusters for taking part in "bomber combat missions over enemy-occupied Continental Europe."

Kuroki was among a group of American air fighters recently presented to the King and Queen of England when the royal couple visited the base at which they are stationed in England.

## HOSTEL ESTABLISHED TO AID RELOCATORS IN TWIN CITY AREA

Evacuee resettlers contemplating relocation in and around the Twin City area will be greatly aided by the newly established hostel known as the Twin City Lutheran Hostel. This organization, scheduled to open on Jan. 1, will serve relocators both in Minneapolis and St. Paul.

According to the bulletin sent out by this hostel,

it will be operated on a plan similar to other well founded hostels and the charges will be the same. Capacity will be about 22 people and the hostlers are expected to assist part time with maintenance duties. The house is in excellent repair and located in a well-to-do neighborhood, and has modern convenience.

This United Lutheran Church sponsored hostel will vary in one respect from others in that its primary objective will be to relocate members of the families already resettled in the district. The plans are to make the average allowable stay longer, since it is difficult to find permanent homes for families.

## NISEI DOUGHBOYS IN ITALY PROVE TO BE GOOD AMERICANS

WITH FIFTH ARMY IN ITALY, Dec. 27--The little men from the Hawaiian islands who have fought in the Italian invasion to prove they are as good Americans as any other doughboys have won their place so far as their fellow fighters are concerned.

From the beaches of Salerno right into the Nazi winter line these troops of Japanese descent have fought and are now fighting some of the hardest battles of the entire campaign.

They have asked no quarter, nor have they received any. They rank on a par with other troops for en-

durance, skill and ability--and they have added incentive of their effort to prove themselves good soldiers.

FEEL THEY ARE ON THE SPOT

"The boys feel they are on the spot and that they have a personal duty to make the people at home feel they really are as much Americans as anyone," said their commander, Major John A. Johnson Jr., whose home is at Kauai in the Hawaiian islands.

"They are no different from any other soldiers, but they have that added incentive to fight--because some of their fathers are in internment camps at home."

These island troops do not like to be called "Japanese-Americans" nor do they like to be regarded as different from any other troops.

About 10 per cent came into the army from the Hawaiian National Guard while the others entered through Selective Service. About 17 per cent of them are college men. Some operated or worked on plantations, some were school teachers and others were in business.

Since landing in Italy the unit has won a reputation for its close fighting.

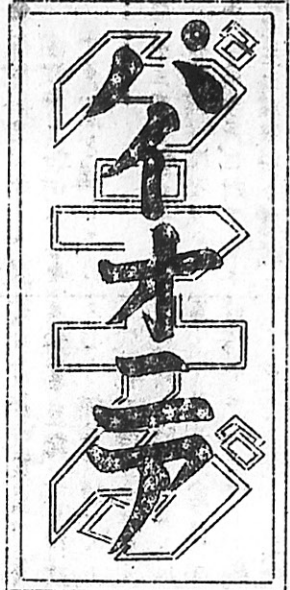
