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## ALIENS MUST NOTIFY CHANGE OF ADDRESS

According to instruction received from Washington WRA office, all aliens residing in relocation centers must "immediately prepare and individually mail to the Department of Justice--an Alien Registration Change of Address card," stated Mario Vecchio, assistant placement officer.

Contrary to previous WRA belief that Japanese aliens in the various centers would not be required to report "the fact of such residence," the Department of Justice declared recently that such information is required.

In order to comply with this new requirement the block personnel officers will distribute "address record card--alien registration" forms to their respective block residents concerned in the near future. Those cards are to be filled out in full and

mailed immediately.

Any alien failing to receive his "change of address card" should contact his block personnel manager and obtain his card as he (alien) is held responsible under the Justice Department regulations.

## EVACUEE PROPERTY POLICY REVISIONS RECOMMENDED

At the all-important evacuee property conference held in San Francisco, Jan. 16 thru 20, several recommendations for revision of present policies were made to the Washington office for its consideration and approval, according to Ralph J. Mitchell, administrative assistant, and Donald Korn, project attorney, both who returned from the confab Monday.

The conference attended by two representatives from

each relocation center was opened by Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, with Leland Barrows and several other Washington officials present, including two assistant solicitors.

Among the recommendations made were for the San Francisco office to issue a transportation handbook covering all operations; to provide for evacuee property supervisors to visit various relocation centers where volume and type of cases could be best handled by contacting individual evacuees; and to revise the present "500 pound" rule to allow for weight to be by individual member rather than family unit. And one proposal which failed to pass was to revamp the rule to permit shipment of some commercial property, namely farm machinery at WRA expense.

A visit by the delegates to the San Francisco warehouse showed that records and property confined therein are kept up to date.

Of interest to evacuees considering farming opportunities is the fact that both men were formerly connected with Farm Security administration and will be able to give valuable information along that line.

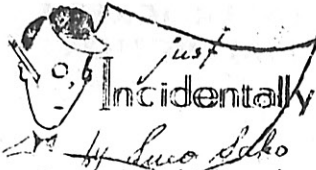
## WRA TO BE PLACED UNDER ICKES'S JURISDICTION

WASHINGTON--WRA will be transferred to the Interior Department and placed under the firm hand of Secretary Harold Ickes, according to the Colorado Times.

The agency now is independent. The transfer order already has been drawn and it's reported it has been signed by the President.

Announcement of the transfer is being delayed, it was reported, until the move can be discussed with Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, who was on the West Coast and who was scheduled to return here yesterday.

Myer and his staff will be given the opportunity of remaining with WRA after it loses its independence. West Coast members of Congress have demanded that WRA be reorganized following several outbreaks in --continued on page 3--



The past week the re-institution of Selective Service for nisei has been the most discussed subject and the upper most thought in the minds of thousands of prospective Joe Nisei and his family. Yet, we must not get a one-track mind because there are other developments--insignificant now--but may have far-reaching importance in the future.

That may sound as though I were speaking at random, but even this week on Capitol Hill the House Committee on Immigration and Naturalization are attempting to "thaw out" some type of bill pertaining to nisei and Japanese aliens in this country. As expected the Pacific coast political and economic groups have shown most interest in this matter.

A number of bills have been introduced for consideration by Western representatives--some silly and others with definite possibilities.

One of the most interesting is Johnson's bill calling for the creation of a Japanese deportation commission of three who would be empowered to determine whether persons of Japanese descent are loyal and to order deportation. Obviously such orders may be reviewed by the US Court of Appeals or Supreme Court, but all court objections to deportation must have been made before the commission.

Other bills up for debate are Sheppard's, "brain-child," authorizing the US Attorneys to prosecute any persons convicted of expressing loyalty to any foreign state for deportation; the Russell measure calls for revocation of citizenship for all persons who are "not observing by word or conduct the oath for citizenship." The big kick attached to the latter bill is to deport anyone who "refuses to speak, while in the United States, the English language."

## Another Step

Undoubtedly one of the bitter disappointments for a majority of the draft-age nisei who became subject for military service with the re-opening of Selective Service was the limitation which prevents them from serving in all branches of the Armed Forces. In fact, many harbored the hopes of at least training side-by-side with their American friends regardless of color, race or creed. Instead, all indications point toward assignment with either the 100th Battalion or the 442nd Combat Team.

A number of nisei, if given a choice, would undoubtedly elect to serve in the Navy, Air Forces, Armored Force, or even the Marines.

This discrimination will undoubtedly make the nisei feel as though they are still being tabbed as "second-class citizens."

But we hope this is only ANOTHER step towards equal rights and status accorded to fellow American citizens. Perhaps many of us anticipated more, but in all probability time and our actions will determine our future.

Mrs. Terry rejoined her husband and 2-year-old son after Lieut. Gen. Delos C. Emmons, commanding officer

of the Western Defense Command, had adjudged her and 15 other nisei wives of Americans loyal and granted their release from War Relocation centers.

## Evacuees Develop Bread-Line Complex

A trait of which persons of Japanese descent prided themselves back on the coast was their industry. It was as characterized of them as their brown skin and slanting eyes.

They worked hard, put forth a little extra effort, a little extra time. They didn't want to be average. They were after results, and they got them. They learned through experience that enterprise pays dividends.

It appears that this valuable lesson has been forgotten by a great many evacuees. The bitterness, hatred and dissatisfaction spawned by evacuation have curdled initiative. In place of initiative, there is the desire and attempt to get by with doing little or nothing.

The Rev. Herbert Nicholson, who knows Japanese intimately, believes that the most tragic aspect of evacuation is the disintegration of industry among evacuees. Work habits are deplorable. Some evacuees have lost all drive and perseverance. Yes, he saw the reason for it at the outset, but he sees no percentage in continuing to be that way. He hopes evacuees will snap out of it before too much damage is done.

Many evacuees figure the government owes them much, so they're going to take it easy. They didn't ask to be sent here, so why work their heads off?

They are the ones who still harp on evacuation

every opportunity they get. Sure, evacuation was a horrifying pill to have to swallow, and it's not going to be easy to erase it from one's mind. But dwelling upon its injustices, which righteous and intelligent citizens and government officials are doing their utmost to rectify, will get the moaners nowhere.

Some chip-carrying evacuees bring up the issue of evacuation with nauseating regularity. Whenever they get the chance, they corner any WRA official and unload their grievances and demand to know why they were evacuated, what the government is doing to do about it, and all that sort of stuff which has been hashed and re-hashed many times.

Some evacuees, bitterly vindictive, are suffering under the illusion that they are "gyping" the government which uprooted them by bumming on their jobs. On the contrary, they are only hurting themselves by forming the tendency to get away with expending as little effort as possible.

It is not expected that evacuees sweat and slave for so-called "penny ante" wages of \$12, \$10 and \$10 for a 170-hour month. But no one can expect, through slack, indifferent work habits, to maintain self-respect. They will only develop the breadline complex.

When evacuees with lax work tendencies relocate, they usually become the

notorious "two weeks Japs" by flitting from one job to another. They can't and don't hold down jobs very long. They are inclined to gravitate toward jobs calling for a minimum of skill and effort. And they leave in their shameful wake enraized employers who turn thumbs down on future evacuees seeking employment.

On the other hand, risen with the proper slant have viewed evacuation as an accomplished fact which happened during a momentary lapse of a quickly democracy at war, and are determined to start fresh on a new trail, leaving all gripes behind.

Their diligence has not become diseased. If anything, the uncertainty of the future has invigorated their enterprise. Since coming to camp, they have learned new skills well enough to go out and get jobs. They wasted no time being clock-watchers, work-cutters, colotex-leaners, cafcen cowboys, roving romeos, or first-class bums. They learned, and they are reaping the benefits of diligence.

To them camp was a training interlude, a springboard into a secure and satisfying future. They are keeping alive the trait of enterprise and diligence which carried Japanese to the top on the West coast, and which if properly nurtured can some day zoom them upward again in their new homes.--John Kitasako of the Mount Mountain Sentinel Newspaper.

In the preliminary tussle the Granada high sextet defeated the local Spurs by a 27-14 margin.





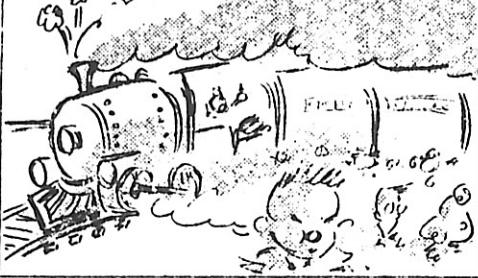
