

DRAFT-AGE STUDENTS MAY REQUEST DEFERMENT MUST MAKE APPLICATION THROUGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

According to information from the Selective Service board in Lamar all resident citizens are eligible for induction into military service upon reaching their 18th birthday, stated Lloyd A. Garrison, superintendent of education. However, if a boy is 18 years of age and is enrolled in high school, the superintendent

of education may request deferment until (1) the school year is completed or (2) until graduation. Such deferments are understood not to exceed six months.

Garrison added that all high school boys who are now 18 years of age should notify the high school principal in writing if they

wish to be deferred until the close of the current school year. Upon receipt of such requests the superintendent of education will then petition the local Selective Service board for deferment. All requests for this action must come from the boy concerned and they should be presented as quickly as possible.

CONSOLATORY GOODS SLATED TO ARRIVE HERE THIS WEEK

Amache's share of consolatory goods shipment, which arrived from Japan on the exchange ship M. S. Gripsholm, is scheduled to reach here this week from Kennedy and Crystal City, Tex., according to W. Ray Johnson, assistant project director.

Included in the local allotment are 340 barrels of soy sauce, 14 barrels of miso (bean mash), one case of drugs, one large box of tea and one box of books.

The consolatory goods were sent to the Japanese nationals residing in relocation centers and internment camps in the United States by the Japanese government as a token of comfort. The Japanese Red Cross through the International Committee of Red Cross in Geneva, Switzerland, handled the arrange-

Knodel stated that since the reinstatement of Selective Service, relocation has nearly doubled.

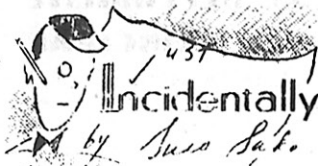

Undoubtedly everyone has heard the story of the last-minute removal of Nisei War Hero Tech. Sgt. Kuroki from Ginny Simms' radio program last week by order of the War Department, rescinding permission previously granted. To the prospective thousands of Joe Nisei it was a severe blow. I know many of Sgt. Kuroki's worshippers had their cars glued to their radio loudspeakers.

I was indeed interested in scrutinizing the Nation's press releases for favorable or unfavorable comments on this incident. There were, as I anticipated, straight headline stories, but very few opinions expressed on the matter.

Probably the most heartening of all public reactions in letters to newspaper editors, was the one published in Sunday's Rocky Mountain News.

J. M. Boucher, writer of the letter, really expressed the nisei's true feelings. He harshly questioned the advisability of War Department's sudden action...and went on to say...if a Japanese American has the right or privilege of fighting for this country why not permit him to make an appearance and tell of his service...is it that intolerance has reached such a degree that, notwithstanding high merits, petty prejudice will be allowed to cloud and obscure greater values?

The writer continued... this ill-advised move will not only encourage prejudice, but it is unfair and will undoubtedly be resented by those who fought side-by-side with Tech. Sgt. Ben Kuroki, and it cannot but make those of his race feel that no matter how great their loyalty and how valuable their services to their country, all such will be discounted and perhaps even ridiculed....

No truer words were written, when Boucher said...better citizens are not made that way....

MARTINEZ GROUP PLEADS FOR NISEI THROUGH OPEN LETTER

A half dozen residents of Martinez came to the defense of Mrs. June Arrii Terry, 22, nisei wife of Morton Terry, who was unjustly forced to move from her home by indignant neighbors, in an open letter to

the people, according to the Jan. 26 edition of the San Francisco Chronicle.

The six residents explained that Mrs. Terry's brother, Esao Arrii, was honored by the Martinez American Legion as one of the first American-Japanese draftees of the US Army and is now serving with a combat unit overseas. The letter continued:

"It is tragic when, as the result of war hysteria, Americans lose sight of the American ideals and rights we are trying to protect... Mrs. Terry is an American citizen, who has the right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, as set down in the Constitution...If she is deprived of these, our part in World War II is completely without justification."

Meantime, the chamber of commerce at Niles in Alameda county voted a resolution seeking to prevent the return of Japanese to the Pacific Coast for the duration and to encourage legislation which would curtail their colonization on the Pacific Coast after the war."

Since many students are eligible for selective service, some members of the faculty are already working on this course to be taught in the near future.

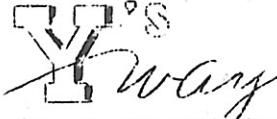

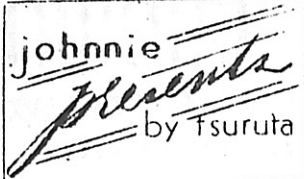

35 NISEI DONATE BLOOD IN REPLY TO JAPAN'S ATROCITIES

Thirty-five Japanese Americans, native Coloradans and evacuees from the West Coast, registered at the American Red Cross blood donor center, Friday and volunteered to give their blood as an expression of what a spokesman termed "our intense indignation at the reported atrocities committed on Americans in the Philippines," according to the

Colorado Times.

Dr. Howard Suenaga, former Guadalupe, Calif., physician and surgeon, said members of the group called on him early Friday and asked what they could do to show their horror of the bestial treatment accorded by Japanese troops to Americans captured at Bataan and Corregidor.

"All of them wanted to do something immediately to symbolize their Americanism," Dr. Suenaga declared, "and they seized enthusiastically upon a suggestion that one way was to contribute blood to the American Red Cross blood bank to buy as many War Bonds as possible."

Shepherded by Dr. Suenaga, a sansei, now living in Denver, the thirty-five volunteers went in a body to the blood donor center and enthusiastically registered.

"And that is only the beginning," Dr. Suenaga said. "By next week many more volunteers will have offered their blood for the benefit of American soldiers. A large number of Japanese-American women wanted to offer their blood Friday but were prevented by household tasks. They will be among those who register within a few days."

"The contribution of blood by these Japanese Americans," commented Dr. Suenaga, "was made despite an oriental superstition that the loss of blood means the departure of a certain amount of the life stream."

SERVICEMEN'S DEPENDENTS ALLOWANCE

Since reinstitution of selective service for the nisei has been established and the chief worry of most prospective inductee is the care of their dependents, following excerpts from servicemen's dependents allowance act of 1942 are listed for informational purpose.

First of all, "enlisted individual" includes inductees as well as enlistees, and the servicemen with dependents in relocation centers may request allowances for "A" and "B" class dependents. "B1" class, which asks for "chief" portion of support, may not be allowable for dependents in WRA projects.

Total monthly family allowances in typical cases are as follows:

Class A: (wife, husband, child or children and former wife divorced) Wife but no child, \$50; wife and one child, \$80; and additional

\$20 for each additional child.

No wife but one child, \$42; and additional \$20 for each additional child.

Class B: (parents, brothers and sisters) Regardless of number of dependents, \$37. This does not apply any member is receiving allowance as B1 dependent.

Class B1: (parents, brothers and sisters) Dependents allowances is more complicated for full listing here but this information may be had by contacting the project selective service officer.

Although no proof of financial dependency is required to obtain aid, it is necessary to submit proof of relationship. Class B members are those dependent on enlisted individual for a substantial portion of their support, while class B1 are dependents who require chief portion of their support from the enlisted

individual. A child, brother, or sister are eligible if unmarried and either (a) under 18 years of age, or (b) of any age if incapable of self-support by reason of mental or physical defect.

In order to receive initial family allowance a written application must be filed with 15 (fifteen) days after the date of entry into active service. The filing of this application is optional. But if it is filed by or on behalf of a class A dependent and the application is approved the deductions from or charge against the enlisted individual's pay are compulsory.

FIRES CAUSED BY VIOLATIONS OF INSTRUCTIONS

A number of the fires in the project residence blocks have been directly due to violations of instructions in regard to electric appliances, according to William B. Wroth, senior engineer, and Verne Campbell, fire protection officer, and to the use of electric appliances which are a definite fire hazard, as recent fires show.

The residents of the center have been repeatedly warned that the wiring in the blocks is not sufficient for the use of electric appliances, and that flat irons should be used only in the laundries, where suitable receptacles have been installed. Warnings have also been given that the proper use in the apartments is not over 2 lights or lamps (1 of 100 watts) and a radio set.

The only allowance permitted for other electric appliances is for the heating of baby food, and for safety reasons, is limited to one of the small heaters made for this purpose or a small 1 plate electric heater of not over 250 watts, and these not to be used during the hours of 6 P.M. to 9 P.M. when the other lights and radios are all being used.

Residents have also been warned about the cords to lamps and radios, and to be sure that these are held by insulated hooks or tacks and not nailed or tacked or hung over plain metal hooks.

The recent fire in 9L was directly caused by the use of too much electricity, causing the ceiling light socket and wires to heat up, and set fire to the ceiling. There were, in addition to the 100 watts ceiling light and the radio,

3 extension cords to other lighting fixtures, a 2-plate electric stove and an electric iron.

The recent fire in 11H was probably due to an electric cord hung across a nail, which wore out the insulation and finally caused a short circuit during the absence of the residents, resulting in a more serious fire.

These conditions are within the control of the residents and the dangers are again being called to their attention so that they will realize that such fires and the resulting damages are their own responsibility.

WRA regulations for Fire prevention state in Section 40.4.9:

"Fire protection regulations for electrical systems are as follows:

A. Tampering with electrical wiring is prohibited.

B. Defective wires, switches, drop cords, etc. shall be reported to the electrician, who shall arrange for repair or replacement.

C. Fire Prevention Bureau Inspectors shall watch for improper use of extension cords.

D. Use of electrical appliances, such as electric cords, irons, hot plates, etc., in living quarters must have prior approval of the fire protection officer.

E. Overloading of electrical circuits is prohibited."

Except for the use of small heaters for baby food, no other appliances have been approved. The recent fires show direct violations of Sections A, D, and E.
